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## Associations of "Far and few between" (30 Words)

<b>about</b>	(of quantities) imprecise but fairly close to correct. <i>There was a lot of flu <b>about</b>.</i>
<b>almost</b>	(of actions or states) slightly short of or not quite accomplished; all but. <i>Blues jazz he can play <b>almost</b> anything.</i>
<b>approximate</b>	Located close together. <i>The <b>approximate</b> time was 10 o'clock.</i>
<b>approximately</b>	Imprecise but fairly close to correct. <i>Lasted <b>approximately</b> an hour.</i>
<b>approximation</b>	The act of bringing near or bringing together especially the cut edges of tissue. <i>Newspapers gave only an <b>approximation</b> of the actual events.</i>
<b>approximative</b>	(of a method, description, etc.) giving only an approximation to something. <i>A crudely <b>approximative</b> outline.</i>
<b>around</b>	All around or on all sides. <i>Frigid weather the year <b>around</b>.</i>
<b>broadly</b>	In a wide fashion. <i>He interprets the law <b>broadly</b>.</i>
<b>closely</b>	In a careful and attentive way. <i>The real world injuries <b>closely</b> mirrored the university's experimental data.</i>
<b>closeness</b>	The quality of being done in an attentive and thorough way. <i>Their <b>closeness</b> grew as the night wore on.</i>
<b>contiguous</b>	Next or together in sequence. <i>The Southern Ocean is <b>contiguous</b> with the Atlantic.</i>
<b>equidistant</b>	The same distance apart at every point. <i>The line joins together all points which are <b>equidistant</b> from the two axes.</i>

<b>further</b>	In addition or furthermore. <i>Wages have been driven down even <b>further</b>.</i>
<b>least</b>	Used in names of very small animals and plants e.g. least shrew. <i>He had a knack for showing up when he was <b>least</b> expected.</i>
<b>little</b>	Small and of little importance. <i>He reminded me a <b>little</b> of my parents.</i>
<b>locality</b>	An area or neighbourhood. <i>It is a rugged <b>locality</b>.</i>
<b>locally</b>	By a particular locality. <i>The service control function is installed <b>locally</b>.</i>
<b>more</b>	Forming the comparative of adjectives and adverbs especially those of more than one syllable. <i>We have no <b>more</b> bananas.</i>
<b>near</b>	Located on the nearside of a vehicle. <i>My sisters and brothers are <b>near</b> and dear.</i>
<b>nearby</b>	Close by. <i>The <b>nearby</b> towns.</i>
<b>nearly</b>	(of actions or states) slightly short of or not quite accomplished; all but. <i>A rise of <b>nearly</b> 25 per cent.</i>
<b>neighboring</b>	Having a common boundary or edge; abutting; touching. <i><b>Neighboring</b> cities.</i>
<b>perigee</b>	Periapsis in Earth orbit; the point in its orbit where a satellite is nearest to the Earth.
<b>perihelion</b>	Periapsis in solar orbit; the point in the orbit of a planet or comet where it is nearest to the sun. <i>Today Mercury is at <b>perihelion</b>.</i>
<b>proximate</b>	Nearly accurate approximate. <i>News of his <b>proximate</b> arrival.</i>
<b>proximity</b>	A Gestalt principle of organization holding that (other things being equal) objects or events that are near to one another (in space or time) are perceived as belonging together as a unit. <i>Do not operate microphones in close <b>proximity</b> to television sets.</i>
<b>roughly</b>	With roughness or violence rough is an informal variant for roughly. <i>The narrative is <b>roughly</b> speaking contemporary with the earliest of the gospels.</i>
<b>some</b>	To some extent quite a lot. <i>That was <b>some</b> party.</i>

- throughout** Used to refer to cited works.  
*The house is in good order **throughout**.*
- vicinity** The area near or surrounding a particular place.  
*The plane crashed in the **vicinity** of Asheville.*
