- *(of a spouse or partner) never having a sexual relationship with anyone else.*
- *(of an object) reliable.*
- *Not having sexual relations with anyone except your husband or wife, or your boyfriend or girlfriend.*
- *Marked by fidelity to an original.*

<b>accurate</b>	Of an instrument or method capable of giving accurate information. <i><b>Accurate</b> information about the illness is essential.</i>
<b>close</b>	Close in relevance or relationship. <i>It was very <b>close</b> in the dressing room.</i>
<b>committed</b>	Bound or obligated, as under a pledge to a particular cause, action, or attitude. <i>Esther has a <b>committed</b> boyfriend.</i>
<b>constant</b>	(of a person) unchangingly faithful and dependable. <i>These discs rotate at a <b>constant</b> speed.</i>
<b>dedicated</b>	Solemnly dedicated to or set apart for a high purpose. <i>A team of <b>dedicated</b> doctors.</i>

<b>faultless</b>	Without fault or error. <i><b>Faultless</b> logic.</i>
<b><u>loyal</u></b>	Unwavering in devotion to friend or vow or cause- Campaign song for William Henry Harrison. <i><b>Loyal</b> subjects.</i>
<b><u>precise</u></b>	Used to emphasize that one is referring to an exact and particular thing. <i>The director was <b>precise</b> with his camera positions.</i>
<b><u>staunch</u></b>	(of a wall) of strong or firm construction. <i>A <b>staunch</b> Catholic.</i>
<b>steadfast</b>	Resolutely or dutifully firm and unwavering. <i>A <b>steadfast</b> ally.</i>
<b>strict</b>	Characterized by strictness severity or restraint. <i>A <b>strict</b> interpretation of the law.</i>
<b>true</b>	Of a compass bearing measured relative to true north. <i>That is not <b>true</b> of the people I am talking about.</i>
<b>true-blue</b>	Marked by unswerving loyalty.
<b>unerring</b>	Always right or accurate. <i>An <b>unerring</b> sense of direction.</i>
<b>unswerving</b>	Going directly ahead from one point to another without veering or turning aside. <i><b>Unswerving</b> devotion.</i>
<b><u>unwavering</u></b>	Not showing abrupt variations- Louis Auchincloss. <i>She fixed him with an <b>unwavering</b> stare.</i>

<b>allegiant</b>	Steadfast in devotion (especially to your lawful monarch or government). <i>It is impossible to be <b>allegiant</b> to two opposing forces.</i>
<b>belief</b>	Any cognitive content held as true. <i>Christian <b>beliefs</b>.</i>
<b><u>believable</u></b>	Capable of being believed. <i>She felt that Dawn's story was not quite <b>believable</b>.</i>
<b>believe</b>	Follow a credo have a faith be a believer. <i>There are those on the fringes of the Church who do not really <b>believe</b>.</i>
<b><u>confidant</u></b>	A person with whom one shares a secret or private matter, trusting them not to repeat it to others. <i>A close <b>confidante</b> of the princess.</i>



<b>confiding</b>	Willing to tell someone about a secret or private matter and trust them not to repeat it to others. <i>First she was suspicious then she became <b>confiding</b>.</i>
<b>credibility</b>	The quality of being convincing or believable. <i>The government's loss of <b>credibility</b>.</i>
<b>credible</b>	Able to be believed; convincing. <i>A <b>credible</b> witness.</i>
<b>credulity</b>	A tendency to be too ready to believe that something is real or true. <i>Moneylenders prey upon their <b>credulity</b> and inexperience.</i>
<b>credulous</b>	Showing a lack of judgment or experience. <i>A ceremony staged for <b>credulous</b> tourists.</i>
<b>dependable</b>	Consistent in performance or behavior. <i><b>Dependable</b> in one's habits.</i>
<b>devoted</b>	Very loving or loyal. <i>Large sums <b>devoted</b> to the care of the poor.</i>
<b>dote</b>	Lavish (someone) with affection or gifts. <i>Having an older brother who <b>dots</b> you a lot is the best thing ever.</i>
<b>faith</b>	An institution to express belief in a divine power. <i>Men with strong political <b>faiths</b>.</i>
<b>faithfully</b>	In a loyal manner. <i>He swore that he would serve the king <b>faithfully</b>.</i>
<b>follower</b>	A person who moves or travels behind someone or something. <i>He is a keen <b>follower</b> of football.</i>
<b>gullible</b>	Easily tricked because of being too trusting. <i>At that early age she had been <b>gullible</b> and in love.</i>
<b>loyal</b>	Unwavering in devotion to friend or vow or cause- Campaign song for William Henry Harrison. <i><b>Loyal</b> friends stood by him.</i>
<b>naive</b>	Of or created by one without formal training simple or naive in style. <i>Andy had a sweet <b>naive</b> look when he smiled.</i>
<b>patriotic</b>	Inspired by love for your country. <i>Today's game will be played before a fiercely <b>patriotic</b> crowd.</i>
<b>reliable</b>	A reliable person or thing. <i>A <b>reliable</b> source of information.</i>
<b>rely</b>	Have faith or confidence in. <i>I know I can <b>rely</b> on your discretion.</i>

<b><u>staunch</u></b>	(of a wall) of strong or firm construction. <i>These <b>staunch</b> walls could withstand attack by cannon.</i>
<b>trust</b>	An organization or company managed by trustees. <i>All persons are forbid to <b>trust</b> sailors.</i>
<b><u>trusted</u></b>	(of persons) worthy of trust or confidence. <i>A <b>trusted</b> adviser.</i>
<b>trustful</b>	Inclined to believe or confide readily; full of trust- Nordhoff & Hall. <i>Great brown eye true and <b>trustful</b>.</i>
<b>trusting</b>	Showing or tending to have a belief in a person's honesty or sincerity; not suspicious. <i>A shy and <b>trusting</b> child.</i>
<b><u>trustworthy</u></b>	Worthy of trust or belief. <i>A <b>trustworthy</b> report.</i>
<b>verisimilitude</b>	The appearance of being true or real. <i>The detail gives the novel some <b>verisimilitude</b>.</i>
