<b>adequately</b>	In an adequate manner or to an adequate degree. <i>The resources required to prepare <b>adequately</b> will be extensive.</i>

<b>evenhandedly</b>	Without favoring one party, in a fair evenhanded manner.
<b>fair</b>	Without favoring one party in a fair evenhanded manner. <i>Deal <b>fairly</b> with one another.</i>
<b>impartially</b>	In a way that treats all rivals or disputants equally. <i>The adjudicator should act <b>impartially</b> in carrying out his duties.</i>
<b><u>jolly</u></b>	To a moderately sufficient extent or degree. <i>He is <b>jolly</b> busy.</i>
<b>justly</b>	According to what is morally right or fair; fairly. <i>We can <b>justly</b> be proud of our achievements.</i>
<b>middling</b>	Fairly or moderately. <i><b>Middling</b> rich.</i>
<b><u>moderately</u></b>	To a moderately sufficient extent or degree. <i>The event was <b>moderately</b> successful.</i>
<b>objectively</b>	In a way that is not dependent on the mind for existence; actually. <i>Events should be reported <b>objectively</b>.</i>
<b>passably</b>	In a way that is just good enough; reasonably. <i>He was <b>passably</b> attractive.</i>
<b>positively</b>	In a way that indicates the presence of a certain substance or condition. <i>Some of the diets may be <b>positively</b> dangerous.</i>

<b>pretty</b>	To a moderately high degree; fairly. <i>Pretty big.</i>
<b>quite</b>	To a certain or fairly significant extent or degree; fairly. <i>I quite agree.</i>
<b>rather</b>	Used to indicate one's preference in a particular matter. <i>We were rather hoping you might do that for us.</i>
<b>really</b>	Used as intensifiers real is sometimes used informally for really rattling is informal. <i>I m sorry Ruth I really am.</i>
<b>reasonably</b>	By sensible standards of judgement; justifiably. <i>Acted quite reasonably.</i>
<b>relatively</b>	Regarded in comparison with something else rather than absolutely; quite. <i>The situation is relatively calm now.</i>
<b>satisfactorily</b>	In a satisfactory manner. <i>The matter is considered to be satisfactorily resolved.</i>
<b>simply</b>	Used to introduce a short summary of a situation. <i>They lived very simply.</i>
<b>somewhat</b>	To certain extent or degree. <i>His arguments were somewhat self contradictory.</i>
<b>sufficiently</b>	To a sufficient degree. <i>A sufficiently large working force.</i>
<b>tolerably</b>	In an acceptable (but not outstanding) manner. <i>The welfare state works tolerably well.</i>

<b>much</b>	(degree adverb used before a noun phrase) for all practical purposes but not completely. <i>I don't travel <b>much</b>.</i>
<b>overdo</b>	Do, use, or carry to excess; exaggerate. <i>I'd simply <b>overdone</b> it in the gym.</i>
<b>partially</b>	Only in part; to a limited extent. <i>He was <b>partially</b> paralyzed.</i>
<b>partly</b>	To some extent; in some degree; not wholly. <i>The result is <b>partly</b> a matter of skill and <b>partly</b> of chance.</i>
<b>possibly</b>	Used in polite requests. <i>Could you <b>possibly</b> pour me another cup of tea.</i>
<b>preferably</b>	More readily or willingly. <i>Clean it well <b>preferably</b> with warm water.</i>

<b><u>pretty</u></b>	Make pretty or attractive. A <b>pretty</b> mess.
<b><u>quite</u></b>	To a degree (not used with a negative). <b>Quite</b> frankly I don't blame you.
<b><u>rather</u></b>	To a degree (not used with a negative). We were <b>rather</b> hoping you might do that for us.
<b><u>ravishing</u></b>	Stunningly beautiful. She looked <b>ravishing</b> .
<b><u>reasonably</u></b>	To a moderately sufficient extent or degree. He began to talk calmly and <b>reasonably</b> about his future.
<b><u>resemble</u></b>	Appear like; be similar or bear a likeness to. Some people <b>resemble</b> their dogs.
<b><u>significantly</u></b>	In a significant manner. He paused <b>significantly</b> .
<b><u>slightly</u></b>	To a small degree; not considerably. They are all <b>slightly</b> different.
<b><u>some</u></b>	To some extent quite a lot. We talked for <b>some</b> time.
