## Feckless as an Adjective

### Definitions of "Feckless" as an adjective

According to the [Oxford Dictionary of English](#), “feckless” as an adjective can have the following definitions:

- *Lacking initiative or strength of character; irresponsible.*
- *Generally incompetent and ineffectual.*
- *Not fit to assume responsibility.*

### Synonyms of "Feckless" as an adjective (5 Words)

<b>incompetent</b>	Not meeting requirements. <i>The patient is deemed legally <b>incompetent</b>.</i>
<b><u>inefficient</u></b>	Lacking the ability or skill to perform effectively; inadequate. <i><b>Inefficient</b> workers.</i>
<b>inept</b>	Having or showing no skill; clumsy. <i>If the rumor is true can anything be more <b>inept</b> than to repeat it now.</i>
<b><u>useless</u></b>	Having no ability or skill in a specified activity or area. <i>We tried to pacify him but it was <b>useless</b>.</i>
<b>worthless</b>	Morally reprehensible. <i>A <b>worthless</b> idler.</i>

## Usage Examples of "Feckless" as an adjective

- *Her feckless younger brother.*
- *Feckless attempts to repair the plumbing.*

## Associations of "Feckless" (30 Words)

<b><u>ailing</u></b>	Somewhat ill or prone to illness. <i>My poor <b>ailing</b> grandmother.</i>
<b>breakable</b>	Capable of breaking or being broken easily. <i>Pack the <b>breakables</b> separately.</i>
<b><u>brittle</u></b>	A brittle sweet made from nuts and set melted sugar. <i><b>Brittle</b> bones.</i>
<b>bungling</b>	Lacking physical movement skills, especially with the hands. <i>A <b>bungling</b> attempt to cover up the accident.</i>
<b><u>emaciated</u></b>	Very thin especially from disease or hunger or cold. <i>She was so <b>emaciated</b> she could hardly stand.</i>
<b>emaciation</b>	The state of being abnormally thin or weak. <i>Thin to the point of <b>emaciation</b>.</i>
<b>feminine</b>	A feminine word or form. <i>The association of the arts with the <b>feminine</b>.</i>
<b><u>fragile</u></b>	Easily broken or damaged or destroyed. <i>She has the <b>fragile</b> beauty of youth.</i>
<b>fragility</b>	Quality of being easily damaged or destroyed. <i>Osteoporosis is characterized by bone <b>fragility</b>.</i>
<b><u>frail</u></b>	The weight of a frail basket full of raisins or figs between 50 and 75 pounds. <i>An invalid s <b>frail</b> body.</i>
<b><u>handling</u></b>	Manual (or mechanical) carrying or moving or delivering or working with something. <i>The <b>handling</b> of prisoners.</i>
<b>impotent</b>	Lacking power or ability. <i>Felt <b>impotent</b> rage.</i>
<b><u>incapable</u></b>	Unable to behave rationally or manage one's affairs. <i><b>Incapable</b> of solution.</i>
<b>incompetent</b>	An incompetent person. <i>The filming was hopeless <b>incompetent</b>.</i>

<b><u>ineffective</u></b>	Not producing an intended effect. <i><b>Ineffective</b> legislation.</i>
<b><u>ineffectual</u></b>	Lacking in power or forcefulness. <i>An <b>ineffectual</b> campaign.</i>
<b>inept</b>	Generally incompetent and ineffectual. <i>An <b>inept</b> remark.</i>
<b>infirm</b>	(of a person or their judgement) weak; irresolute. <i>Elderly and <b>infirm</b> people.</i>
<b><u>irresponsible</u></b>	Showing lack of care for consequences. <i>Behaved like an <b>irresponsible</b> idiot.</i>
<b>languish</b>	Pine with love or grief. <i>He has been <b>languishing</b> in jail since 1974.</i>
<b>powerless</b>	Without ability, influence, or power. <i>Troops were <b>powerless</b> to stop last night's shooting.</i>
<b>puny</b>	(used especially of persons) of inferior size. <i><b>Puny</b> excuses.</i>
<b>responsibility</b>	A thing which one is required to do as part of a job, role, or legal obligation. <i>A true leader takes <b>responsibility</b> for their team and helps them achieve goals.</i>
<b><u>senile</u></b>	(of a person) having or showing the weaknesses or diseases of old age, especially a loss of mental faculties. <i><b>Senile</b> decay.</i>
<b>undermine</b>	Lessen the effectiveness, power, or ability of, especially gradually or insidiously. <i>This could <b>undermine</b> years of hard work.</i>
<b>unreliable</b>	Not worthy of reliance or trust. <i>An <b>unreliable</b> trestle.</i>
<b><u>unskilled</u></b>	Lacking professional skill or expertise. <i><b>Unskilled</b> workmanship.</i>
<b><u>weak</u></b>	Relating to or denoting the weakest of the known kinds of force between particles which acts only at distances less than about 10 cm is very much weaker than the electromagnetic and the strong interactions and conserves neither strangeness parity nor isospin. <i>A <b>weak</b> plot.</i>
<b>weakly</b>	In a weak or feeble manner or to a minor degree. <i>If the lambs were <b>weakly</b> we had to feed them by hand.</i>
