### Definitions of "Feat" as a noun

- accomplishment** The action of accomplishing something.  
*A poet of considerable **accomplishment**.*
- achievement** A thing done successfully with effort, skill, or courage.  
*The **achievement** of professional recognition.*
- attainment** A thing achieved, especially a skill or educational achievement.  
*The **attainment** of independence.*
- coup** (among some North American Indian peoples) an act of touching an armed enemy in battle as a deed of bravery, or an act of first touching an item of the enemy's in order to claim it.  
*It was a major **coup** to get such a prestigious contract.*
- effort** Earnest and conscientious activity intended to do or accomplish something.  
*Made an **effort** to cover all the reading material.*

**exploit**

A software tool designed to take advantage of a flaw in a computer system, typically for malicious purposes such as installing malware.  
*Despite a series of colourful **exploits** his agents obtained little intelligence of value.*

**master stroke**

A person who has general authority over others.

**triumph**

The exultation of victory.

*The marriage had been a **triumph** of togetherness.*

<b>accomplished</b>	Settled securely and unconditionally. <i>A very elegant and <b>accomplished</b> person.</i>
<b>accomplishment</b>	An activity that a person can do well. <i>The reduction of inflation was a remarkable <b>accomplishment</b>.</i>
<b>achieve</b>	Successfully bring about or reach (a desired objective or result) by effort, skill, or courage. <i>He <b>achieved</b> his ambition to become a press photographer.</i>
<b>achievement</b>	A representation of a coat of arms with all the adjuncts to which a bearer of arms is entitled. <i>A sense of <b>achievement</b>.</i>

<b>acquirement</b>	The action of acquiring something. <i>The <b>acquirement</b> of self control.</i>
<b>acquisition</b>	A purchase of one company by another. <i>The <b>acquisition</b> of one company by another.</i>
<b>assiduity</b>	Constant or close attention to what one is doing. <i>The <b>assiduity</b> with which he could wear down his opponents.</i>
<b>attain</b>	To gain with effort. <i>He <b>attained</b> the rank of Brigadier.</i>
<b>attainment</b>	A thing achieved, especially a skill or educational achievement. <i>His <b>attainment</b> of puberty was delayed by malnutrition.</i>
<b>deftness</b>	Skillful performance or ability without difficulty.
<b>eminent</b>	(of a person) famous and respected within a particular sphere. <i><b>Eminent</b> members of the community.</i>
<b>excellent</b>	Very good; of the highest quality. <i>Made an <b>excellent</b> speech.</i>
<b>exploit</b>	Make full use of and derive benefit from (a resource). <i>These workers are at particular risk of being <b>exploited</b> in the workplace.</i>
<b>honored</b>	Having an illustrious reputation; respected.
<b>jubilation</b>	A feeling of extreme joy. <i>Unbelievable scenes of <b>jubilation</b>.</i>
<b>meteoric</b>	Of or pertaining to atmospheric phenomena, especially weather and weather conditions. <i>A <b>meteoric</b> rise to fame.</i>
<b>notable</b>	Worthy of notice. <i>A <b>notable</b> historian.</i>
<b>outshine</b>	Shine more brightly than. <i>It is a shame when a mother <b>outshines</b> a daughter.</i>
<b>prestigious</b>	Inspiring respect and admiration; having high status. <i>A <b>prestigious</b> author.</i>
<b>remarkable</b>	Unusual or striking. <i>A <b>remarkable</b> sight.</i>
<b>scholastic</b>	Of or relating to the philosophical doctrine of scholasticism. <i>To distinguish between them is little more than a <b>scholastic</b> exercise.</i>

<b>skill</b>	The ability to do something well; expertise. <i>The <b>skills</b> of cookery.</i>
<b>stardom</b>	The status of being acknowledged as a star. <i>Her rise to <b>stardom</b> has been meteoric.</i>
<b>success</b>	An attainment that is successful. <i>He is enjoying great <b>success</b>.</i>
<b><u>talented</u></b>	Having a natural aptitude or skill for something. <i>A <b>talented</b> young musician.</i>
<b><u>triumph</u></b>	A successful ending of a struggle or contest. <i>Here it is Helen's voice rose in <b>triumph</b>.</i>
<b><u>triumphant</u></b>	Feeling or expressing jubilation after a victory or achievement. <i>He couldn't suppress a <b>triumphant</b> smile.</i>
<b><u>victory</u></b>	An act of defeating an enemy or opponent in a battle, game, or other competition. <i>They won their heat and went on to <b>victory</b> in the final.</i>
