- *Arrived at without due care or effort; lacking depth.*
- *(of a person) having a superficial or simplistic knowledge or approach.*
- *(especially of success in sport) easily achieved; effortless.*

black and white	Distributed or sold illicitly.
easy	Readily exploited or tricked. <i>Easy money.</i>
effortless	Requiring no physical or mental exertion. <i>I went up the steps in two effortless bounds.</i>
eloquent	Clearly expressing or indicating something. <i>An eloquent speech.</i>
fluent	Able to express oneself easily and articulately. <i>His style of play was fast and fluent.</i>
neat	Very good. <i>Took his whiskey neat.</i>
oversimple	Lacking sophistication and subtlety. <i>An oversimple theory of human nature.</i>

oversimplified	Simplified to such an extent that a distorted impression is given. <i>An oversimplified view of human personality.</i>
painless	Involving little effort or stress. <i>Painless dentistry.</i>
schematic	(of a diagram or other representation) symbolic and simplified. <i>This concept is shown in schematic form in Figure 1.</i>
silver	Having the white lustrous sheen of silver. <i>Repeated scrubblings have given the wood a silvery sheen.</i>
silver-tongued	Expressing yourself readily, clearly, effectively.
simplistic	Treating complex issues and problems as if they were much simpler than they really are. <i>Simplistic arguments of the ruling party.</i>
slick	Made slick by e.g. ice or grease. <i>A dandy looking dude with a slick black ponytail.</i>
smooth-spoken	Expressing yourself readily, clearly, effectively.
superficial	Denoting a quantity of a material expressed in terms of area covered rather than linear dimension or volume. <i>In his paper he showed a very superficial understanding of psychoanalytic theory.</i>
trouble-free	Without problems or difficulties.
unchallenged	Not disputed or questioned. <i>A position of unchallenged supremacy.</i>
undemanding	(especially of a task) not demanding. <i>An undemanding boss.</i>
unexacting	Not rigorous. <i>Relaxed and unexacting standards.</i>

*An ideal coat for **casual** occasions.*

easy

With ease easy is sometimes used informally for easily.
*Success came too **easy**.*

easygoing

Not burdensome or demanding; borne or done easily and without hardship.
*The **easygoing** life of a parttime consultant.*

effortless	Achieved with admirable ease. <i>I went up the steps in two effortless bounds.</i>
eloquent	Expressing yourself readily, clearly, effectively. <i>The bus journey alone is eloquent of class inequality.</i>
<u>eulogy</u>	A speech or piece of writing that praises someone or something highly, especially a tribute to someone who has just died. <i>A eulogy to the Queen Mother.</i>
faithless	Disloyal, especially to a spouse or partner. <i>They were ungodly and faithless.</i>
flowing	(of a line or contour) smoothly continuous. <i>A flowing prose style.</i>
<u>fluent</u>	Able to speak or write a particular foreign language easily and accurately. <i>She became fluent in French and German.</i>
halcyon	Marked by peace and prosperity. <i>The halcyon days of the clipper trade.</i>
happy-go-lucky	Occurring by chance.
insouciant	Marked by blithe unconcern. <i>An insouciant shrug.</i>
<u>lazy</u>	(of a river) slow-moving. <i>A lazy lowland river.</i>
<u>leisurely</u>	Not hurried or forced. <i>At a leisurely or easygoing pace.</i>
<u>nonchalant</u>	(of a person or manner) feeling or appearing casually calm and relaxed; not displaying anxiety, interest, or enthusiasm. <i>Was polite in a teasing nonchalant manner.</i>
oration	The style or manner in which an oration is given. <i>Pericles famous funeral oration.</i>
<u>regardless</u>	In spite of everything; without regard to drawbacks. <i>The allowance is paid regardless of age or income.</i>
relaxed	Free from tension and anxiety. <i>We were having a great time and feeling very relaxed.</i>
rhetorician	A person who delivers a speech or oration. <i>They re ready to listen to any smooth tongued rhetorician.</i>
simple	Composed of a single element; not compound. <i>A simple game.</i>

slow	Of a sports field or ground likely to make the ball bounce or run slowly or to prevent competitors from travelling fast. <i>Production slowed.</i>
specious	Based on pretense; deceptively pleasing. <i>A specious claim.</i>
<u>unconcerned</u>	Lacking in interest or care or feeling. <i>The prisoner seems entirely unconcerned as to the outcome of the examination.</i>
unhurried	Relaxed and leisurely; without hurry or haste. <i>He began opening the drawers of his desk in an unhurried way.</i>
uninterested	Not interested in or concerned about something or someone. <i>She appeared totally uninterested.</i>
unmolested	Not interfered with, disturbed, or harmed. <i>They allowed him to pass unmolested.</i>
untroubled	Free from turmoil or worries. <i>Untroubled sleep.</i>
volubility	The quality of being facile in speech and writing. <i>Her legendary volubility deserted her.</i>
