- *Superficially impressive, but lacking depth and attention to the true complexities of a subject.*
- *Expressing yourself readily, clearly, effectively.*
- *Ignoring the true complexities of an issue; superficial.*
- *Arrived at without due care or effort; lacking depth.*
- *(of a person) having a superficial or simplistic knowledge or approach.*
- *(especially of success in sport) easily achieved; effortless.*

<b>black and white</b>	Distributed or sold illicitly.
<b>easy</b>	Readily exploited or tricked. <i><b>Easy</b> money.</i>
<b>effortless</b>	Requiring no physical or mental exertion. <i>I went up the steps in two <b>effortless</b> bounds.</i>
<b>eloquent</b>	Clearly expressing or indicating something. <i>An <b>eloquent</b> speech.</i>
<b>fluent</b>	Able to express oneself easily and articulately. <i>His style of play was fast and <b>fluent</b>.</i>
<b>neat</b>	Very good. <i>Took his whiskey <b>neat</b>.</i>
<b>oversimple</b>	Lacking sophistication and subtlety. <i>An <b>oversimple</b> theory of human nature.</i>

<b>oversimplified</b>	Simplified to such an extent that a distorted impression is given. <i>An <b>oversimplified</b> view of human personality.</i>
<b>painless</b>	Involving little effort or stress. <i><b>Painless</b> dentistry.</i>
<b><u>schematic</u></b>	(of a diagram or other representation) symbolic and simplified. <i>This concept is shown in <b>schematic</b> form in Figure 1.</i>
<b><u>silver</u></b>	Having the white lustrous sheen of silver. <i>Repeated scrubblings have given the wood a <b>silvery</b> sheen.</i>
<b>silver-tongued</b>	Expressing yourself readily, clearly, effectively.
<b><u>simplistic</u></b>	Treating complex issues and problems as if they were much simpler than they really are. <i><b>Simplistic</b> arguments of the ruling party.</i>
<b><u>slick</u></b>	Made slick by e.g. ice or grease. <i>A dandy looking dude with a <b>slick</b> black ponytail.</i>
<b>smooth-spoken</b>	Expressing yourself readily, clearly, effectively.
<b><u>superficial</u></b>	Denoting a quantity of a material expressed in terms of area covered rather than linear dimension or volume. <i>In his paper he showed a very <b>superficial</b> understanding of psychoanalytic theory.</i>
<b>trouble-free</b>	Without problems or difficulties.
<b>unchallenged</b>	Not disputed or questioned. <i>A position of <b>unchallenged</b> supremacy.</i>
<b>undemanding</b>	(especially of a task) not demanding. <i>An <b>undemanding</b> boss.</i>
<b>unexacting</b>	Not rigorous. <i>Relaxed and <b>unexacting</b> standards.</i>

### casual

A youth belonging to a subculture characterized by the wearing of expensive casual clothing and frequently associated with football hooliganism.

An ideal coat for **casual** occasions.

### **easy**

With ease easy is sometimes used informally for easily.

Success came too **easy**.

### easygoing

Not burdensome or demanding; borne or done easily and without hardship.

The **easygoing** life of a parttime consultant.

<b>effortless</b>	Achieved with admirable ease. <i>I went up the steps in two <b>effortless</b> bounds.</i>
<b>eloquent</b>	Expressing yourself readily, clearly, effectively. <i>The bus journey alone is <b>eloquent</b> of class inequality.</i>
<b>eulogy</b>	A speech or piece of writing that praises someone or something highly, especially a tribute to someone who has just died. <i>A <b>eulogy</b> to the Queen Mother.</i>
<b>faithless</b>	Disloyal, especially to a spouse or partner. <i>They were ungodly and <b>faithless</b>.</i>
<b>flowing</b>	(of a line or contour) smoothly continuous. <i>A <b>flowing</b> prose style.</i>
<b>fluent</b>	Able to speak or write a particular foreign language easily and accurately. <i>She became <b>fluent</b> in French and German.</i>
<b>halcyon</b>	Marked by peace and prosperity. <i>The <b>halcyon</b> days of the clipper trade.</i>
<b>happy-go-lucky</b>	Occurring by chance.
<b>insouciant</b>	Marked by blithe unconcern. <i>An <b>insouciant</b> shrug.</i>
<b>lazy</b>	(of a river) slow-moving. <i>A <b>lazy</b> lowland river.</i>
<b>leisurely</b>	Not hurried or forced. <i>At a <b>leisurely</b> or easygoing pace.</i>
<b>nonchalant</b>	(of a person or manner) feeling or appearing casually calm and relaxed; not displaying anxiety, interest, or enthusiasm. <i>Was polite in a teasing <b>nonchalant</b> manner.</i>
<b>oration</b>	The style or manner in which an oration is given. <i>Pericles famous funeral <b>oration</b>.</i>
<b>regardless</b>	In spite of everything; without regard to drawbacks. <i>The allowance is paid <b>regardless</b> of age or income.</i>
<b>relaxed</b>	Free from tension and anxiety. <i>We were having a great time and feeling very <b>relaxed</b>.</i>
<b>rhetorician</b>	A person who delivers a speech or oration. <i>They re ready to listen to any smooth tongued <b>rhetorician</b>.</i>
<b>simple</b>	Composed of a single element; not compound. <i>A <b>simple</b> game.</i>

<b>slow</b>	Of a sports field or ground likely to make the ball bounce or run slowly or to prevent competitors from travelling fast. <i>Production <b>slowed</b>.</i>
<b>specious</b>	Based on pretense; deceptively pleasing. <i>A <b>specious</b> claim.</i>
<b><u>unconcerned</u></b>	Lacking in interest or care or feeling. <i>The prisoner seems entirely <b>unconcerned</b> as to the outcome of the examination.</i>
<b>unhurried</b>	Relaxed and leisurely; without hurry or haste. <i>He began opening the drawers of his desk in an <b>unhurried</b> way.</i>
<b>uninterested</b>	Not interested in or concerned about something or someone. <i>She appeared totally <b>uninterested</b>.</i>
<b>unmolested</b>	Not interfered with, disturbed, or harmed. <i>They allowed him to pass <b>unmolested</b>.</i>
<b>untroubled</b>	Free from turmoil or worries. <i><b>Untroubled</b> sleep.</i>
<b>volubility</b>	The quality of being facile in speech and writing. <i>Her legendary <b>volubility</b> deserted her.</i>
