<b>honour</b>	(in whist) an ace, king, queen, or jack of trumps. <i>I must as a matter of <b>honour</b> avoid any taint of dishonesty.</i>
<b>illustriousness</b>	The property possessed by something or someone of outstanding importance or eminence.
<b>importance</b>	A prominent status. <i>An issue of great <b>importance</b>.</i>
<b>notability</b>	The fact or quality of being notable. <i>A Fleet Street <b>notability</b>.</i>
<b>note</b>	A banknote. <i>He made a <b>note</b> of the appointment.</i>
<b>popularity</b>	The quality of being widely admired or accepted or sought after. <i>He was at the height of his <b>popularity</b>.</i>
<b><u>prestige</u></b>	Widespread respect and admiration felt for someone or something on the basis of a perception of their achievements or quality. <i>A <b>prestige</b> car.</i>
<b>prominence</b>	The state of being important, famous, or noticeable. <i>He stood on the rocky <b>prominence</b>.</i>
<b>renown</b>	The condition of being known or talked about by many people; fame. <i>Authors of great <b>renown</b>.</i>
<b>reputation</b>	The general estimation that the public has for a person. <i>His <b>reputation</b> for promiscuity.</i>
<b>repute</b>	The opinion generally held of someone or something; the state of being regarded in a particular way. <i>Pollution could bring the authority s name into bad <b>repute</b>.</i>
<b>standing</b>	The act of assuming or maintaining an erect upright position. <i>A man of high social <b>standing</b>.</i>
<b>stardom</b>	The status of being acknowledged as a star. <i>John Thaw shot to <b>stardom</b> with his portrayal of Inspector Morse.</i>
<b>stature</b>	The distance from head to foot. <i>She was small in <b>stature</b>.</i>

### accolade

An award or privilege granted as a special honour or as an acknowledgement of merit.

*The hotel has won numerous **accolades**.*

### admirable

Arousing or deserving respect and approval.

*His taste was impeccable his health **admirable**.*

### **admired**

Regarded with admiration.

### award

The action of giving a payment, compensation, or prize.

*An **award** for bravery.*

### **celebrated**

Having an illustrious past.

*A **celebrated** musician.*

### **credible**

(of a performance, effort, or action) deserving public acknowledgement and praise but not necessarily outstanding or successful.

*The student's effort on the essay though not outstanding was **credible**.*

<b>distinguished</b>	Dignified and noble in appearance or manner. <i>His <b>distinguished</b> bearing.</i>
<b>eminence</b>	A slight projection from the surface of the body. <i>The Lord Chancellor canvassed the views of various legal <b>eminences</b>.</i>
<b>esteem</b>	An attitude of admiration or esteem. <i>Many of these qualities are <b>esteemed</b> by managers.</i>
<b>estimable</b>	Deserving of esteem and respect. <i><b>Estimable</b> assets.</i>
<b>honor</b>	Bestow honor or rewards upon. <i><b>Honor</b> your parents.</i>
<b><u>honorable</u></b>	Worthy of being honored; entitled to honor and respect. <i>An <b>honorable</b> man.</i>
<b>honorary</b>	Of a person holding an honorary title or position. <i>An <b>honorary</b> fellow of the Royal College of Surgeons.</i>
<b>honored</b>	Having an illustrious reputation; respected.
<b>illustrious</b>	Having or conferring glory. <i>An <b>illustrious</b> judge.</i>
<b><u>influential</u></b>	An influential person. <i>Her work is <b>influential</b> in feminist psychology.</i>
<b>known</b>	(of a quantity or variable) having a value that can be stated. <i>Plants little <b>known</b> to western science.</i>
<b>noted</b>	Widely known and esteemed. <i>A <b>noted</b> patron of the arts.</i>
<b>posthumous</b>	(of a child) born after the death of its father. <i>A <b>posthumous</b> collection of his articles.</i>
<b>prestigious</b>	Having an illustrious reputation; respected. <i>A <b>prestigious</b> author.</i>
<b>prominence</b>	Relative importance. <i>The steep rocky <b>prominence</b> resembled a snow capped mountain.</i>
<b>renown</b>	The condition of being known or talked about by many people; fame. <i>Authors of great <b>renown</b>.</i>
<b>renowned</b>	Known or talked about by many people; famous. <i>Britain is <b>renowned</b> for its love of animals.</i>
<b><u>reputable</u></b>	Having a good reputation. <i>A <b>reputable</b> business.</i>
<b>reputation</b>	The general estimation that the public has for a person. <i>His <b>reputation</b> was tarnished by allegations of bribery.</i>

<b>repute</b>	Be generally regarded to be or as being (but not definitely the case). <i>He s <b>reputed</b> to earn 7m per annum.</i>
<b>respectable</b>	Large in amount or extent or degree. <i>A <b>respectable</b> botanical text.</i>
<b>respected</b>	Receiving deferential regard. <i>A <b>respected</b> academic.</i>
<b>respectful</b>	Feeling or showing deference and respect. <i>They sit in <b>respectful</b> silence.</i>
<b>stature</b>	Importance or reputation gained by ability or achievement. <i>She was small in <b>stature</b>.</i>
