Devoid of courage or enthusiasm.

Heartless thieves stole the pushchair of a two year old boy.

intense Extremely sharp or intense.

Intense emotion.

merciless Showing no mercy.

The **merciless** summer heat.

murderous Capable of or intending to murder; dangerously violent.

A brutal and **murderous** despot.

pitiless Without mercy or pity. *A pitiless* executioner.

powerful

Of a person possessing physical strength and weight rugged and powerful.

His photomontages are **powerful** anti war images.

remorseless Without regret or guilt.

A monster of **remorseless** cruelty.

ruthless Without mercy or pity.

An act of **ruthless** ferocity.

sadistic Deriving pleasure or sexual gratification from inflicting pain on another.

A **sadistic** killer.

savage Able or disposed to inflict pain or suffering.

A **savage** people.

searing Extremely hot or intense.

A **searing** indictment of the government s performance.

Relating to or denoting the strongest of the known kinds of force between particles which acts between nucleons and other hadrons when closer than

strong about 10 cm so binding protons in a nucleus despite the repulsion due to

their charge and which conserves strangeness parity and isospin.

A hostile crowd several thousands **strong**.

Resembling or likened to a tiger, especially in being fierce and determined.

She was in **tigerish** mood.



untamed Not domesticated or otherwise controlled.

Nepal was stunning with its wild **untamed** landscape.

vicious Having the nature of vice.

A vicious assault.

Marked by extreme intensity of emotions or convictions inclined to react

violently fervid.

Her dress was a violent red.

wild Produced from wild animals or plants without cultivation.

A **wild** bitterly cold night.

wolfish Devouring or craving food in great quantities.

Wolfish rapacity.
