<u>abate</u>	Make less active or intense. <i>The storm abated.</i>
<u>away</u>	Out of the way especially away from one's thoughts. <i>The Museum has shifted its emphasis away from research towards exhibitions.</i>
<u>collapse</u>	Collapse due to fatigue an illness or a sudden attack. <i>He had an operation to collapse his lung.</i>
declension	The class to which a noun or adjective is assigned according to the manner of this variation. <i>The declension of the new generation.</i>
decline	(in the grammar of Latin, Greek, and certain other languages) state the forms of (a noun, pronoun, or adjective) corresponding to case, number, and gender. <i>He declined to join the group on a hike.</i>
declivity	A downward slope. <i>A thickly wooded declivity.</i>
decrease	Decrease in size extent or range. <i>He decreased his staff.</i>
descend	Come as if by falling. <i>He was scrupulous in refusing to descend to misrepresentation.</i>
<u>descent</u>	A downward slope or bend. <i>His descents on the manager of any shop he took a fancy to visit.</i>
deteriorate	Become worse or disintegrate. <i>Her condition deteriorated.</i>
diminish	Make or become less. <i>The trial has aged and diminished him.</i>
<u>diminution</u>	Change toward something smaller or lower. <i>The disease shows no signs of diminution.</i>

dive	A shabby or sleazy bar or similar establishment. <i>He got into a fight in some dive.</i>
downfall	A sudden decline in strength or number or importance. <i>The crisis led to the downfall of the government.</i>
downturn	A decline in economic, business, or other activity. <i>The market took a downturn.</i>
drop	A section of theatrical scenery lowered from the flies a drop cloth or drop curtain. <i>Various guest DJs drop quality tunes both old and new.</i>
far	To an advanced stage or point. <i>The far north of Scotland.</i>
going	The act of departing. <i>Don't lose track of your child's comings and goings.</i>
lessen	Make or become less; diminish. <i>The warmth of the afternoon lessened.</i>
mitigation	The action of reducing the severity, seriousness, or painfulness of something. <i>The identification and mitigation of pollution.</i>
plunge	Fall abruptly. <i>For a moment the scene was illuminated then it was plunged back into darkness.</i>
rundown	A concluding summary (as in presenting a case before a law court). <i>He gave his teammates a rundown on the opposition.</i>
slump	A period of substantial failure or decline. <i>United slumped to another one nil defeat.</i>
spill	An instance of a liquid spilling or being spilt. <i>He had a nasty spill on the ice.</i>
stray	A stray person or thing especially a domestic animal. <i>Men who stray are seen as more exciting and desirable.</i>
submerge	Submerge. <i>Pellets were then submersed in agar.</i>
subside	Wear off or die down. <i>The mud subsides when the waters become calm.</i>
topple	Cause to topple or tumble by pushing. <i>The push almost toppled him to the ground.</i>
tumble	Dry washing in a tumble dryer. <i>The machine gently tumbles the clothes in cool air for ten minutes.</i>
