### **Definitions of "Falling" as an adjective**

- *Decreasing in number, amount, intensity, or quality.*
- *Decreasing in amount or degree.*
- *Moving from a higher to a lower level, typically rapidly and without control.*
- *Becoming lower or less in degree or value.*
- *Coming down freely under the influence of gravity.*

<b>cliff</b>	A steep rock face, especially at the edge of the sea. <i>He stood on a high <b>cliff</b> overlooking the town.</i>
<b>declension</b>	A downward slope or bend. <i>The first <b>declension</b> in Latin.</i>
<b>declivity</b>	A downward slope. <i>A thickly wooded <b>declivity</b>.</i>

<b>descend</b>	(of a feeling) develop suddenly and affect a place or person. <i>The vehicle <b>descended</b> a ramp.</i>
<b>descending</b>	Moving or sloping downwards. <i>A passage of <b>descending</b> chords.</i>
<b>descent</b>	An act of moving downwards, dropping, or falling. <i>The ancient empire s slow <b>descent</b> into barbarism.</i>
<b>dip</b>	Dip into a liquid while eating. <i>He <b>dipped</b> into his pocket.</i>
<b>down</b>	A chance for a team to advance the ball ending when the ball carrier is tackled or the ball becomes out of play A team must advance at least ten yards in a series of four downs in order to keep possession. <i>At night it would cool <b>down</b>.</i>
<b>downturn</b>	A worsening of business or economic activity. <i>The market took a <b>downturn</b>.</i>
<b>downward</b>	On or toward a surface regarded as a base. <i>New rules on sick leave affect employees of all grades from managers <b>downwards</b>.</i>
<b>drop</b>	Score a goal by a drop kick. <i>He doesn t touch a <b>drop</b> during the week.</i>
<b>fall</b>	An act of falling or collapsing. <i>All that <b>falls</b> under the general heading of corruption.</i>
<b>flop</b>	With a flopping sound. <i>They hit the ground with a <b>flop</b>.</i>
<b>grantee</b>	Someone to whom the title of property is transferred.
<b>low</b>	Subdued or brought low in condition or status. <i>The weatherman talked about highs and <b>lows</b>.</i>
<b>parachute</b>	Drop from an aircraft by parachute. <i>The former Conservative minister was controversially <b>parachuted</b> into the safe seat.</i>
<b>plummet</b>	The metal bob of a plumb line. <i>Hardware sales <b>plummeted</b>.</i>
<b>plunge</b>	Suddenly bring into a specified condition or state. <i>Our little daughters whooped as they <b>plunged</b> into the sea.</i>
<b>settle</b>	Settle conclusively come to terms. <i>The wind <b>settled</b> in the West.</i>
<b>sink</b>	Cause a ship to sink. <i>The doctor concluded that the lad was <b>sinking</b> fast.</i>

- sit** Work or act as a baby sitter.  
*They were determined that women jurists should **sit** on the tribunal.*
- splash** Make wet by splashing.  
*He made a great **splash** and then disappeared.*
- submergence** The action of completely covering or obscuring something.  
*Total **submergence** of plants results in heavy crop losses.*
- trickle** (of a liquid) flow in a small stream.  
*The first members of the congregation began to **trickle** in.*
- under** Under water.  
*An **under** secretary.*
- unload** Leave or unload.  
*She hadn t finished **unloading** the car.*
- vertically** At right angles to a horizontal plane; aligned in such a way that the top is directly above the bottom.  
*The bacteria are **vertically** transmitted from mother to offspring.*
