dead	(of a glass or bottle) empty or no longer being used. <i>A dead telephone line.</i>
deceased	Recently dead. <i>The will of Christopher Smith deceased.</i>
degenerate	Having lost the physical, mental, or moral qualities considered normal and desirable; showing evidence of decline. <i>Degenerate offshoots from the main line of vertebrate progress.</i>
depraved	Morally corrupt; wicked. <i>Depraved criminals.</i>
disgraced	Having fallen from favour or a position of power or honour; discredited. <i>The disgraced city financier.</i>
expired	Having come to an end or become void after passage of a period of time. <i>An expired passport.</i>
immoral	Not conforming to accepted standards of morality. <i>They considered colonialism immoral.</i>
impure	Having a physical or moral blemish so as to make impure according to dietary or ceremonial laws. <i>A parasite that thrives in impure water.</i>
loose	Emptying easily or excessively. <i>Pockets bulging with loose change.</i>
murdered	Killed unlawfully. <i>Lay a wreath on murdered Lincoln's bier.</i>
promiscuous	Casual and unrestrained in sexual behavior. <i>Clinton was criticized for his promiscuous solicitation of campaign money.</i>
ruined	Doomed to extinction. <i>His ruined career.</i>
shamed	Suffering shame.
sinful	Characterized by iniquity; wicked because it is believed to be a sin. <i>A sinful waste.</i>
slain	Killed slain is formal or literary as in. <i>A picture of St George and the slain dragon.</i>
slaughtered	Extremely drunk. <i>Jim got absolutely slaughtered.</i>
tainted	Touched by rot or decay. <i>Tainted bacon.</i>

unchaste

Relating to or engaging in sexual activity, especially of an illicit or extramarital nature.

Unchaste conduct.

<u>abate</u>	Make less active or intense. <i>Nothing abated his crusading zeal.</i>
abscise	Remove or separate by abscission.
<u>autumn</u>	The period from the autumn equinox to the winter solstice. <i>The countryside is ablaze with colour in autumn.</i>
<u>collapse</u>	Collapse due to fatigue an illness or a sudden attack. <i>It feels as if the slightest pressure would collapse it.</i>
declension	The inflection of nouns and pronouns and adjectives in Indo-European languages. <i>The declension of the new generation.</i>
decline	A gradual decrease; as of stored charge or current. <i>The company declined to comment.</i>

declivity	A downward slope. <i>A thickly wooded declivity.</i>
decrease	The amount by which something decreases. <i>The aisles were decreased in height.</i>
descend	Make a sudden attack on. <i>The army had descended into chaos.</i>
descent	A downward slope or bend. <i>The ancient empire s slow descent into barbarism.</i>
diminish	Lessen the authority, dignity, or reputation of. <i>The trial has aged and diminished him.</i>
diminution	The statement of a theme in notes of lesser duration (usually half the length of the original). <i>The disease shows no signs of diminution.</i>
dive	A plunge head first into water. <i>The plane dived as it was buffeted by turbulence at 34 000 ft.</i>
down	A chance for a team to advance the ball ending when the ball carrier is tackled or the ball becomes out of play A team must advance at least ten yards in a series of four downs in order to keep possession. <i>I ll put you down for the evening shift.</i>
downturn	A decline in economic, business, or other activity. <i>A downturn in the housing market.</i>
drip	A method of brewing coffee by dripping boiling water through a filter filled with ground coffee beans. <i>His voice dripped sarcasm.</i>
drop	An instance of falling or dropping. <i>The charges against him were dropped last year.</i>
falling	Decreasing in number, amount, intensity, or quality. <i>Falling temperatures.</i>
foliage	Leaf-like architectural ornament. <i>Healthy green foliage.</i>
glide	Make an unpowered flight either in a glider or in an aircraft with engine failure. <i>Slide your hands firmly across the shoulders then glide them down.</i>
lessen	Decrease in size, extent, or range. <i>The warmth of the afternoon lessened.</i>
plunge	A steep and rapid fall. <i>A car swerved to avoid a bus and plunged into a ravine.</i>

- rundown** An analysis or summary of something by a knowledgeable person.
*He gave his teammates a **rundown** on the opposition.*
- sink** Cause a ship to sink.
*You can relax on the veranda as the sun **sinks** low.*
- slump** Sit, lean, or fall heavily and limply.
*He had survived two world wars and a **slump**.*
- spill** Liquid that is spilled.
*Clean up the **spills**.*
- subside** (of the ground) cave in; sink.
*The valleys **subside**.*
- topple** Cause to topple or tumble by pushing.
*She **toppled** over when I touched her.*
- tumble** Dry washing in a tumble dryer.
*The machine gentle **tumbles** the clothes in cool air for ten minutes.*
- weaken** Lessen the strength of.
*His resistance had **weakened**.*
