### Definitions of "Exterminate" as a verb

According to the [Oxford Dictionary of English](#), “exterminate” as a verb can have the following definitions:


- *Destroy completely.*
- *Kill (a pest).*
- *Kill en masse; kill on a large scale; kill many.*
- *Destroy completely, as if down to the roots.*



## Synonyms of "Exterminate" as a verb (15 Words)

<b><u>dispatch</u></b>	Send off to a destination or for a purpose. <i>He <b>dispatched</b> the animal with one blow.</i>
<b>do away with</b>	Travel or traverse (a distance).
<b>do to death</b>	Carry on or function.
<b>end the life of</b>	Be the end of; be the last or concluding part of.
<b>eradicate</b>	Destroy completely; put an end to. <i>This disease has been <b>eradicated</b> from the world.</i>
<b>extirpate</b>	Surgically remove (an organ). <i>Timber wolves were <b>extirpated</b> from New England more than a century ago.</i>
<b>finish off</b>	Provide with a finish.
<b>get rid of</b>	Be stricken by an illness, fall victim to an illness.
<b>kill off</b>	Hit with great force.

<b>put an end to</b>	Formulate in a particular style or language.
<b>put to death</b>	Cause to be in a certain state; cause to be in a certain relation.
<b>root out</b>	Plant by the roots.
<b>take the life of</b>	Admit into a group or community.
<b>uproot</b>	Destroy completely, as if down to the roots. <i>The war <b>uprooted</b> many people.</i>



## Usage Examples of "Exterminate" as a verb

- *Hitler wanted to exterminate the Jews, Gypsies, Communists, and homosexuals of Europe.*
- *After exterminating the entire population, the soldiers set fire to the buildings.*
- *They use poison to exterminate moles.*



## Associations of "Exterminate" (30 Words)

- abolish** Formally put an end to (a system, practice, or institution).  
*The tax was **abolished** in 1977.*
- abrogate** Repeal or do away with (a law, right, or formal agreement).  
*A proposal to **abrogate** temporarily the right to strike.*
- abrogation** The repeal or abolition of a law, right, or agreement.
- annihilate** Destroy utterly; obliterate.  
*A fraction of the mass of atomic nuclei is **annihilated**.*
- annul** Declare invalid.  
*The elections were **annulled** by the general amid renewed protests.*

<b><u>cancel</u></b>	A notation cancelling a previous sharp or flat. <i>His visa had been <b>cancelled</b>.</i>
<b><u>cull</u></b>	An inferior or surplus livestock animal selected for culling. <i>Though they may have cleared the weeds they have also <b>culled</b> the flowers.</i>
<b><u>decimate</u></b>	Drastically reduce the strength or effectiveness of (something). <i>The man who is to determine whether it be necessary to <b>decimate</b> a large body of mutineers.</i>
<b><u>delete</u></b>	A command or key on a computer which erases text. <i>You can use <b>delete</b> to remove a number of lines from your program.</i>
<b>eliminate</b>	Eliminate from the body. <i>This possibility can be <b>eliminated</b> from our consideration.</i>
<b>eradicate</b>	Destroy completely, as if down to the roots. <i>This disease has been <b>eradicated</b> from the world.</i>
<b>erasable</b>	Capable of being effaced. <i>A signal too loud to be <b>erasable</b> in a single pass through the erase head.</i>
<b><u>erase</u></b>	Wipe out digitally or magnetically recorded information. <i>The magic of the landscape <b>erased</b> all else from her mind.</i>
<b>extirpate</b>	Destroy completely, as if down to the roots. <i>Timber wolves were <b>extirpated</b> from New England more than a century ago.</i>
<b>extirpation</b>	Surgical removal of a body part or tissue.
<b><u>null</u></b>	Combine a signal with another in order to create a null cancel out. <b>Null</b> and void.
<b><u>nullify</u></b>	Make of no use or value; cancel out. <i>Judges were unwilling to <b>nullify</b> government decisions.</i>
<b><u>obliterate</u></b>	Mark for deletion, rub off, or erase. <i>The special stamp should be placed on the left hand side and not be used to <b>obliterate</b> the postage stamp.</i>
<b>off</b>	Located on the side of a vehicle that is normally furthest from the kerb offside. <i>She broke <b>off</b> her reading to look at her husband.</i>
<b><u>override</u></b>	The act of nullifying; making null and void; counteracting or overriding the effect or force of something. <i>The House vote in favour of the bill was 10 votes short of the requisite majority for an <b>override</b>.</i>
<b>remove</b>	Remove something concrete as by lifting pushing or taking off or remove something abstract. <i>She sat down to <b>remove</b> her make up.</i>

<b>repeal</b>	Cancel officially. <i>The House voted in favour of <b>repeal</b>.</i>
<b>rescind</b>	Revoke, cancel, or repeal (a law, order, or agreement). <i>The government eventually <b>rescinded</b> the directive.</i>
<b>rescission</b>	(law) the act of rescinding; the cancellation of a contract and the return of the parties to the positions they would have had if the contract had not been made. <i>The plaintiff agreed to the <b>rescission</b> of the agreement.</i>
<a href="#"><u>revoke</u></a>	Officially cancel (a decree, decision, or promise). <i>The men appealed and the sentence was <b>revoked</b>.</i>
<b>ruthlessly</b>	Without pity or compassion for others. <i>They fell prey to money lenders who <b>ruthlessly</b> exploited them.</i>
<b>stump</b>	Remove tree stumps from. <i>The candidate <b>stumped</b> the Northeast.</i>
<b>uproot</b>	Remove or destroy completely; eradicate. <i>A revolution is necessary to <b>uproot</b> the social order.</i>
<b>withdrawal</b>	The act of taking out money or other capital. <i>The <b>withdrawal</b> of legal aid.</i>
