<b>aggressive</b>	Tending to spread quickly. <i>He was <b>aggressive</b> and imperious positive in his convictions.</i>
<b><u>bloodthirsty</u></b>	Having or showing a desire to kill and maim. <i>A <b>bloodthirsty</b> dictator.</i>
<b>ferine</b>	Wild and menacing.
<b><u>ferocious</u></b>	Savagely fierce, cruel, or violent. <i>A <b>ferocious</b> battle.</i>

<b>savage</b>	Marked by extreme and violent energy. <i>The decision was a <b>savage</b> blow for the town.</i>
<b>threatening</b>	Threatening or foreshadowing evil or tragic developments. <i>His <b>threatening</b> behavior.</i>
<b>tigerish</b>	Resembling or likened to a tiger, especially in being fierce and determined. <i>She was in <b>tigerish</b> mood.</i>
<b>undomesticated</b>	Unaccustomed to home life. <i>I never cook for him and I am totally <b>undomesticated</b>.</i>
<b>untamed</b>	Not domesticated or otherwise controlled. <i>Nepal was stunning with its wild <b>untamed</b> landscape.</i>
<b>untrained</b>	Not disciplined or conditioned or made adept by training. <i>Young minds <b>untrained</b> in the habit of concentration.</i>
<b>unused to humans</b>	Not yet used or soiled.
<b>vicious</b>	(of persons or their actions) able or disposed to inflict pain or suffering. <i>The dog was <b>vicious</b> and likely to bite.</i>
<b>wild</b>	Produced from wild animals or plants without cultivation. <i>A <b>wild</b> guess.</i>
<b>wolfish</b>	Devouring or craving food in great quantities. <i><b>Wolfish</b> rapacity.</i>

<b>aimlessly</b>	Without purpose or direction. <i>We wandered <b>aimlessly</b> round Venice.</i>
<b>amble</b>	Walk or move at a slow, relaxed pace. <i>They <b>ambled</b> along the riverbank.</i>
<b>ambulate</b>	Walk about; not be bedridden or incapable of walking. <i>People who make use of crutches to <b>ambulate</b>.</i>
<b>balky</b>	Stopping short and refusing to go on. <i>A <b>balky</b> customer.</i>
<b>err</b>	Be mistaken or incorrect; make a mistake. <i>He has <b>erred</b> and strayed as many of us have.</i>
<b>gad</b>	An anxiety disorder characterized by chronic free-floating anxiety and such symptoms as tension or sweating or trembling or lightheadedness or irritability etc that has lasted for more than six months. <i>He had heard that I was <b>gadding</b> about with an airline stewardess.</i>

<b>gallivant</b>	Go around from one place to another in the pursuit of pleasure or entertainment. <i>She quit her job to go <b>gallivanting</b> around the globe.</i>
<b>idly</b>	With no particular purpose, reason, or foundation. <i>I can no longer stand <b>idly</b> by and let him take the blame.</i>
<b>incorrigible</b>	An incorrigible person. <i>She s an <b>incorrigible</b> flirt.</i>
<b>intractable</b>	(of a person) difficult or stubborn. <i><b>Intractable</b> metal.</i>
<b>maunder</b>	Speak (about unimportant matters) rapidly and incessantly. <i>He <b>maunders</b> through the bank composing his thoughts.</i>
<b>moved</b>	Being excited or provoked to the expression of an emotion. <i>Too <b>moved</b> to speak.</i>
<b>ramble</b>	A walk taken for pleasure in the countryside. <i>This novel <b>rambles</b> on and jogs.</i>
<b>rambling</b>	(of writing or speech) lengthy and confused or inconsequential. <i>A <b>rambling</b> man.</i>
<b>rambunctious</b>	Noisy and lacking in restraint or discipline. <i>A <b>rambunctious</b> tyke.</i>
<b>refractory</b>	(of a person, illness, or diseased tissue) not yielding to treatment. <i>A <b>refractory</b> child.</i>
<b>restlessly</b>	In a restless manner.
<b>roam</b>	Move about aimlessly or without any destination, often in search of food or employment. <i>Did you get to explore the city or have a <b>roam</b> around Bath.</i>
<b>rove</b>	Travel constantly without a fixed destination; wander. <i>The policeman s eyes <b>roved</b> around the pub.</i>
<b>saunter</b>	Walk leisurely and with no apparent aim. <i>Adam <b>sauntered</b> into the room.</i>
<b>sidetrack</b>	A short stretch of railroad track used to store rolling stock or enable trains on the same line to pass. <i>The train is <b>sidetracked</b> on to a line leading to a terminal.</i>
<b>stray</b>	An animal that has strayed especially a domestic animal. <i>A <b>stray</b> dog.</i>
<b>stroll</b>	Achieve a sporting victory without effort. <i>I <b>strolled</b> around the city.</i>

<b><u>uncontrollable</u></b>	Impossible to repress or control. <b>Uncontrollable</b> children.
<b>ungovernable</b>	Of persons. <i>The country had become <b>ungovernable</b>.</i>
<b>unruly</b>	Noisy and lacking in restraint or discipline. <b>Unruly</b> teenagers.
<b>untamed</b>	Not domesticated or otherwise controlled. <i>Nepal was stunning with its wild <b>untamed</b> landscape.</i>
<b><u>wander</u></b>	An act or instance of wandering. <i>I <b>wandered</b> through the narrow streets.</i>
<b>wild</b>	A wild and uninhabited area left in its natural condition. <b>Wild</b> rumours were circulating.
