- *An advantage to the benefit of someone or something.*



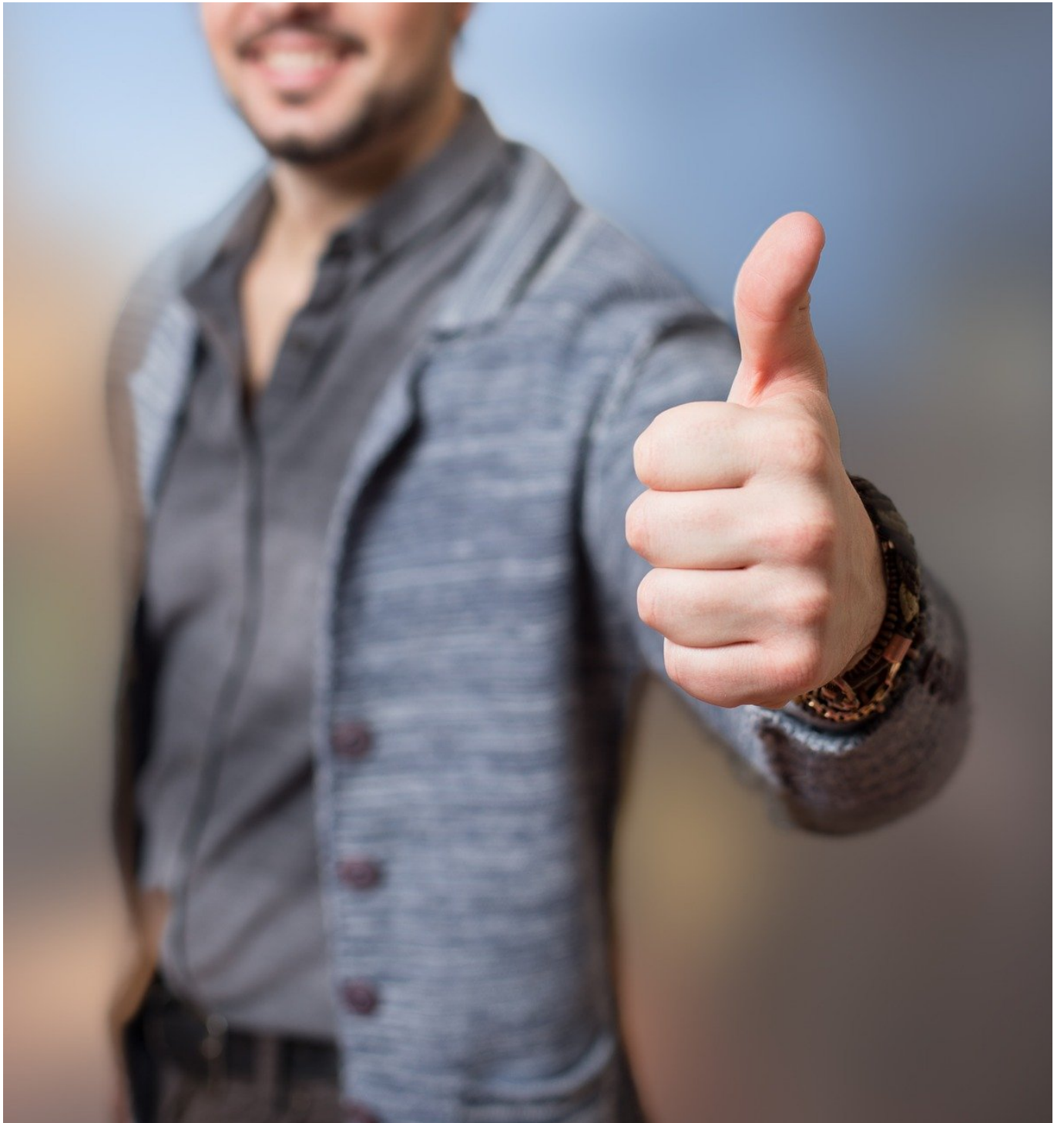
Synonyms of "Favor" as a noun (3 Words)

- party favor** An organization to gain political power.
- party favour** An occasion on which people can assemble for social interaction and entertainment.

