### **Definitions of "Femininity" as a noun**

- *Qualities or attributes regarded as characteristic of women.*
- *The trait of behaving in ways considered typical for women.*



## Synonyms of "Femininity" as a noun (6 Words)

- feminine qualities** A gender that refers chiefly (but not exclusively) to females or to objects classified as female.
- femininess** The properties characteristic of the female sex.
- muliebrity** The state of being an adult woman.
- womanhood** The state or condition of being a woman.  
*She was on the very brink of **womanhood**.*
- womanliness** The trait of being womanly; having the characteristics of an adult female.
- womanly qualities** A human female employed to do housework.



## Usage Examples of "Femininity" as a noun

- *She alternated between embracing her femininity and concealing it.*





## Associations of "Femininity" (30 Words)

<b>abductor</b>	Someone who unlawfully seizes and detains a victim (usually for ransom). <b>Abductor</b> <i>pollicis</i> .
<b>breakable</b>	An article that is fragile and easily broken. <b>Breakable</b> <i>ornaments</i> .
<b>brittle</b>	A brittle sweet made from nuts and set melted sugar. <i>Her bones became fragile and <b>brittle</b>.</i>
<b>dainty</b>	Affectedly dainty or refined. <i>A <b>dainty</b> dish to set before a kind.</i>
<b>delicacy</b>	Something considered choice to eat. <i>Miniature pearls of exquisite <b>delicacy</b>.</i>
<b>delicate</b>	A delicate fabric or garment. <b>Delicate</b> <i>negotiations with the big powers.</i>

<b>eccentricity</b>	Deviation of a curve or orbit from circularity. <i>Halley's Comet has an <b>eccentricity</b> of about 0.9675.</i>
<b>effeminacy</b>	The trait of being effeminate (derogatory of a man). <i>The students associated science with masculinity and arts with <b>effeminacy</b>.</i>
<b>elegant</b>	Graceful and stylish in appearance or manner. <i>An <b>elegant</b> mathematical solution simple and precise and lucid.</i>
<b>emaciation</b>	The state of being abnormally thin or weak. <i>Thin to the point of <b>emaciation</b>.</i>
<b>exhausted</b>	Drained of energy or effectiveness extremely tired completely exhausted. <i>Impossible to grow tobacco on the <b>exhausted</b> soil.</i>
<b>feeble</b>	Lacking strength or vigor. <i>Her <b>feeble</b> cries of pain.</i>
<b>foible</b>	The weaker part of a sword's blade from the forte to the tip. <i>They have to tolerate each other's little <b>foibles</b>.</i>
<b>fragile</b>	Vulnerably delicate. <i><b>Fragile</b> porcelain plates.</i>
<b>fragility</b>	Quality of being easily damaged or destroyed. <i>His emotional <b>fragility</b>.</i>
<b>frailty</b>	Weakness in character or morals. <i>All drama begins with human <b>frailty</b>.</i>
<b>graceful</b>	Characterized by beauty of movement, style, form, or execution. <i>She was a tall girl slender and <b>graceful</b>.</i>
<b>listlessness</b>	Inactivity resulting from lethargy and lack of vigor or energy.
<b>quirk</b>	A peculiar aspect of a person's character or behaviour. <i>His lips <b>quirked</b> disbelievingly.</i>
<b>sensitiveness</b>	(physiology) responsiveness to external stimuli; the faculty of sensation. <i>The <b>sensitiveness</b> of Mimosa leaves does not depend on a change of growth.</i>
<b>sensitivity</b>	Sensitivity to emotional feelings of self and others. <i>A galvanometer of extreme <b>sensitivity</b>.</i>
<b>sensitization</b>	The process of becoming highly sensitive to specific events or situations (especially emotional events or situations). <i>The aim of the activity was to develop <b>sensitization</b> to issues of diversity in the classroom.</i>
<b>sensitize</b>	Make (photographic film) sensitive to light. <i>The kit <b>sensitizes</b> any 35 mm film in hours.</i>

<b>softness</b>	The quality of being indistinct and without sharp outlines. <i>A glass care programme regulates the water <b>softness</b>.</i>
<b>tender</b>	Make tender or more tender as by marinating pounding or applying a tenderizer. <i>He started sailing at the <b>tender</b> age of ten.</i>
<b>ticklish</b>	Difficult to handle; requiring great tact. <i>Hesitates to be explicit on so <b>ticklish</b> a matter.</i>
<b>torpor</b>	Inactivity resulting from lethargy and lack of vigor or energy. <i>They veered between apathetic <b>torpor</b> and hysterical fanaticism.</i>
<b>touchy</b>	Easily upset or offended; oversensitive. <i>A <b>touchy</b> subject.</i>
<b>vulnerable</b>	Capable of being wounded or hurt. <i>An argument <b>vulnerable</b> to refutation.</i>
<b>weakness</b>	A flaw or weak point. <i>His <b>weakness</b> increased as he became older.</i>
