- agriculture** The science or practice of farming, including cultivation of the soil for the growing of crops and the rearing of animals to provide food, wool, and other products.
- agronomist** An expert in soil management and field-crop production.
***Agronomists** worry that hot weather combined with dry conditions can hamper pollination.*
- agronomy** The science of soil management and crop production.

arable	Arable land or crops. <i>Open arable fields.</i>
botanist	A biologist specializing in the study of plants. <i>A botanist announced he d bred a new and beautiful variety of orchid.</i>
cowhand	A hired hand who tends cattle and performs other duties on horseback.
crop	Yield crops. <i>The southern areas are cropped in cotton.</i>
cultivate	Grow or maintain (living cells or tissue) in culture. <i>It helps if you go out of your way to cultivate the local people.</i>
cultivation	Refinement and good education. <i>The cultivation of arable crops.</i>
cultivator	A farm implement used to break up the surface of the soil (for aeration and weed control and conservation of moisture). <i>They were herders of cattle and cultivators of corn.</i>
culturally	With regard to a culture. <i>A culturally vibrant city.</i>
farm	Workplace consisting of farm buildings and cultivated land as a unit. <i>A half timbered farm.</i>
farmer	United States civil rights leader who in 1942 founded the Congress of Racial Equality (born in 1920).
farmhouse	A house attached to a farm, especially the main house in which the farmer lives. <i>A farmhouse kitchen.</i>
farmland	Arable land that is worked by plowing and sowing and raising crops.
farmstead	A farm together with its buildings.
gardening	The cultivation of plants. <i>Her love of gardening.</i>
horticulture	The cultivation of plants. <i>Maize and manioc horticulture.</i>
husbandry	Management and conservation of resources. <i>All aspects of animal husbandry.</i>
idyll	An episode of such pastoral or romantic charm as to qualify as the subject of a poetic idyll. <i>The rural idyll remains strongly evocative in most industrialized societies.</i>
peasant	One of a (chiefly European) class of agricultural laborers. <i>Peasant farmers.</i>

potato	The plant of the nightshade family which produces potatoes on underground runners. <i>Mashed potato.</i>
rancher	A person who owns or runs a ranch.
rural	In, relating to, or characteristic of the countryside rather than the town. <i>Rural people.</i>
rustic	An unsophisticated country person. <i>Rustic capitals were much easier to form.</i>
uncultivated	Not prepared for raising crops. <i>These meadowlands have lain uncultivated for centuries.</i>
villager	A person who lives in a village. <i>Angry villagers have been forced to leave flooded areas.</i>
yeoman	A member of the yeomanry force.
