animated	Full of life or excitement; lively. <i>An animated and expressive face.</i>
ardent	Glowing or shining like fire- Alexander Pope. <i>The ardent flames.</i>
bright	Not made dim or less bright. <i>The sun was bright and hot.</i>
candescent	Glowing with heat; luminous.
deep-seated	Deeply rooted; firmly fixed or held.
emotional	Of more than usual emotion. <i>Gaining emotional support from relatives.</i>
feeling	Showing emotion or sensitivity. <i>She was a feeling child.</i>

fervid	Extremely hot- Nathaniel Hawthorne- Frances Trollope. <i>Set out when the fervid heat subsides.</i>
fiery	Having a passionate and quick-tempered nature. <i>A fiery temper.</i>
flickering	(of a flame or light) burning or shining unsteadily; wavering. <i>The flickering flames cast long shadows.</i>
glimmering	Shining faintly with a wavering light. <i>Pools of glimmering light.</i>
heartfelt	(of a feeling or its expression) deeply and strongly felt; sincere. <i>Heartfelt condolences.</i>
<u>impassioned</u>	Characterized by intense emotion. <i>She made an impassioned plea for help.</i>
incandescent	Emitting light as a result of being heated. <i>An incandescent bulb.</i>
intense	Extremely sharp or intense. <i>A burning and intense look.</i>
luminescent	Emitting light not caused by heat. <i>The team is developing a transparent luminescent solar concentrator.</i>
luminous	Very bright in colour; lurid. <i>A luminous glow.</i>
passionate	Having, showing, or caused by strong feelings or beliefs. <i>A passionate kiss.</i>
perfervid	Characterized by intense emotion. <i>Perfervid nationalism.</i>
phosphorescent	Emitting light without appreciable heat as by slow oxidation of phosphorous. <i>The phosphorescent glow of decaying wood.</i>
profound	Situated at or extending to great depth; too deep to have been sounded or plumbed-Thomas Gray. <i>Profound feelings of disquiet.</i>
radiant	Of an appliance designed to emit radiant energy especially for cooking or heating. <i>She gave him a radiant smile.</i>
shining	Marked by exceptional merit. <i>A shining expanse of water.</i>
<u>sincere</u>	Free from pretence or deceit; proceeding from genuine feelings. <i>She d sounded sincere enough.</i>

<u>spirited</u>	Made lively or spirited. <i>A warm hearted generous spirited man.</i>
torrid	Emotionally charged and vigorously energetic. <i>A torrid love affair.</i>
<u>twinkling</u>	(of a person's eyes) sparkling, especially with amusement. <i>Twinkling harbour lights.</i>
<u>vehement</u>	Showing strong feeling; forceful, passionate, or intense. <i>Vehement dislike.</i>

afire	On fire; burning. <i>The whole mill was afire.</i>
aflame	Lighted up by or as by fire or flame. <i>Even the car s tires were aflame.</i>
alight	(of a bird) descend from the air and settle. <i>The conductor alights to push the cable car completely around.</i>
<u>ardent</u>	Glowing or shining like fire. <i>The ardent flames.</i>
brazier	Large metal container in which coal or charcoal is burned; warms people who must stay outside for long times.
<u>burning</u>	The act of burning something. <i>A burning building.</i>
choleric	Easily moved to anger. <i>He was a choleric self important little man.</i>
eager	(of a person's expression or tone of voice) keenly expectant or interested. <i>Eager for success.</i>
earnest	Sincerely earnest. <i>An earnest student.</i>

enthusiasm	Something that arouses enthusiasm. <i>Few expressed enthusiasm about the current leaders.</i>
enthusiastic	Having or showing great excitement and interest. <i>Was enthusiastic about taking ballet lessons.</i>
fervid	Hot, burning, or glowing. <i>His fervid protestations of love.</i>
fever	The state of being emotionally aroused and worked up. An abnormally high body temperature, usually accompanied by shivering, headache, and in severe instances, delirium. <i>A heart which sin has fevered.</i>
fiery	Showing strong emotion, typically anger. <i>Fiery oratory.</i>
heartily	To a great degree; very (especially with reference to personal feelings). <i>Yes the children chorused heartily.</i>
heated	Made warm or hot <i>het</i> is a dialectal variant of heated. <i>Wiped his heated up face with a large bandana.</i>
hot	Make or become hot. <i>A hot day in late August.</i>
igneous	Like or suggestive of fire. <i>Igneous rock is rock formed by solidification from a molten state especially from molten magma.</i>
impassioned	Characterized by intense emotion. <i>An impassioned appeal.</i>
overwrought	(of a piece of writing or a work of art) too elaborate or complicated in design or construction. <i>A pseudo Gothic church far too overwrought for such a small town.</i>
passion	A musical setting of any of the biblical accounts of the Passion. <i>She nurses a passion for Thomas.</i>
passionate	Arising from intense feelings of sexual love. <i>He s passionate about football.</i>
stoke	Add coal or other solid fuel to (a fire, furnace, boiler, etc). <i>He stoked up the barbecue.</i>
strenuous	Characterized by or performed with much energy or force. <i>Strenuous exercise.</i>
tempestuous	Characterized by violent emotions or behavior. <i>A tempestuous wind.</i>

torrid	Full of passion arising from sexual love. <i>A torrid dance.</i>
votary	A priest or priestess (or consecrated worshipper) in a non-Christian religion or cult. <i>The cultured votary of science.</i>
zealotry	Excessive intolerance of opposing views. <i>He expressed concern about religious zealotry playing an increasing role in politics.</i>
zest	Great enthusiasm and energy. <i>Add 3 tablespoons of lemon zest.</i>
