- *Release from entanglement of difficulty.*
- *Free (someone or something) from a constraint or difficulty.*

- detach** Cause to become detached or separated take off.

- disconnect** Make disconnected disjoin or unfasten.
*He **disconnected** the main power cables from the batteries.*
- disencumber** Free from or relieve of an encumbrance.
*The sect claims to **disencumber** adherents of the untoward effects of past traumas.*
- disengage** Pass the point of one's sword over or under the opponent's sword to change the line of attack.
*I **disengaged** his hand from mine.*

disentangle	Remove knots or tangles from (wool, rope, or hair). <i>Can you disentangle the cord.</i>
extract	Extract by the process of distillation. <i>Extract information from the telegram.</i>
free	Free from obligations or duties. <i>She struggled to free herself from the tenacious mud.</i>
get out	Cause to move; cause to be in a certain position or condition.
let loose	Grant use or occupation of under a term of contract.
loosen	Become loose or looser or less tight. <i>Loosen the tension on a rope.</i>
release	Release gas or energy as a result of a chemical reaction or physical decomposition. <i>He released the handbrake.</i>
remove	Remove from a position or an office. <i>An explanation that is far removed from the truth.</i>
unclasp	Unfasten (something fastened with a clasp or similar device). <i>She clasped and unclasped her hands.</i>
unfasten	Become undone or untied. <i>He had left the door unfastened.</i>
unloose	Undo; let free. <i>Unloose your sneakers.</i>
untangle	Release from entanglement of difficulty. <i>Fishermen untangled their nets.</i>
untwine	Undo what has been twined together. <i>Untwine the strings.</i>
withdraw	Withdraw from active participation. <i>This machine withdraws heat from the environment.</i>

- *He was trying to extricate himself from official duties.*

free	Free from obligations or duties. <i>We are freeing management time for alternative work.</i>
knot	Tie or fasten into a knot. <i>A knotted rope.</i>
latch	Fasten with a latch. <i>Lifting the latch she pushed the gate open.</i>
<u>liberate</u>	Set (someone) free from imprisonment, slavery, or oppression. <i>The drummer s wearing a beret he s liberated from Lord knows where.</i>
<u>liberation</u>	The act of liberating someone or something. <i>She worked for women s liberation.</i>
<u>loose</u>	Become loose or looser or less tight. <i>Loosen the tension on a rope.</i>

release	A device that when pressed will release part of a mechanism. <i>There was a sudden release of oxygen.</i>
solve	Settle, as of a debt. <i>The policy could solve the town s housing crisis.</i>
<u>spill</u>	A quantity of liquid that has spilled or been spilt. <i>The milk spilled across the floor.</i>

trap	A device to hurl clay pigeons into the air for trapshooters. <i>By keeping quiet I was walking into a trap.</i>
undo	A feature of a computer program that allows a user to cancel or reverse the last command executed. <i>Undo the shoelace.</i>
unfasten	Open the fastening of; undo (something). <i>The shoelaces unfastened.</i>
unknot	Become or cause to become undone by separating the fibers or threads of. <i>He swiftly unknotted his tie.</i>
unravel	(of an intricate process, system, or arrangement) disintegrate or be destroyed. <i>The sweater unraveled.</i>
unscramble	Make intelligible. <i>Can you unscramble the message.</i>
untangle	Make (something complicated or confusing) easier to understand or deal with. <i>He knew he d have to untangle a financial mess and somehow restore investor confidence.</i>
untie	Undo the ties of. <i>Untie the knot.</i>
unwrap	Remove the wrapping from (a package). <i>Let s unwrap the gifts.</i>
waiver	A document recording the waiving of a right or claim. <i>They give consent to waiver of their subrogation rights.</i>
withdraw	Withdraw from active participation. <i>He failed to withdraw his remarks and apologize.</i>
