Favorable as an Adjective

Definitions of "Favorable" as an adjective

According to the [Oxford Dictionary of English](#), “favorable” as an adjective can have the following definitions:

- *Giving an advantage.*
- *Inclined to help or support; not antagonistic or hostile.*
- *Encouraging or approving or pleasing.*
- *Presaging or likely to bring good luck or a good outcome.*
- *Occurring at a convenient or suitable time.*
- *(of winds or weather) tending to promote or facilitate.*
- *Tending to promote or facilitate.*
- *Presaging or likely to bring good luck.*



Synonyms of "Favorable" as an adjective (5 Words)

- advantageous** Appropriate for achieving a particular end; implies a lack of concern for fairness.
*Socially **advantageous** to entertain often.*
- favourable** (of weather, or a period of time judged in terms of its weather) fine.
*The settlement was **favourable** to the unions.*
- golden** (of an opportunity) very favourable.
*Curls of glossy **golden** hair.*
- lucky** Presaging or likely to bring good luck or a good outcome.
*A **lucky** man.*
- prosperous** Marked by peace and prosperity.
*We wish you a Merry Christmas and a **prosperous** New Year.*



Usage Examples of "Favorable" as an adjective

- *Made a favorable impression.*
- *Listened with a favorable ear.*
- *A favorable reply.*
- *He received a favorable rating.*
- *The days were fair and the winds were favorable.*
- *A favorable time to ask for a raise.*

amicable	Characterized by friendship and good will. <i>An amicable settlement of the dispute.</i>
amity	Friendly relations. <i>The presence of French troops in Scotland had produced hostility rather than amity.</i>
approving	The formal act of approving. <i>The wine drew approving comments from across the table.</i>
auspicious	Auguring favorable circumstances and good luck. <i>He was respectful to his auspicious customers.</i>
benign	(of a tumour) not malignant. <i>A benign smile.</i>
companionable	Friendly and sociable. <i>A companionable young man.</i>
complaisant	Showing a cheerful willingness to do favors for others. <i>To close one's eyes like a complaisant husband whose wife has taken a lover.</i>
congenial	Suitable to your needs. <i>His need for some congenial company.</i>
cordial	Politely warm and friendly. <i>I earned his cordial loathing.</i>
cordiality	A cordial disposition.
courteous	Characterized by courtesy and gracious good manners-Francis Bacon. <i>A courteous young man.</i>
dearly	With affection. <i>She loved him dearly.</i>
extroverted	Not introspective; examining what is outside yourself. <i>She is extroverted confident and gives rousing lectures.</i>
favor	A feeling of favorable regard. <i>The outcome was in his favor.</i>
friendly	Easy to understand or use. <i>A friendly neighborhood.</i>
genial	Of or relating to the chin or median part of the lower jaw. <i>The genial sunshine.</i>
gregarious	(of animals) living in flocks or loosely organized communities. <i>Gregarious species forage in flocks from colonies or roosts.</i>
hearty	Without reservation. <i>Hearty support.</i>

kindly	Kind, warm-hearted, or gentle. <i>Never mind she said kindly.</i>
lucky	Having, bringing, or resulting from good luck. <i>You had a very lucky escape.</i>
obliging	Willing to do a service or kindness; helpful. <i>The obliging waiter was in no hurry for us to leave.</i>
optimism	The doctrine, especially as set forth by Leibniz, that this world is the best of all possible worlds. <i>The talks had been amicable and there were grounds for optimism.</i>
pacific	The largest ocean in the world. <i>The result of this pacific policy was that no troops were called up.</i>
peaceable	Inclined or disposed to peace. <i>An industrious peaceable people.</i>
propitious	Presenting favorable circumstances; likely to result in or show signs of success. <i>Propitious gales speeded us along.</i>
sociable	An S-shaped couch for two people who sit partially facing each other. <i>A very sociable little village.</i>
unthreatening	Not unfriendly or threatening. <i>A quiet and unthreatening place.</i>
