- *The ultimate agency regarded as predetermining the course of events (often personified as a woman.*
- *An event (or a course of events) that will inevitably happen in the future.*

- *The course of someone's life, or the outcome of a situation for someone or something, seen as outside their control.*
- *The development of events outside a person's control, regarded as predetermined by a supernatural power.*
- *The inescapable death of a person.*

<u><b>fortune</b></u>	An unknown and unpredictable phenomenon that leads to a favorable outcome. <i>I spent a <b>fortune</b> on drink.</i>
<b>future</b>	Bulk commodities bought or sold at an agreed price for delivery at a specified future date. <i>We plan on getting married in the near <b>future</b>.</i>
<b>god's will</b>	A fixed and persistent intent or purpose.
<b>issue</b>	Supplies as food or clothing or ammunition issued by the government. <i>I like him though I have some <b>issues</b> with the guy.</i>
<u><b>kismet</b></u>	(Islam) the will of Allah. <i>What chance did I stand against <b>kismet</b>.</i>
<b>lot</b>	A plot of land assigned for sale or for a particular use. <i>Schemes to improve the <b>lot</b> of the disadvantaged.</i>
<b>luck</b>	An unknown and unpredictable phenomenon that causes an event to result one way rather than another. <i>I don't like Friday it's bad <b>luck</b>.</i>



<b><u>nemesis</u></b>	(Greek mythology) the goddess of divine retribution and vengeance. <i>One risks <b>nemesis</b> by uttering such words.</i>
<b>one's lot in life</b>	A parcel of land having fixed boundaries.
<b>outcome</b>	The way a thing turns out; a consequence. <i>It is the <b>outcome</b> of the vote that counts.</i>
<b><u>portion</u></b>	A part of a whole. <i>He could repeat large <b>portions</b> of Shakespeare.</i>
<b><u>providence</u></b>	The prudence and care exercised by someone in the management of resources. <i>They found their trust in divine <b>providence</b> to be a source of comfort.</i>
<b>the stars</b>	Any celestial body visible (as a point of light) from the Earth at night.
<b>the weird sisters</b>	Fate personified; any one of the three Weird Sisters.
<b>upshot</b>	A phenomenon that follows and is caused by some previous phenomenon. <i>The <b>upshot</b> of the meeting was that he was on the next plane to New York.</i>
<b>what is written in the stars</b>	A light strong brittle grey toxic bivalent metallic element.

<b><u>destined</u></b>	Certain to meet (a particular fate). <i>They were <b>destined</b> to become diplomats.</i>
<b><u>destiny</u></b>	The hidden power believed to control future events; fate. <i>We are helpless in the face of <b>destiny</b>.</i>
<b><u>doom</u></b>	(in Christian belief) the Last Judgement. <i>Fuel was spilling out of the damaged wing and the aircraft was <b>doomed</b>.</i>
<b>fabled</b>	Celebrated in fable or legend. <i>The <b>fabled</b> kingdom.</i>
<b>fatalism</b>	A philosophical doctrine holding that all events are predetermined in advance for all time and human beings are powerless to change them. <i>He experienced a sense of <b>fatalism</b> that kept his fear at bay.</i>
<b>fatalist</b>	Anyone who submits to the belief that they are powerless to change their destiny. <i>A <b>fatalist</b> person.</i>
<b>foreordination</b>	Being determined in advance; especially the doctrine (usually associated with Calvin) that God has foreordained every event throughout eternity (including the final salvation of mankind).
<b><u>fortune</u></b>	The success or failure of a person or enterprise over a period of time. <i>He inherited a substantial <b>fortune</b>.</i>
<b>funeral</b>	A sermon delivered at a funeral. <i>A <b>funeral</b> service.</i>
<b>future</b>	A verb tense that expresses actions or states in the future. <i>He d decided that there was no <b>future</b> in the gang.</i>
<b><u>impending</u></b>	Close in time; about to occur. <i>His <b>impending</b> retirement.</i>
<b>intestacy</b>	The situation of being or dying without a legally valid will.
<b>intestate</b>	A person who has died without having made a will. <i>He died <b>intestate</b>.</i>
<b><u>karma</u></b>	(Hinduism and Buddhism) the effects of a person's actions that determine his destiny in his next incarnation.
<b><u>kismet</u></b>	Destiny; fate. <i>What chance did I stand against <b>kismet</b>.</i>
<b>last</b>	On the last occasion before the present previously. <i>It s our <b>last</b> hope.</i>
<b>luck</b>	Your overall circumstances or condition in life (including everything that happens to you). <i>It was my good <b>luck</b> to be there.</i>

<b>mortal</b>	Very great. <i>A <b>mortal</b> foe.</i>
<b><u>mortality</u></b>	The quality or state of being mortal. <i>The work is increasingly haunted by thoughts of <b>mortality</b>.</i>
<b>nirvana</b>	(Hinduism and Buddhism) the beatitude that transcends the cycle of reincarnation; characterized by the extinction of desire and suffering and individual consciousness. <i>The days of socialist <b>nirvana</b> in Europe are over.</i>
<b>predestination</b>	(theology) being determined in advance; especially the doctrine (usually associated with Calvin) that God has foreordained every event throughout eternity (including the final salvation of mankind).
<b>predestine</b>	Decree or determine beforehand. <i>Calvinists believed that every person was <b>predestined</b> by God to go to heaven or to hell.</i>
<b>rip</b>	The act of rending or ripping or splitting something. <i>The truck was struck by lightning and had a hole <b>ripped</b> out of its roof.</i>
<b><u>superstition</u></b>	A widely held but irrational belief in supernatural influences, especially as leading to good or bad luck, or a practice based on such a belief. <i>She touched her locket for luck a <b>superstition</b> she d had since childhood.</i>
