### **Definitions of "Federation" as a noun**

- *The action of forming states or organizations into a single group with centralized control.*
- *The act of constituting a political unity out of a number of separate states or colonies or provinces so that each member retains the management of its internal affairs.*
- *A union of political organizations.*
- *An organization or group within which smaller divisions have some degree of internal autonomy.*
- *A group of states with a central government but independence in internal affairs.*
- *An organization formed by merging several groups or parties.*

<b><u>faction</u></b>	A dissenting clique. <i>A council increasingly split by <b>faction</b>.</i>
<b>federacy</b>	The state of being joined by a treaty.
<b>group</b>	A number of musicians who play popular music together. <i>The bulbs should be planted in <b>groups</b>.</i>
<b>grouping</b>	The activity of putting things together in groups. <i>The <b>grouping</b> of pupils by overall aptitude.</i>
<b><u>league</u></b>	The contest for the championship of a league. <i>The year we won the <b>league</b>.</i>
<b>partnership</b>	The state of being a partner or partners. <i>The <b>partnership</b> now owns 22 department stores.</i>
<b><u>union</u></b>	A trade union. <i>Their <b>union</b> had not been blessed with children.</i>

## Associations of "Federation" (30 Words)

<b>affiliation</b>	A social or business relationship. <i>The group has no <b>affiliation</b> to any preservation society.</i>
<b>alliance</b>	A formal agreement establishing an association or alliance between nations or other groups to achieve a particular aim. <i>An <b>alliance</b> between medicine and morality.</i>
<b>ally</b>	Become an ally or associate as by a treaty or marriage. <i>He s a good <b>ally</b> in fight.</i>
<b>amalgamate</b>	To bring or combine together or with something else. <i>He <b>amalgamated</b> his company with another.</i>
<b>annex</b>	Add or attach as a condition or consequence. <i>The left bank of the Rhine was <b>annexed</b> by France in 1797.</i>

<b>association</b>	The state of occurring with something else; co-occurrence. <i>A bog <b>association</b> containing ericaceous plants.</i>
<b>coalescing</b>	Growing together, fusing.
<b><u>coalition</u></b>	An organization of people (or countries) involved in a pact or treaty. <i>A <b>coalition</b> between Liberals and Conservatives.</i>
<b>collaboration</b>	Something produced in collaboration with someone. <i>His recent opera was a <b>collaboration</b> with Lessing.</i>
<b><u>collective</u></b>	A collective farm. <i>The <b>collective</b> mind.</i>
<b>combine</b>	Combine so as to form a whole mix. <i><b>Combine</b> the flour with the margarine and salt.</i>
<b>community</b>	The condition of sharing or having certain attitudes and interests in common. <i><b>Community</b> health services.</i>
<b>confederacy</b>	A secret agreement between two or more people to perform an unlawful act. <i>The Italian <b>confederacy</b> known as the Lombard League.</i>
<b><u>confederation</u></b>	The act of forming an alliance or confederation. <i>A <b>confederation</b> of trade unions.</i>
<b><u>consolidate</u></b>	Combine (a number of things) into a single more effective or coherent whole. <i><b>Consolidate</b> one's gains.</i>
<b>cooperation</b>	Joint operation or action. <i>They agreed on a policy of <b>cooperation</b>.</i>
<b>coordinated</b>	Operating as a unit. <i>A <b>coordinated</b> program.</i>
<b><u>ethnicity</u></b>	An ethnic quality or affiliation resulting from racial or cultural ties. <i><b>Ethnicity</b> has a strong influence on community status relations.</i>
<b>federate</b>	Relating to a federated state or organization. <i>The country was <b>federated</b> after the civil war.</i>
<b><u>fusion</u></b>	The combining of images from the two eyes to form a single visual percept. <i>A <b>fusion</b> reactor.</i>
<b>integrate</b>	Become one become integrated. <i>Cities efforts to <b>integrate</b>.</i>
<b>integrated</b>	Formed into a whole or introduced into another entity- Dwight D.Eisenhower. <i>An <b>integrated</b> Europe.</i>

<b>join</b>	Cause to become joined or linked. <i>I <b>joined</b> the demonstration.</i>
<b>league</b>	Join in a league or alliance. <i>The <b>league</b> championship.</i>
<b>national</b>	Owned or maintained for the public by the national government. <i>A German <b>national</b>.</i>
<b>synthesis</b>	(in Hegelian philosophy) the final stage in the process of dialectical reasoning, in which a new idea resolves the conflict between thesis and antithesis. <i>The <b>synthesis</b> of intellect and emotion in his work.</i>
<b>together</b>	In each other's company. <i>He won the confidence of the government and the rebels but could not bring the two sides <b>together</b>.</i>
<b>union</b>	Of trade unions. <i>A currency <b>union</b> between the two countries.</i>
<b>unite</b>	Be or become joined or united or linked. <i>The two Germanys officially <b>united</b>.</i>
<b>united</b>	Used in names of soccer and other sports teams formed by amalgamation. <i>Presented a <b>united</b> front.</i>
