<u>dogma</u>	A principle or set of principles laid down by an authority as incontrovertibly true. <i>The dogmas of faith.</i>
faith community	An institution to express belief in a divine power.
ideology	The science of ideas; the study of their origin and nature. <i>A critique of bourgeois ideology.</i>
persuasion	A group or sect holding a particular religious belief. <i>Writers of all political persuasions.</i>
<u>reliance</u>	The state of relying on something. <i>He wrote the paper with considerable reliance on the work of other scientists.</i>
religion	A strong belief in a supernatural power or powers that control human destiny. <i>He was raised in the Baptist religion.</i>
religious belief	A member of a religious order who is bound by vows of poverty and chastity and obedience.
religious beliefs	A member of a religious order who is bound by vows of poverty and chastity and obedience.
religious conviction	A member of a religious order who is bound by vows of poverty and chastity and obedience.
religious group	A member of a religious order who is bound by vows of poverty and chastity and obedience.
religious persuasion	A member of a religious order who is bound by vows of poverty and chastity and obedience.

sect	A subdivision of a larger religious group. <i>A sect of anarchists.</i>
teaching	The profession of a teacher. <i>The teachings of the Koran.</i>
trust	An arrangement whereby a person a trustee holds property as its nominal owner for the good of one or more beneficiaries. <i>A trust was set up.</i>

belief	Any cognitive content held as true. <i>A belief in democratic politics.</i>
believe	Follow a credo have a faith be a believer. <i>I believe her to be very smart.</i>
believing	The cognitive process that leads to convictions. <i>Seeing is believing.</i>
catholic	Including a wide variety of things; all-embracing. <i>Her tastes are pretty catholic.</i>
christendom	The collective body of Christians throughout the world and history (found predominantly in Europe and the Americas and Australia).

<u>confidant</u>	A person with whom one shares a secret or private matter, trusting them not to repeat it to others. <i>A close confidante of the princess.</i>
confiding	Willing to tell someone about a secret or private matter and trust them not to repeat it to others. <i>She was in a confiding mood.</i>
credibility	The quality of being trusted and believed in. <i>The book's anecdotes have scant regard for credibility.</i>
<u>credible</u>	Appearing to merit belief or acceptance. <i>Completely credible testimony.</i>
<u>credo</u>	A musical setting of the Nicene Creed, typically as part of a mass. <i>He announced his credo in his first editorial.</i>
<u>credulity</u>	A tendency to be too ready to believe that something is real or true. <i>Moneylenders prey upon their credulity and inexperience.</i>
<u>creed</u>	A set of beliefs or aims which guide someone's actions. <i>People of many creeds and cultures.</i>
<u>dedication</u>	A short message (as in a book or musical work or on a photograph) dedicating it to someone or something. <i>The hardback edition contained a fulsome dedication to his wife.</i>
<u>denomination</u>	Identifying word or words by which someone or something is called and classified or distinguished from others. <i>The Presbyterian community is the second largest denomination in the country.</i>
<u>faithful</u>	Those who are faithful to a particular religion or political party. <i>He remained faithful to his wife.</i>
holy	Dedicated or consecrated to God or a religious purpose; sacred. <i>The holy month of Ramadan.</i>
pharisaic	Excessively or hypocritically pious.
reliability	The degree to which the result of a measurement, calculation, or specification can be depended on to be accurate. <i>These data throw doubt on the reliability of national statistics.</i>
sacrament	(in Roman Catholic use) the consecrated elements of the Eucharist, especially the bread or Host. <i>He heard Mass and received the sacrament.</i>
<u>salvation</u>	Preservation or deliverance from harm, ruin, or loss. <i>They turned to individualism as their salvation.</i>
<u>sanctimonious</u>	Excessively or hypocritically pious. <i>A sickening sanctimonious smile.</i>

sanctity	The state or quality of being holy, sacred, or saintly. <i>The sanctity of human life.</i>
theism	The doctrine or belief in the existence of a God or gods. <i>There are many different forms of theism.</i>
trust	Confer a trust upon. <i>She trusted in the powers of justice.</i>
trusted	Regarded as reliable or truthful. <i>A trusted adviser.</i>
trustful	Having or marked by a total belief in the reliability, truth, or ability of someone. <i>A trustful acceptance of authority.</i>
trusting	Inclined to believe or confide readily; full of trust- Nordhoff & Hall. <i>A shy and trusting child.</i>
trustworthy	Taking responsibility for one's conduct and obligations. <i>Leave a spare key with a trustworthy neighbour.</i>
ungodly	Irreligious or immoral. <i>Ungodly acts.</i>
verisimilitude	The appearance of truth; the quality of seeming to be true. <i>The detail gives the novel some verisimilitude.</i>