Definitions of "Favor" as a verb

According to the [Oxford Dictionary of English](#), "favor" as a verb can have the following definitions:

- *Bestow a privilege upon.*
- *Treat gently or carefully.*
- *Consider as the favorite.*
- *Promote over another.*



Synonyms of "Favor" as a verb (3 Words)

favour Work to the advantage of.
*Critics argued that the policy **favoured** the private sector.*

prefer Give preference to one creditor over another.
We **prefer** sleeping outside.

privilege Bestow a privilege upon.
Barristers are **privileged** from arrest going to coming from and abiding in court.



Usage Examples of "Favor" as a verb

- *The local team was favored.*
- *He favors his second daughter.*

- affable** Friendly, good-natured, or easy to talk to.
*An **affable** smile.*
- amiable** Disposed to please- Hal Hinson.
*The **amiable** young man greeted me enthusiastically.*
- amity** A state of friendship and cordiality.
*The presence of French troops in Scotland had produced hostility rather than **amity**.*
- approval** The formal act of approving.
*Step parents need to win a child s **approval**.*

benefic	Beneficent or kindly. <i>A benefic force.</i>
beneficence	The quality of being kind or helpful or generous.
benignity	Kindness or tolerance toward others. <i>His air of benignity.</i>
blessing	A ceremonial prayer invoking divine protection. <i>May God continue to give us his blessing.</i>
compassion	Sympathetic pity and concern for the sufferings or misfortunes of others. <i>The victims should be treated with compassion.</i>
congenial	Suitable to your needs- T.L.Peacock. <i>He went back to a climate more congenial to his cold stony soul.</i>
cordiality	A cordial disposition.
courteous	Characterized by courtesy and gracious good manners-Francis Bacon. <i>A courteous young man.</i>
courtesy	A courteous or respectful or considerate remark. <i>Links to the manufacturers websites are provided as a courtesy to the user.</i>
curtsy	Make a curtsy usually done only by girls and women as a sign of respect. <i>She bobbed a curtsy to him.</i>
favorable	Presaging or likely to bring good luck. <i>A favorable reply.</i>
friendliness	A feeling of liking for another person; enjoyment in their company. <i>I was overwhelmed by the friendliness of the people here.</i>
friendly	Inclined to help or support; not antagonistic or hostile. <i>A friendly neighborhood.</i>
generosity	The trait of being willing to give your money or time. <i>Diners certainly cannot complain about the generosity of portions.</i>
genial	Diffusing warmth and friendliness. <i>A genial host.</i>
goodwill	The established reputation of a business regarded as a quantifiable asset and calculated as part of its value when it is sold. <i>A goodwill gesture.</i>
inclination	(astronomy) the angle between the plane of the orbit and the plane of the ecliptic stated in degrees. <i>Her inclination is for classical music.</i>
kind	Having or showing a tender and considerate and helpful nature; used especially of persons and their behavior. <i>Our neighbor was very kind about the window our son broke.</i>

kindness	The quality of being friendly, generous, and considerate. <i>He thanked them for their kindness and support.</i>
opt	Make a choice from a range of possibilities. <i>Consumers will opt for low priced goods.</i>
<u>penchant</u>	A strong or habitual liking for something or tendency to do something. <i>The Irish have a penchant for blarney.</i>
<u>predilection</u>	A predisposition in favor of something. <i>A predilection for expensive cars.</i>
<u>prefer</u>	Give preference to one creditor over another. <i>Some people prefer camping to staying in hotels.</i>
preference	A thing preferred. <i>My own preference is for good literature.</i>
privilege	Grant a privilege or privileges to. <i>Barristers are privileged from arrest going to coming from and abiding in court.</i>
requisition	Make a formal request for official services. <i>I had to make various requisitions for staff and accommodation.</i>
