<b>barbaric</b>	Unrestrained and crudely rich. <i>The <b>barbaric</b> splendour he found in civilizations since destroyed.</i>
<b>barbarous</b>	Extremely brutal. <i>Many early child rearing practices were <b>barbarous</b> by modern standards.</i>
<b>bloodthirsty</b>	(of a story or film) containing or depicting much violence. <i>A <b>bloodthirsty</b> dictator.</i>
<b>brutal</b>	Harsh. <i>The <b>brutal</b> morning light.</i>
<b>brutish</b>	Resembling or characteristic of a brute. <i><b>Brutish</b> behaviour.</i>
<b>burning</b>	On fire. <i><b>Burning</b> issues of the day.</i>
<b>cruel</b>	Able or disposed to inflict pain or suffering. <i>People who are <b>cruel</b> to animals.</i>

<b>extreme</b>	Of the greatest possible degree or extent or intensity. <i><b>Extreme</b> opinions.</i>
<b>feral</b>	(of a young person) behaving in a wildly undisciplined and antisocial way. <i>A <b>feral</b> cat.</i>
<b>fierce</b>	(of a mechanism) having a jolting and powerful abruptness of action. <i>The actress looked as <b>fierce</b> and fashion forward as ever.</i>
<b>furious</b>	Extremely angry. <i>He was <b>furious</b> when he learned about it.</i>
<b>heartless</b>	Devoid of courage or enthusiasm. <i><b>Heartless</b> thieves stole the pushchair of a two year old boy.</i>
<b>intense</b>	Extremely sharp or intense. <i><b>Intense</b> emotion.</i>
<b>merciless</b>	Showing no mercy. <i>The <b>merciless</b> summer heat.</i>
<b>murderous</b>	Capable of or intending to murder; dangerously violent. <i>A brutal and <b>murderous</b> despot.</i>
<b>pitiless</b>	Without mercy or pity. <i>A <b>pitiless</b> executioner.</i>
<b>powerful</b>	Of a person possessing physical strength and weight rugged and powerful. <i>His photomontages are <b>powerful</b> anti war images.</i>
<b>remorseless</b>	Without regret or guilt. <i>A monster of <b>remorseless</b> cruelty.</i>
<b>ruthless</b>	Without mercy or pity. <i>An act of <b>ruthless</b> ferocity.</i>
<b>sadistic</b>	Deriving pleasure or sexual gratification from inflicting pain on another. <i>A <b>sadistic</b> killer.</i>
<b>savage</b>	Able or disposed to inflict pain or suffering. <i>A <b>savage</b> people.</i>
<b>searing</b>	Extremely hot or intense. <i>A <b>searing</b> indictment of the government s performance.</i>
<b>strong</b>	Relating to or denoting the strongest of the known kinds of force between particles which acts between nucleons and other hadrons when closer than about 10 cm so binding protons in a nucleus despite the repulsion due to their charge and which conserves strangeness parity and isospin. <i>A hostile crowd several thousands <b>strong</b>.</i>
<b>tigerish</b>	Resembling or likened to a tiger, especially in being fierce and determined. <i>She was in <b>tigerish</b> mood.</i>

<b>untamed</b>	Not domesticated or otherwise controlled. <i>Nepal was stunning with its wild <b>untamed</b> landscape.</i>
<b>vicious</b>	Having the nature of vice. <i>A <b>vicious</b> assault.</i>
<b>violent</b>	Marked by extreme intensity of emotions or convictions inclined to react violently fervid. <i>Her dress was a <b>violent</b> red.</i>
<b>wild</b>	Produced from wild animals or plants without cultivation. <i>A <b>wild</b> bitterly cold night.</i>
<b>wolfish</b>	Devouring or craving food in great quantities. <i><b>Wolfish</b> rapacity.</i>

<b>barbarism</b>	A brutal barbarous savage act. <i>The collapse of civilization and the return to <b>barbarism</b>.</i>
<b>barbarous</b>	(of persons or their actions) able or disposed to inflict pain or suffering. <i>A <b>barbarous</b> crime.</i>
<b>brawl</b>	To quarrel noisily, angrily or disruptively. <i>A street <b>brawl</b>.</i>
<b>brutal</b>	Savagely violent. <i>He spoke with <b>brutal</b> honesty.</i>

<b>brutish</b>	Resembling a beast; showing lack of human sensibility. <i>He was coarse and <b>brutish</b>.</i>
<b>counterattack</b>	Make a counterattack.
<b>cruel</b>	Wilfully causing pain or suffering to others, or feeling no concern about it. <i>Ernie nearly <b>cruelled</b> the whole thing by laughing.</i>
<b>ferocity</b>	The property of being wild or turbulent. <i>The <b>ferocity</b> of the storm caught them by surprise.</i>
<b>fierce</b>	Very; extremely. <i>The tiger is the largest member of the cat family and a <b>fierce</b> predator.</i>
<b>furious</b>	(of the elements) as if showing violent anger. <i>A <b>furious</b> battle.</i>
<b>gory</b>	Involving or showing violence and bloodshed. <i>A <b>gory</b> dagger.</i>
<b>harsh</b>	Unpleasantly stern. <i><b>Harsh</b> irritating smoke filled the hallway.</i>
<b>inhuman</b>	Belonging to or resembling something nonhuman. <i>Something dark and <b>inhuman</b> in form.</i>
<b>inhumane</b>	Lacking and reflecting lack of pity or compassion. <i>Biological weapons are considered too <b>inhumane</b> to be used.</i>
<b>lupine</b>	Of or relating to or characteristic of wolves.
<b>pitiless</b>	Deficient in humane and kindly feelings. <i>A night of <b>pitiless</b> rain.</i>
<b>rampage</b>	Violently angry and destructive behavior. <i>Youths went on the <b>rampage</b> and wrecked a classroom.</i>
<b>repression</b>	The act of repressing; control by holding down. <i>The long <b>repression</b> of Christian sects.</i>
<b>ruthless</b>	Having or showing no pity or compassion for others. <i>A <b>ruthless</b> manipulator.</i>
<b>sadistic</b>	Deriving pleasure or sexual gratification from inflicting pain on another. <i>A <b>sadistic</b> killer.</i>
<b>savage</b>	Cruel and vicious; aggressively hostile. <i>The mother of one of the victims has described his assailants as <b>savages</b>.</i>
<b>stormy</b>	(of weather) characterized by strong winds and usually rain, thunder, lightning, or snow. <i>A <b>stormy</b> relationship.</i>
<b>truculence</b>	Obstreperous and defiant aggressiveness.



- truculent** Defiantly aggressive.  
*A **truculent** speech against the new government.*
- tussle** Fight or struggle in a confused way at close quarters.  
*There was a **tussle** for the ball.*
- uncontrollable** Of persons.  
***Uncontrollable** laughter.*
- vehement** Marked by extreme intensity of emotions or convictions; inclined to react violently; fervid.  
***Vehement** criticism.*
- violent** Marked by extreme intensity of emotions or convictions inclined to react violently fervid.  
*A **violent** noise.*
