<u>fierce</u>	Marked by extreme and violent energy. <i>Fierce</i> fighting continued throughout the day.
<u>menacing</u>	Suggesting the presence of danger; threatening. <i>His tone became <b>menacing</b></i> .
<u>predatory</u>	Living by or given to victimizing others for personal gain- Peter S. Prescott. <b>Predatory</b> species of shark.



savage	Marked by extreme and violent energy. The decision was a <b>savage</b> blow for the town.	
threatening	Threatening or foreshadowing evil or tragic developments. <i>His <b>threatening</b> behavior.</i>	
tigerish	Resembling or likened to a tiger, especially in being fierce and determined. She was in <b>tigerish</b> mood.	
undomesticated	Unaccustomed to home life. I never cook for him and I am totally <b>undomesticated</b> .	
untamed	Not domesticated or otherwise controlled. Nepal was stunning with its wild <b>untamed</b> landscape.	
untrained	Not disciplined or conditioned or made adept by training. Young minds <b>untrained</b> in the habit of concentration.	
unused to humans Not yet used or soiled.		
vicious	(of persons or their actions) able or disposed to inflict pain or suffering. <i>The dog was vicious and likely to bite.</i>	
wild	Produced from wild animals or plants without cultivation. A <b>wild</b> guess.	
wolfish	Devouring or craving food in great quantities. <i>Wolfish rapacity</i> .

gad	An anxiety disorder characterized by chronic free-floating anxiety and such symptoms as tension or sweating or trembling or lightheadedness or irritability etc that has lasted for more than six months. <i>He had heard that I was gadding about with an airline stewardess.</i>



gallivant	Go around from one place to another in the pursuit of pleasure or entertainment. She quit her job to go <b>gallivant</b> ing around the globe.
idly	With no particular purpose, reason, or foundation. I can no longer stand <b>idly</b> by and let him take the blame.
incorrigible	An incorrigible person. She s an <b>incorrigible</b> flirt.
intractable	(of a person) difficult or stubborn. <i>Intractable metal.</i>
maunder	Speak (about unimportant matters) rapidly and incessantly. <i>He <b>maunder</b>s through the bank composing his thoughts.</i>
moved	Being excited or provoked to the expression of an emotion. <i>Too</i> <b>moved</b> to speak.
ramble	A walk taken for pleasure in the countryside. <i>This novel</i> <b>ramble</b> s on and jogs.
<u>rambling</u>	(of writing or speech) lengthy and confused or inconsequential. A <b>rambling</b> man.
rambunctious	Noisy and lacking in restraint or discipline. A <b>rambunctious</b> tyke.
refractory	(of a person, illness, or diseased tissue) not yielding to treatment. A <b>refractory</b> child.
restlessly	In a restless manner.
roam	Move about aimlessly or without any destination, often in search of food or employment. Did you get to explore the city or have a <b>roam</b> around Bath.
rove	Travel constantly without a fixed destination; wander. The policeman s eyes <b>rove</b> d around the pub.
<u>saunter</u>	Walk leisurely and with no apparent aim. Adam <b>saunter</b> ed into the room.
sidetrack	A short stretch of railroad track used to store rolling stock or enable trains on the same line to pass. <i>The train is</i> <b>sidetrack</b> ed on to a line leading to a terminal.
<u>stray</u>	An animal that has strayed especially a domestic animal. A <b>stray</b> dog.
<u>stroll</u>	Achieve a sporting victory without effort. I <b>stroll</b> ed around the city.



<u>uncontrollable</u>	Impossible to repress or control. <b>Uncontrollable</b> children.
ungovernable	Of persons. The country had become <b>ungovernable</b> .
unruly	Noisy and lacking in restraint or discipline. <b>Unruly</b> teenagers.
untamed	Not domesticated or otherwise controlled. Nepal was stunning with its wild <b>untamed</b> landscape.
wander	An act or instance of wandering. I <b>wander</b> ed through the narrow streets.
wild	A wild and uninhabited area left in its natural condition. <i>Wild</i> rumours were circulating.
