- *(especially of an animal) in a wild state, especially after escape from captivity or domestication.*
- *Resembling or characteristic of a wild animal.*

aggressive	Tending to spread quickly. <i>He was aggressive and imperious positive in his convictions.</i>
<u>bloodthirsty</u>	Having or showing a desire to kill and maim. <i>A bloodthirsty dictator.</i>
ferine	Wild and menacing.
<u>ferocious</u>	Savagely fierce, cruel, or violent. <i>A ferocious battle.</i>
<u>fierce</u>	Marked by extreme and violent energy. <i>Fierce fighting continued throughout the day.</i>
<u>menacing</u>	Suggesting the presence of danger; threatening. <i>His tone became menacing.</i>
<u>predatory</u>	Living by or given to victimizing others for personal gain- Peter S. Prescott. <i>Predatory species of shark.</i>

savage	Marked by extreme and violent energy. <i>The decision was a savage blow for the town.</i>
threatening	Threatening or foreshadowing evil or tragic developments. <i>His threatening behavior.</i>
tigerish	Resembling or likened to a tiger, especially in being fierce and determined. <i>She was in tigerish mood.</i>
undomesticated	Unaccustomed to home life. <i>I never cook for him and I am totally undomesticated.</i>
untamed	Not domesticated or otherwise controlled. <i>Nepal was stunning with its wild untamed landscape.</i>
untrained	Not disciplined or conditioned or made adept by training. <i>Young minds untrained in the habit of concentration.</i>
unused to humans	Not yet used or soiled.
vicious	(of persons or their actions) able or disposed to inflict pain or suffering. <i>The dog was vicious and likely to bite.</i>
wild	Produced from wild animals or plants without cultivation. <i>A wild guess.</i>
wolfish	Devouring or craving food in great quantities. <i>Wolfish rapacity.</i>

aimlessly	Without purpose or direction. <i>We wandered aimlessly round Venice.</i>
amble	Walk or move at a slow, relaxed pace. <i>They ambled along the riverbank.</i>
ambulate	Walk about; not be bedridden or incapable of walking. <i>People who make use of crutches to ambulate.</i>
balky	Stopping short and refusing to go on. <i>A balky customer.</i>
err	Be mistaken or incorrect; make a mistake. <i>He has erred and strayed as many of us have.</i>
gad	An anxiety disorder characterized by chronic free-floating anxiety and such symptoms as tension or sweating or trembling or lightheadedness or irritability etc that has lasted for more than six months. <i>He had heard that I was gadding about with an airline stewardess.</i>

gallivant	Go around from one place to another in the pursuit of pleasure or entertainment. <i>She quit her job to go gallivanting around the globe.</i>
idly	With no particular purpose, reason, or foundation. <i>I can no longer stand idly by and let him take the blame.</i>
incorrigible	An incorrigible person. <i>She s an incorrigible flirt.</i>
intractable	(of a person) difficult or stubborn. <i>Intractable metal.</i>
maunder	Speak (about unimportant matters) rapidly and incessantly. <i>He maunders through the bank composing his thoughts.</i>
moved	Being excited or provoked to the expression of an emotion. <i>Too moved to speak.</i>
ramble	A walk taken for pleasure in the countryside. <i>This novel rambles on and jogs.</i>
<u>rambling</u>	(of writing or speech) lengthy and confused or inconsequential. <i>A rambling man.</i>
<u>rambunctious</u>	Noisy and lacking in restraint or discipline. <i>A rambunctious tyke.</i>
refractory	(of a person, illness, or diseased tissue) not yielding to treatment. <i>A refractory child.</i>
restlessly	In a restless manner.
roam	Move about aimlessly or without any destination, often in search of food or employment. <i>Did you get to explore the city or have a roam around Bath.</i>
rove	Travel constantly without a fixed destination; wander. <i>The policeman s eyes roved around the pub.</i>
<u>saunter</u>	Walk leisurely and with no apparent aim. <i>Adam sauntered into the room.</i>
sidetrack	A short stretch of railroad track used to store rolling stock or enable trains on the same line to pass. <i>The train is sidetracked on to a line leading to a terminal.</i>
<u>stray</u>	An animal that has strayed especially a domestic animal. <i>A stray dog.</i>
<u>stroll</u>	Achieve a sporting victory without effort. <i>I strolled around the city.</i>

<u>uncontrollable</u>	Impossible to repress or control. Uncontrollable children.
ungovernable	Of persons. <i>The country had become ungovernable.</i>
unruly	Noisy and lacking in restraint or discipline. Unruly teenagers.
untamed	Not domesticated or otherwise controlled. <i>Nepal was stunning with its wild untamed landscape.</i>
<u>wander</u>	An act or instance of wandering. <i>I wandered through the narrow streets.</i>
wild	A wild and uninhabited area left in its natural condition. Wild rumours were circulating.
