## Synonyms of "Extraction" as a noun (22 Words)

<b><u>ancestors</u></b>	Someone from whom you are descended (but usually more remote than a grandparent).
<b><u>ancestry</u></b>	One's family or ethnic descent. <i>He was proud of his Irish <b>ancestry</b>.</i>
<b>coercion</b>	The practice of persuading someone to do something by using force or threats. <i>They didn't have to use <b>coercion</b>.</i>
<b><u>descent</u></b>	The descendants of one individual. <i>His <b>descents</b> on the manager of any shop he took a fancy to visit.</i>
<b>distillation</b>	The action of purifying a liquid by a process of heating and cooling. <i>The petroleum <b>distillation</b> process.</i>
<b>drawing out</b>	An illustration that is drawn by hand and published in a book, magazine, or newspaper.
<b>exaction</b>	Act of demanding or levying by force or authority. <i>The billions flow in through 28 taxes and countless smaller <b>exactions</b>.</i>
<b>expressing</b>	Rapid transport of goods.

<b><u>extortion</u></b>	Unjust exaction (as by the misuse of authority). <i>The <b>extortion</b> by dishonest officials of fees for performing their sworn duty.</i>
<b>extrication</b>	The act of releasing from a snarled or tangled condition.
<b>family</b>	A group of one or more parents and their children living together as a unit. <i>All manuscripts that share this reading constitute a <b>family</b>.</i>
<b><u>origin</u></b>	Properties attributable to your ancestry. <i><b>Origin</b> in sensation.</i>
<b>parentage</b>	The kinship relation of an offspring to the parents. <i>This ice cream boasts American <b>parentage</b>.</i>
<b>pressing</b>	The act of pressing the exertion of pressure. <i>At the <b>pressing</b> of a button.</i>
<b>pulling out</b>	The act of pulling; applying force to move something toward or with you.
<b>removal</b>	The forcing of individuals or communities to leave their place of residence, especially to move to ethnically homogeneous rural settlements. <i>The forced <b>removals</b> of the Acadians began in late 1755.</i>
<b><u>separation</u></b>	The action or state of moving or being moved apart. <i>He hid in the <b>separation</b> between walls.</i>
<b>squeezing</b>	A twisting squeeze.
<b>taking out</b>	The act of someone who picks up or takes something.
<b>tearing out</b>	An occasion for excessive eating or drinking.
<b>withdrawal</b>	The act of taking out money or other capital. <i>The <b>withdrawal</b> of French troops from Vietnam.</i>
<b>wrenching out</b>	A failure by a batter or runner to reach a base safely in baseball.

- anhydrous** (of a substance, especially a crystalline compound) containing no water.
- aqueous** Like water; watery.  
*An **aqueous** solution of potassium permanganate.*
- digress** Wander from a direct or straight course.  
*Don't **digress** when you give a lecture.*
- digressive** Tending to depart from the main point or cover a wide range of subjects.  
*Amusingly **digressive** with satirical thrusts at women's fashions among other things.*
- dilution** A liquid that has been diluted.  
*The milk factor is greatly reduced by **dilution**.*
- discursive** (of a style of speech or writing) fluent and expansive.  
*The attempt to transform utterances from one **discursive** context to another.*

<b>dissolve</b>	Cause to lose control emotionally. <i>She <b>dissolved</b> into tears when she heard that she had lost all her savings in the pyramid scheme.</i>
<b>excursive</b>	Tending to depart from the main point or cover a wide range of subjects. <i>His <b>excursive</b> remarks.</i>
<b>hydrate</b>	Cause to be hydrated add water or moisture to. <i>A powerful moisturizer that <b>hydrates</b> the skin for up to twelve hours.</i>
<b>immiscible</b>	Incapable of mixing. <i>Benzene is <b>immiscible</b> with water.</i>
<b>indirect</b>	Not directly caused by or resulting from something. <i>Local government under the <b>indirect</b> control of the British.</i>
<b>irrelevant</b>	Having no bearing on or connection with the subject at issue. <i>An <b>irrelevant</b> comment.</i>
<b>liquefaction</b>	The process of making something, especially a gas, liquid. <i>Helium can be obtained from the <b>liquefaction</b> of natural gas.</i>
<b>liquid</b>	Changed from a solid to a liquid state. <i>Drink plenty of <b>liquids</b>.</i>
<b>meandering</b>	An act of wandering in a leisurely or aimless manner. <i><b>Meandering</b> streams.</i>
<b>melt</b>	A quantity of metal melted in one operation. <i>Richard gave her a smile that <b>melted</b> her heart.</i>
<b>meltwater</b>	Melted snow or ice. <i>Glacial <b>meltwaters</b> gathered on a thick bed of boulder clay.</i>
<b>naphtha</b>	Any of various volatile flammable liquid hydrocarbon mixtures; used chiefly as solvents.
<b>oxidize</b>	Combine chemically with oxygen. <i>This metal <b>oxidizes</b> easily.</i>
<b>petroleum</b>	A liquid mixture of hydrocarbons which is present in suitable rock strata and can be extracted and refined to produce fuels including petrol, paraffin, and diesel oil; oil.
<b>rambling</b>	Of a path e.g. <i>A <b>rambling</b> club.</i>
<b>roam</b>	Move about or travel aimlessly or unsystematically, especially over a wide area. <i>He let his eyes <b>roam</b> her face.</i>

<b><u>saturated</u></b>	Denoting fats containing a high proportion of fatty acid molecules without double bonds considered to be less healthy in the diet than unsaturated fats. A <b>saturated</b> solution.
<b>sidetrack</b>	Cause (someone) to be distracted from an immediate or important issue. <i>His monologue launches into too many rambling <b>sidetracks</b>.</i>
<b>soluble</b>	Capable of being dissolved in some solvent (usually water). <i>The poison is <b>soluble</b> in alcohol.</i>
<b><u>solvent</u></b>	Something that acts to weaken or dispel a particular attitude or situation. <i>An unrivalled <b>solvent</b> of social prejudices.</i>
<b><u>tangential</u></b>	Relating to or along a tangent. A <b>tangential</b> remark.
<b>thaw</b>	A period of warmer weather that thaws ice and snow. <i>She <b>thawed</b> out sufficiently to allow a smile to appear.</i>
<b><u>unsuitable</u></b>	Not capable of being applied. <i>The display is <b>unsuitable</b> for young children.</i>
<b>wandering</b>	Of a path e.g. A <b>wandering</b> preacher.
