- *A notable achievement.*



Synonyms of "Feat" as a noun (8 Words)

- accomplishment** The action of accomplishing something.
*A poet of considerable **accomplishment**.*
- achievement** A thing done successfully with effort, skill, or courage.
*The **achievement** of professional recognition.*
- attainment** A thing achieved, especially a skill or educational achievement.
*The **attainment** of independence.*
- coup** (among some North American Indian peoples) an act of touching an armed enemy in battle as a deed of bravery, or an act of first touching an item of the enemy's in order to claim it.
*It was a major **coup** to get such a prestigious contract.*
- effort** Earnest and conscientious activity intended to do or accomplish something.
*Made an **effort** to cover all the reading material.*

exploit A software tool designed to take advantage of a flaw in a computer system, typically for malicious purposes such as installing malware.
*Despite a series of colourful **exploits** his agents obtained little intelligence of value.*

master stroke A person who has general authority over others.

triumph

The exultation of victory.

*The marriage had been a **triumph** of togetherness.*



Usage Examples of "Feat" as a noun

- *He performed a great feat.*
- *The new printing presses were considerable feats of engineering.*

academician	A member of an academy, especially the Royal Academy of Arts or the Académie française.
accomplished	Settled securely and unconditionally. <i>A very elegant and accomplished person.</i>
accomplishment	An activity that a person can do well. <i>The reduction of inflation was a remarkable accomplishment.</i>
achieve	Successfully bring about or reach (a desired objective or result) by effort, skill, or courage. <i>He achieved his ambition to become a press photographer.</i>
achievement	A representation of a coat of arms with all the adjuncts to which a bearer of arms is entitled. <i>A sense of achievement.</i>

achiever	A person who achieves a high or specified level of success. <i>His children are achievers destined to follow an exacting academic route.</i>
acquirement	The action of acquiring something. <i>The acquirement of self control.</i>
acquisition	A purchase of one company by another. <i>The acquisition of one company by another.</i>
assiduity	Constant or close attention to what one is doing. <i>The assiduity with which he could wear down his opponents.</i>
attain	To gain with effort. <i>He attained the rank of Brigadier.</i>
attainment	A thing achieved, especially a skill or educational achievement. <i>His attainment of puberty was delayed by malnutrition.</i>
deftness	Skillful performance or ability without difficulty.
eminent	(of a person) famous and respected within a particular sphere. <i>Eminent members of the community.</i>
excellent	Very good; of the highest quality. <i>Made an excellent speech.</i>
exploit	Make full use of and derive benefit from (a resource). <i>These workers are at particular risk of being exploited in the workplace.</i>
honored	Having an illustrious reputation; respected.
jubilation	A feeling of extreme joy. <i>Unbelievable scenes of jubilation.</i>
meteoric	Of or pertaining to atmospheric phenomena, especially weather and weather conditions. <i>A meteoric rise to fame.</i>
notable	Worthy of notice. <i>A notable historian.</i>
outshine	Shine more brightly than. <i>It is a shame when a mother outshines a daughter.</i>
prestigious	Inspiring respect and admiration; having high status. <i>A prestigious author.</i>
remarkable	Unusual or striking. <i>A remarkable sight.</i>
scholastic	Of or relating to the philosophical doctrine of scholasticism. <i>To distinguish between them is little more than a scholastic exercise.</i>

skill	The ability to do something well; expertise. <i>The skills of cookery.</i>
stardom	The status of being acknowledged as a star. <i>Her rise to stardom has been meteoric.</i>
success	An attainment that is successful. <i>He is enjoying great success.</i>
<u>talented</u>	Having a natural aptitude or skill for something. <i>A talented young musician.</i>
<u>triumph</u>	A successful ending of a struggle or contest. <i>Here it is Helen's voice rose in triumph.</i>
<u>triumphant</u>	Feeling or expressing jubilation after a victory or achievement. <i>He couldn't suppress a triumphant smile.</i>
<u>victory</u>	An act of defeating an enemy or opponent in a battle, game, or other competition. <i>They won their heat and went on to victory in the final.</i>
