fictive Created by the imagination.

The novel s **fictive** universe.

forged Reproduced fraudulently.

A **forged** twenty dollar bill.

fraudulent Intended to deceive.

Fraudulent psychics.

imaginary

Not based on fact; unreal- F.D.Roosevelt.

A small child s imaginary friends.

(of something unreal or untrue) believed to exist or be so.

imagined
They suffered from ill health real or imagined throughout their lives.

Not genuine or real being an imitation of the genuine article.

Decorated with **imitation** palm leaves.

(of a word) reproducing a natural sound (e.g. fizz) or pronounced in a way

that is thought to correspond to the appearance or character of the object

or action described (e.g. blob).

Acting is an **imitative** art.

made-up Having been paved.make-believe Imagined as in a play.

Not authentic or real, but without the intention to deceive.

Mock GCSEs.

Based on or told of in traditional stories; lacking factual basis or historical

mythical validity.

A **mythical** age of contentment and social order.

pretended Adopted in order to deceive.

Eating ice cream with **pretended** unconcern.

Not genuine; spurious or sham.

We are talking about real journalists and not the **pseudo** kind.

sham Adopted in order to deceive.

A clergyman who arranged a **sham** marriage.



simulated Manufactured in imitation of some other material.

A **simulated** leather handbag.

spurious Intended to deceive.

Separating authentic and **spurious** claims.

unreal Lacking material form or substance unreal.

Ghosts and other **unreal** entities.

A largely **factitious** national identity.

faithless Without religious faith.

fake Fraudulent; having a misleading appearance.

He **fake**d his own death.

feigned Simulated or pretended; insincere.

Her eyes widened with **feigned** shock.

A mock attack or movement in warfare, made in order to distract or deceive

feint an enemy.

The midfielder **feint**ed to shoot.

forgery A copy that is represented as the original.

He was found guilty of **forgery**.

Subject to a playful hoax or joke.

A **hoax** 999 call.

A person who professes beliefs and opinions that he or she does not hold in

order to conceal his or her real feelings or motives.

hypocriteThe story tells of respectable Ben who turns out to be a cheat and a

hypocrite.

(often used in combination) not genuine but having the appearance of.

She shams indifference.

simulate Create a representation or model of.

simulated (of an emotion) pretended or feigned. She howled in simulated anguish.

specious Misleading in appearance, especially misleadingly attractive.

A **specious** claim.

Ostensibly valid, but not actually valid.

spurious The dominions of both rulers passed away to their **spurious** or doubtful

offspring.

synthetic A synthetic material or chemical especially a textile fibre.
