- *(of a woman) regarded as having lost her honour through engaging in a sexual relationship outside marriage.*

<b>dead</b>	(of a glass or bottle) empty or no longer being used. A <b>dead</b> telephone line.
<b>deceased</b>	Recently dead. The will of Christopher Smith <b>deceased</b> .
<b>degenerate</b>	Having lost the physical, mental, or moral qualities considered normal and desirable; showing evidence of decline. <b>Degenerate</b> offshoots from the main line of vertebrate progress.
<b>depraved</b>	Morally corrupt; wicked. <b>Depraved</b> criminals.
<b>disgraced</b>	Having fallen from favour or a position of power or honour; discredited. The <b>disgraced</b> city financier.
<b>expired</b>	Having come to an end or become void after passage of a period of time. An <b>expired</b> passport.
<b>immoral</b>	Not conforming to accepted standards of morality. They considered colonialism <b>immoral</b> .
<b>impure</b>	Having a physical or moral blemish so as to make impure according to dietary or ceremonial laws. A parasite that thrives in <b>impure</b> water.
<b>loose</b>	Emptying easily or excessively. Pockets bulging with <b>loose</b> change.
<b>murdered</b>	Killed unlawfully. Lay a wreath on <b>murdered</b> Lincoln's bier.
<b>promiscuous</b>	Casual and unrestrained in sexual behavior. Clinton was criticized for his <b>promiscuous</b> solicitation of campaign money.
<b>ruined</b>	Doomed to extinction. His <b>ruined</b> career.
<b>shamed</b>	Suffering shame.
<b>sinful</b>	Characterized by iniquity; wicked because it is believed to be a sin. A <b>sinful</b> waste.
<b>slain</b>	Killed slain is formal or literary as in. A picture of St George and the <b>slain</b> dragon.
<b>slaughtered</b>	Extremely drunk. Jim got absolutely <b>slaughtered</b> .
<b>tainted</b>	Touched by rot or decay. <b>Tainted</b> bacon.

**unchaste** Relating to or engaging in sexual activity, especially of an illicit or extramarital nature.  
***Unchaste*** conduct.

<b>abate</b>	Make less active or intense. <i>Nothing <b>abated</b> his crusading zeal.</i>
<b>abscise</b>	Remove or separate by abscission.
<b>autumn</b>	The period from the autumn equinox to the winter solstice. <i>The countryside is ablaze with colour in <b>autumn</b>.</i>
<b>collapse</b>	Collapse due to fatigue an illness or a sudden attack. <i>It feels as if the slightest pressure would <b>collapse</b> it.</i>
<b>declension</b>	The inflection of nouns and pronouns and adjectives in Indo-European languages. <i>The <b>declension</b> of the new generation.</i>
<b>decline</b>	A gradual decrease; as of stored charge or current. <i>The company <b>declined</b> to comment.</i>

<b>declivity</b>	A downward slope. <i>A thickly wooded <b>declivity</b>.</i>
<b>decrease</b>	The amount by which something decreases. <i>The aisles were <b>decreased</b> in height.</i>
<b>descend</b>	Make a sudden attack on. <i>The army had <b>descended</b> into chaos.</i>
<b>descent</b>	A downward slope or bend. <i>The ancient empire s slow <b>descent</b> into barbarism.</i>
<b>diminish</b>	Lessen the authority, dignity, or reputation of. <i>The trial has aged and <b>diminished</b> him.</i>
<b>diminution</b>	The statement of a theme in notes of lesser duration (usually half the length of the original). <i>The disease shows no signs of <b>diminution</b>.</i>
<b>dive</b>	A plunge head first into water. <i>The plane <b>dived</b> as it was buffeted by turbulence at 34 000 ft.</i>
<b>down</b>	A chance for a team to advance the ball ending when the ball carrier is tackled or the ball becomes out of play A team must advance at least ten yards in a series of four downs in order to keep possession. <i>I ll put you <b>down</b> for the evening shift.</i>
<b>downturn</b>	A decline in economic, business, or other activity. <i>A <b>downturn</b> in the housing market.</i>
<b>drip</b>	A method of brewing coffee by dripping boiling water through a filter filled with ground coffee beans. <i>His voice <b>dripped</b> sarcasm.</i>
<b>drop</b>	An instance of falling or dropping. <i>The charges against him were <b>dropped</b> last year.</i>
<b>falling</b>	Decreasing in number, amount, intensity, or quality. <i><b>Falling</b> temperatures.</i>
<b>foliage</b>	Leaf-like architectural ornament. <i>Healthy green <b>foliage</b>.</i>
<b>glide</b>	Make an unpowered flight either in a glider or in an aircraft with engine failure. <i>Slide your hands firmly across the shoulders then <b>glide</b> them down.</i>
<b>lessen</b>	Decrease in size, extent, or range. <i>The warmth of the afternoon <b>lessened</b>.</i>
<b>plunge</b>	A steep and rapid fall. <i>A car swerved to avoid a bus and <b>plunged</b> into a ravine.</i>

- rundown** An analysis or summary of something by a knowledgeable person.  
*He gave his teammates a **rundown** on the opposition.*
- sink** Cause a ship to sink.  
*You can relax on the veranda as the sun **sinks** low.*
- slump** Sit, lean, or fall heavily and limply.  
*He had survived two world wars and a **slump**.*
- spill** Liquid that is spilled.  
*Clean up the **spills**.*
- subside** (of the ground) cave in; sink.  
*The valleys **subside**.*
- topple** Cause to topple or tumble by pushing.  
*She **toppled** over when I touched her.*
- tumble** Dry washing in a tumble dryer.  
*The machine gentle **tumbles** the clothes in cool air for ten minutes.*
- weaken** Lessen the strength of.  
*His resistance had **weakened**.*
