The property of having material worth (often indicated by the amount of money something would bring if sold).

### **daily bread**

A newspaper that is published every day.

### **fare payer**

The sum charged for riding in a public conveyance.

### **fee**

An interest in land capable of being inherited.  
*They were faced with legal **fees** of 3000.*

<b>food</b>	Any nutritious substance that people or animals eat or drink or that plants absorb in order to maintain life and growth. <i>Music is <b>food</b> for the soul.</i>
<b>foodstuffs</b>	(usually plural) consumer goods sold by a grocer.
<b>levy</b>	An act of levying a tax fee or fine. <i>The trade union political <b>levy</b>.</i>
<b>meals</b>	Coarsely ground foodstuff; especially seeds of various cereal grasses or pulse.
<b>menu</b>	A list of dishes available in a restaurant. <i>They worked rapidly down the <b>menu</b> of reports.</i>
<b><u>nourishment</u></b>	The action of nourishing someone or something. <i>She was starved of emotional <b>nourishment</b>.</i>
<b>nutriment</b>	Nourishment; sustenance. <i>The bees reprocess the food and extract the last particle of <b>nutriment</b> from it.</i>
<b>payment</b>	An amount paid or payable. <i>Ask for a discount for <b>payment</b> by cash.</i>
<b>price</b>	Cost of bribing someone. <i>He puts a high <b>price</b> on his services.</i>
<b>provisions</b>	A stipulated condition.
<b>refreshments</b>	Activity that refreshes and recreates; activity that renews your health and spirits by enjoyment and relaxation. <i>Time for rest and refreshment by the pool.</i>
<b>rider</b>	An addition or amendment to a bill at its third reading. <i>She was a skilled <b>rider</b>.</i>
<b><u>sustenance</u></b>	Food and drink regarded as a source of strength; nourishment. <i>The <b>sustenance</b> of parliamentary democracy.</i>
<b>tariff</b>	A list of import or export tariffs. <i>The reduction of trade barriers and import <b>tariffs</b>.</i>
<b>ticket price</b>	A list of candidates nominated by a political party to run for election to public offices.
<b><u>toll</u></b>	The number of deaths or casualties arising from a natural disaster, conflict, accident, etc. <i>She heard the distant <b>toll</b> of church bells.</i>
<b>transport cost</b>	A mechanism that transports magnetic tape across the read/write heads of a tape playback/recorder.



**transportation** The United States federal department that institutes and coordinates national transportation programs created in 1966.

*Transportation on the site includes a monorail.*

**traveller** A person who holds New Age values and leads an itinerant and unconventional lifestyle.

*Business travellers.*

**voyager** A journey to some distant place.

<b>come</b>	Come forth. <i>He <b>comes</b> from humble origins.</i>
<b>come out</b>	Come under, be classified or included.
<b>cope</b>	(of a person) deal effectively with something difficult. <i>It all got too much for me and I couldn't <b>cope</b>.</i>
<b>develop</b>	Cause to grow and differentiate in ways conforming to its natural development. <i>We have <b>developed</b> a new theory of evolution.</i>
<b>do</b>	Get something done. <i>The special formula continues to beautify your tan when the day is <b>done</b>.</i>
<b>get along</b>	Cause to move; cause to be in a certain position or condition.
<b>get on</b>	Make children.

<b>make out</b>	Make by combining materials and parts.
<b>manage</b>	Be the manager of a sports team or a performer. <i>He could not <b>manage</b> 24 March after all.</i>
<b>muddle along</b>	Mix up or confuse.
<b>muddle through</b>	Make into a puddle.
<b><u>proceed</u></b>	Continue a certain state, condition, or activity. <i>His claim that all power <b>proceeded</b> from God.</i>
<b>progress</b>	Cause a task or undertaking to make progress. <i>Work on the pond is <b>progressing</b>.</i>
<b><u>survive</u></b>	Continue to live and avoid dying. <i>These superstitions <b>survive</b> in the backwaters of America.</i>
<b>turn out</b>	Become officially one year older.
<b>work out</b>	Provoke or excite.

<b>auto</b>	A motor vehicle with four wheels; usually propelled by an internal combustion engine. <i>The <b>auto</b> industry.</i>
<b>bilk</b>	Obtain (money) fraudulently. <i>He <b>bilked</b> his creditors.</i>
<b>billing</b>	The process of preparing or sending invoices. <i>He shared top <b>billing</b> with his wife.</i>
<b>buck</b>	Of a horse to perform a buck. <i><b>Buck</b> the trend.</i>
<b>bus</b>	Ride in a bus. <i>The fenders had fallen off that old <b>bus</b>.</i>

<b>demurrage</b>	A charge payable to the owner of a chartered ship on failure to load or discharge the ship within the time agreed.
<b>driver</b>	A golfer who hits the golf ball with a driver. <i>Learner <b>drivers</b>.</i>
<b>expense</b>	Offset an item of expenditure as an expense against taxable income. <i>Conference rooms were equipped at great <b>expense</b>.</i>
<b>expressway</b>	An urban motorway.
<b>fee</b>	An estate of land, especially one held on condition of feudal service. <i>Tuition <b>fees</b> have now reached 9000 a year.</i>
<b>invoice</b>	Send an invoice for goods or services provided. <i>She <b>invoiced</b> the company for her expenses.</i>
<b>jalopy</b>	An old car in a dilapidated condition. <i>His father got worried about him driving that old <b>jalopy</b> it wasn't safe.</i>
<b>motorist</b>	Someone who drives (or travels in) an automobile.

<b>pay</b>	The money paid to someone for regular work. <i>Crime doesn't <b>pay</b>.</i>
<b>pickup</b>	A series of introductory notes leading into the opening part of a tune. <i>She needed the <b>pickup</b> that coffee always gave her.</i>
<b>plugger</b>	Someone who is an active supporter and advocate.
<u>salary</u>	Pay a salary to. <i>He received a <b>salary</b> of 24 000.</i>
<b>taxation</b>	Government income due to taxation. <i>It should be financed out of <b>taxation</b>.</i>
<b>taxi</b>	Take a taxi as a means of transport. <i>He <b>taxied</b> the plane to the very end of the airstrip.</i>
<u>ticket</u>	Provide with a ticket for passage or admission. <i>If you have opened a <b>ticket</b> and it's not yet been resolved there's no need to open a new one.</i>
<u>token</u>	Insignificantly small a matter of form only tokenish is informal. <i>The next black actor or actress selected won't know if it's because of their ability and performance or if they're just a <b>token</b>.</i>
<u>toll</u>	Charge a toll for the use of a bridge or road. <i>Motorway <b>tolls</b>.</i>
<b>tollbooth</b>	A town hall.
<b>van</b>	A caravan. <i>Delivery <b>vans</b> can't pull in and are holding up the traffic behind them.</i>
<u>vessel</u>	A craft designed for water transportation. <i>Lord use this lowly <b>vessel</b> let me serve You as You will.</i>
