practicability	The quality of being usable. <i>The practicability of his ideas has nothing to do with their truth.</i>
practicality	The aspects of a situation that involve the actual doing or experience of something rather than theories or ideas. <i>There are still major doubts about the practicality of the proposal.</i>
reasonableness	Sound judgement; fairness. <i>Days which demand wise restraint and calm reasonableness.</i>
sensibleness	The quality of showing good sense or practical judgment.

viability Ability to survive or live successfully.
*An interest in the long term **viability** of British companies.*

able	Having considerable skill proficiency or intelligence. <i>Children as young as 14 can be extremely capable and dependable.</i>
analyze	Make a mathematical, chemical, or grammatical analysis of; break down into components or essential features. <i>Analyze a sentence.</i>
applicant	A person who makes a formal application for something, especially a job. <i>Applicants for the degree course.</i>
appraisal	A formal assessment, typically in an interview, of the performance of an employee over a particular period. <i>She carried out a thorough appraisal.</i>
assessment	The action of assessing someone or something. <i>The assessment of educational needs.</i>
availability	The state of being otherwise unoccupied; freedom to do something. <i>The availability of social housing varies widely in rural areas.</i>
censor	Subject to political religious or moral censorship. <i>The letters she received were censored.</i>
conceivably	It is conceivable or imaginable that. <i>It may conceivably cause liver disease.</i>
critically	To an extreme degree with a risk of death. <i>The reader must evaluate critically every article he or she reviews.</i>
dissect	Methodically cut up (a body or plant) in order to study its internal parts. <i>He dissected the Prime Minister's statement and revealed the truth behind it.</i>
estimation	A judgment of the qualities of something or somebody. <i>Estimations of protein concentrations.</i>
evaluate	Evaluate or estimate the nature quality ability extent or significance of. <i>Substitute numbers in a simple formula and evaluate the answer.</i>
examine	Question or examine thoroughly and closely. <i>This forced us to examine every facet of our business.</i>

investigate	Investigate scientifically. <i>Future studies will investigate whether long term use of the drugs could prevent cancer.</i>
likelihood	The state or fact of something's being likely; probability. <i>Young people who can see no likelihood of finding employment.</i>
plumb	Conforming to the direction of a plumb line. <i>I m plumb or plum tuckered out.</i>
possibility	A thing that may be chosen or done out of several possible alternatives. <i>Relegation remains a distinct possibility.</i>
possible	The highest possible score especially in a shooting competition. <i>Possible uses of nuclear power.</i>
potential	Having or showing the capacity to develop into something in the future. <i>A young broadcaster with great potential.</i>
practicable	Able to be used; useful. <i>Signal processing can let you transform a signal into a practicable form.</i>
probabilistic	Of or relating to or based on probability. <i>The main approaches are either rule based or probabilistic.</i>
probe	Examine physically with or as if with a probe. <i>What right had he to probe into her personal life.</i>
qualify	Make fit or prepared. <i>His sincere piety his large heart always qualify his errors.</i>
reexamine	Look at again; examine again.
scan	An act of scanning someone or something. <i>We scan the papers for news from the trouble spots.</i>
scrutinize	Examine carefully for accuracy with the intent of verification. <i>Customers were warned to scrutinize the small print.</i>
underrate	Underestimate the extent, value, or importance of (someone or something). <i>They vastly underrate their own players.</i>
valuation	An appraisal of the value of something. <i>It is wise to obtain an independent valuation.</i>
viable	Capable of being done with means at hand and circumstances as they are. <i>What if the fetus were viable.</i>
workable	Capable of being done with means at hand and circumstances as they are. <i>A workable peace settlement.</i>
