account	A short account of the news. <i>We've reset your password to prevent others from accessing your account.</i>
celebrity	A widely known person. <i>He became a sporting celebrity.</i>
consequence	Importance or relevance. <i>His decision had depressing consequences for business.</i>
distinction	Excellence that sets someone or something apart from others. <i>He gained the highest distinction awarded for excellence in photography.</i>
eminence	An important or distinguished person. <i>An eminence commanding the River Emme.</i>
esteem	The condition of being honored, esteemed, or respected or well regarded. <i>It is held in esteem.</i>
glory	Brilliant, radiant beauty. <i>He valued glory above life itself.</i>

greatness	The property possessed by something or someone of outstanding importance or eminence. <i>Elgar's greatness as a composer.</i>
honour	(in whist) an ace, king, queen, or jack of trumps. <i>I must as a matter of honour avoid any taint of dishonesty.</i>
illustriousness	The property possessed by something or someone of outstanding importance or eminence.
importance	A prominent status. <i>An issue of great importance.</i>
notability	The fact or quality of being notable. <i>A Fleet Street notability.</i>
note	A banknote. <i>He made a note of the appointment.</i>
popularity	The quality of being widely admired or accepted or sought after. <i>He was at the height of his popularity.</i>
<u>prestige</u>	Widespread respect and admiration felt for someone or something on the basis of a perception of their achievements or quality. <i>A prestige car.</i>
prominence	The state of being important, famous, or noticeable. <i>He stood on the rocky prominence.</i>
renown	The condition of being known or talked about by many people; fame. <i>Authors of great renown.</i>
reputation	The general estimation that the public has for a person. <i>His reputation for promiscuity.</i>
repute	The opinion generally held of someone or something; the state of being regarded in a particular way. <i>Pollution could bring the authority's name into bad repute.</i>
standing	The act of assuming or maintaining an erect upright position. <i>A man of high social standing.</i>
stardom	The status of being acknowledged as a star. <i>John Thaw shot to stardom with his portrayal of Inspector Morse.</i>
stature	The distance from head to foot. <i>She was small in stature.</i>

An award or privilege granted as a special honour or as an acknowledgement of merit.

*The hotel has won numerous **accolades**.*

admirable

Arousing or deserving respect and approval.

*His taste was impeccable his health **admirable**.*

admired

Regarded with admiration.

award

The action of giving a payment, compensation, or prize.

*An **award** for bravery.*

celebrated

Having an illustrious past.

*A **celebrated** musician.*

creditable

(of a performance, effort, or action) deserving public acknowledgement and praise but not necessarily outstanding or successful.

*The student s effort on the essay though not outstanding was **creditable**.*

distinguished	Dignified and noble in appearance or manner. <i>His distinguished bearing.</i>
eminence	A slight projection from the surface of the body. <i>The Lord Chancellor canvassed the views of various legal eminences.</i>
esteem	An attitude of admiration or esteem. <i>Many of these qualities are esteemed by managers.</i>
estimable	Deserving of esteem and respect. <i>Estimable assets.</i>
honor	Bestow honor or rewards upon. <i>Honor your parents.</i>
<u>honorable</u>	Worthy of being honored; entitled to honor and respect. <i>An honorable man.</i>
honorary	Of a person holding an honorary title or position. <i>An honorary fellow of the Royal College of Surgeons.</i>
honored	Having an illustrious reputation; respected.
illustrious	Having or conferring glory. <i>An illustrious judge.</i>
<u>influential</u>	An influential person. <i>Her work is influential in feminist psychology.</i>
known	(of a quantity or variable) having a value that can be stated. <i>Plants little known to western science.</i>
noted	Widely known and esteemed. <i>A noted patron of the arts.</i>
posthumous	(of a child) born after the death of its father. <i>A posthumous collection of his articles.</i>
prestigious	Having an illustrious reputation; respected. <i>A prestigious author.</i>
prominence	Relative importance. <i>The steep rocky prominence resembled a snow capped mountain.</i>
renown	The condition of being known or talked about by many people; fame. <i>Authors of great renown.</i>
renowned	Known or talked about by many people; famous. <i>Britain is renowned for its love of animals.</i>
<u>reputable</u>	Having a good reputation. <i>A reputable business.</i>
reputation	The general estimation that the public has for a person. <i>His reputation was tarnished by allegations of bribery.</i>

- repute** Be generally regarded to be or as being (but not definitely the case).
*He s **reputed** to earn 7m per annum.*
- respectable** Large in amount or extent or degree.
*A **respectable** botanical text.*
- respected** Receiving deferential regard.
*A **respected** academic.*
- respectful** Feeling or showing deference and respect.
*They sit in **respectful** silence.*
- stature** Importance or reputation gained by ability or achievement.
*She was small in **stature**.*
