- *The property of being wild or turbulent.*
- *The state or quality of being ferocious.*



Synonyms of "Ferocity" as a noun (12 Words)

aggression	A feeling of hostility that arouses thoughts of attack. <i>His chin was jutting with aggression.</i>
barbarity	Extreme cruelty or brutality. <i>The barbarity of the act outraged millions.</i>
bloodthirstiness	A disposition to shed blood.
<u>brutality</u>	Savage physical violence; great cruelty. <i>Brutality against civilians.</i>
fierceness	The property of being wild or turbulent.
furiousness	The property of being wild or turbulent.
<u>fury</u>	A surge of violent anger or other strong feeling. <i>The fury of a gathering storm.</i>

murderousness Cruelty evidence by a capability to commit murder.

savagery The property of being untamed and ferocious.
*A crime of the utmost **savagery**.*

vehemence Intensity or forcefulness of expression.
*The **vehemence** of his reaction.*

violence The unlawful exercise of physical force or intimidation by the exhibition of such force.
*Screen **violence**.*

wildness An unruly disposition to do as one pleases.
*The **wildness** of his anger.*



Usage Examples of "Ferocity" as a noun

- *She hated him with a ferocity that astonished her.*
- *The ferocity of the storm caught them by surprise.*



Associations of "Ferocity" (30 Words)

aggression	Violent action that is hostile and usually unprovoked. <i>Territorial aggression between individuals of the same species.</i>
aggressive	Characteristic of an enemy or one eager to fight. <i>Aggressive drivers.</i>
atrocities	A highly unpleasant or distasteful object. <i>A textbook which detailed war atrocities.</i>
barbarism	Absence of culture and civilization. <i>The collapse of civilization and the return to barbarism.</i>
brunt	Main force of a blow etc. <i>Education will bear the brunt of the cuts.</i>
brutal	Unpleasant or harsh. <i>A brutal murder.</i>
counterattack	Make a counterattack.

<u>cruelty</u>	Feelings of extreme heartlessness. <i>She divorced my stepfather for persistent cruelty.</i>
enraged	Very angry; furious. <i>An enraged mob screamed abuse.</i>
<u>ferocious</u>	Marked by extreme and violent energy. <i>A ferocious headache.</i>
<u>fierce</u>	Ruthless in competition. <i>Fierce loyalty.</i>
furious	Full of anger or energy; violent or intense. <i>A furious battle.</i>
<u>fury</u>	A surge of violent anger or other strong feeling. <i>Hell hath no fury like a woman scorned.</i>
inhuman	Lacking human qualities of compassion and mercy; cruel and barbaric. <i>A babel of inhuman noises.</i>
inhumanity	An act of atrocious cruelty. <i>Man s inhumanity to man.</i>
insensate	Without compunction or human feeling. <i>A positively insensate hatred.</i>
irate	Feeling or showing extreme anger. <i>A barrage of irate letters.</i>
<u>oppression</u>	A feeling of being oppressed. <i>After years of oppression they finally revolted.</i>
outrage	An action or event causing outrage. <i>Her voice trembled with outrage.</i>
<u>rampage</u>	(especially of a large group of people) move through a place in a violent and uncontrollable manner. <i>Several thousand demonstrators rampaged through the city.</i>
<u>repression</u>	The act of repressing; control by holding down. <i>Children and adults pay a heavy price for their deep repression of thoughts about death.</i>
ruthlessness	Mercilessness characterized by a lack of pity. <i>The real world ruthlessness of business.</i>
savage	Attack brutally and fiercely. <i>Police are rounding up dogs after a girl was savaged.</i>
<u>savagery</u>	A brutal barbarous savage act. <i>A craving for barbaric splendor for savagery and color and the throb of drums.</i>

tantrum

A display of bad temper.

*She threw a **tantrum**.*

tyranny

A state under cruel and oppressive government.

*The **tyranny** of the nine to five day.*

violence

The property of being wild or turbulent.

*He may accomplish by craft in the long run what he cannot do by force and **violence** in the short one.*

violent

Marked by extreme intensity of emotions or convictions inclined to react violently fervid.

***Violent** fiery colours.*

wrath

Extreme anger.

*He hid his pipe for fear of incurring his father's **wrath**.*
