**fantasize** Indulge in fantasies.

## Associations of "Fantasies" (30 Words)

- chimerical** Produced by a wildly fanciful imagination.  
*His Utopia is not a **chimerical** commonwealth but a practical improvement on what already exists.*
- daydream** Indulge in a daydream.  
*She was lost in a **daydream**.*
- delusion** (psychology) an erroneous belief that is held in the face of evidence to the contrary.  
*He has **delusions** of competence.*
- dream** Indulge in daydreams or fantasies about something greatly desired.  
*I have this pipe **dream** about being emperor of the universe.*
- dreamer** A person who has lived in the US without official authorization since coming to the country as a minor. People of this description who met certain conditions would be eligible for a special immigration status under federal legislation first proposed in 2001.  
*A rebellious young **dreamer**.*
- dreamland** Sleep regarded as a world of dreams.  
*She tries to lull herself into **dreamland**.*

<b>envisage</b>	Form a mental picture of (something not yet existing or known). <i>The Rome Treaty <b>envisaged</b> free movement across frontiers.</i>
<b><u>envision</u></b>	Picture to oneself; imagine possible. <i>She <b>envisioned</b> the admiring glances of guests seeing her home.</i>
<b>escapism</b>	The tendency to seek distraction and relief from unpleasant realities, especially by seeking entertainment or engaging in fantasy. <i>Virtual reality offers a form of <b>escapism</b>.</i>
<b>fancied</b>	Formed or conceived by the imagination. <i>A <b>fancied</b> wrong.</i>
<b>fanciful</b>	Having a curiously intricate quality. <i>A <b>fanciful</b> mind.</i>
<b>fiction</b>	A deliberately false or improbable account. <i>They were supposed to be keeping up the <b>fiction</b> that they were happily married.</i>
<b><u>hallucination</u></b>	An experience involving the apparent perception of something not present. <i>His dreams of vast wealth are a <b>hallucination</b>.</i>
<b>hallucinatory</b>	Characterized by or characteristic of hallucination - Jean Stafford. <i>A <b>hallucinatory</b> drug.</i>
<b>illusion</b>	A false idea or belief. <i>He had no <b>illusions</b> about the trouble she was in.</i>
<b>illusive</b>	Based on or having the nature of an illusion. <i>An <b>illusive</b> haven.</i>
<b>illusory</b>	Based on illusion; not real. <i>She knew the safety of her room was <b>illusory</b>.</i>
<b>imaginable</b>	Capable of being imagined. <i>The most spectacular views <b>imaginable</b>.</i>
<b><u>imaginary</u></b>	(of a number or quantity) expressed in terms of the square root of a negative number (usually the square root of -1, represented by i or j). <i>Chris had <b>imaginary</b> conversations with her.</i>
<b><u>imagination</u></b>	The ability to form mental images of things or events. <i>A girl who existed only in my <b>imagination</b>.</i>
<b><u>imagine</u></b>	Suppose or assume. <i>I couldn't <b>imagine</b> what she expected to tell them.</i>
<b>ingratiate</b>	Gain favor with somebody by deliberate efforts. <i>A sycophantic attempt to <b>ingratiate</b> herself with the local aristocracy.</i>
<b>megalomania</b>	A psychological state characterized by delusions of grandeur.

<b><u>paranoia</u></b>	A psychological disorder characterized by delusions of persecution or grandeur. <i>Mild <b>paranoia</b> afflicts all prime ministers.</i>
<b>psychosis</b>	A severe mental disorder in which thought and emotions are so impaired that contact is lost with external reality. <i>The symptoms of <b>psychosis</b>.</i>
<b><u>reverie</u></b>	A fanciful or impractical idea or theory. <i>He defended and explained all the <b>reveries</b> of astrology.</i>
<b><u>surreal</u></b>	Having the qualities of surrealism bizarre. <i>The incongruous imagery in <b>surreal</b> art and literature.</i>
<b><u>tale</u></b>	A message that tells the particulars of an act or occurrence or course of events; presented in writing or drama or cinema or as a radio or television program. <i>She enjoyed hearing others tell their <b>tales</b>.</i>
<b><u>visionary</u></b>	Thinking about or planning the future with imagination or wisdom. <i><b>Visionary</b> dreams.</i>
<b><u>visualize</u></b>	View the outline of by means of an X-ray. <i>It is not easy to <b>visualize</b> the future.</i>
