<b>fiery</b>	Having a passionate and quick-tempered nature. <i>A <b>fiery</b> temper.</i>
<b>flickering</b>	(of a flame or light) burning or shining unsteadily; wavering. <i>The <b>flickering</b> flames cast long shadows.</i>
<b>glimmering</b>	Shining faintly with a wavering light. <i>Pools of <b>glimmering</b> light.</i>
<b>heartfelt</b>	(of a feeling or its expression) deeply and strongly felt; sincere. <i><b>Heartfelt</b> condolences.</i>
<a href="#"><u>impassioned</u></a>	Characterized by intense emotion. <i>She made an <b>impassioned</b> plea for help.</i>
<b>incandescent</b>	Emitting light as a result of being heated. <i>An <b>incandescent</b> bulb.</i>
<b>intense</b>	Extremely sharp or intense. <i>A burning and <b>intense</b> look.</i>
<b>luminescent</b>	Emitting light not caused by heat. <i>The team is developing a transparent <b>luminescent</b> solar concentrator.</i>
<b>luminous</b>	Very bright in colour; lurid. <i>A <b>luminous</b> glow.</i>
<b>passionate</b>	Having, showing, or caused by strong feelings or beliefs. <i>A <b>passionate</b> kiss.</i>
<b>perfervid</b>	Characterized by intense emotion. <i><b>Perfervid</b> nationalism.</i>
<b>phosphorescent</b>	Emitting light without appreciable heat as by slow oxidation of phosphorous. <i>The <b>phosphorescent</b> glow of decaying wood.</i>
<b>profound</b>	Situated at or extending to great depth; too deep to have been sounded or plumbed-Thomas Gray. <i><b>Profound</b> feelings of disquiet.</i>
<b>radiant</b>	Of an appliance designed to emit radiant energy especially for cooking or heating. <i>She gave him a <b>radiant</b> smile.</i>
<b>shining</b>	Marked by exceptional merit. <i>A <b>shining</b> expanse of water.</i>
<a href="#"><u>sincere</u></a>	Free from pretence or deceit; proceeding from genuine feelings. <i>She d sounded <b>sincere</b> enough.</i>

<b><u>spirited</u></b>	Made lively or spirited. <i>A warm hearted generous <b>spirited</b> man.</i>
<b>torrid</b>	Emotionally charged and vigorously energetic. <i>A <b>torrid</b> love affair.</i>
<b><u>twinkling</u></b>	(of a person's eyes) sparkling, especially with amusement. <i><b>Twinkling</b> harbour lights.</i>
<b><u>vehement</u></b>	Showing strong feeling; forceful, passionate, or intense. <i><b>Vehement</b> dislike.</i>

<b>afire</b>	On fire; burning. <i>The whole mill was <b>afire</b>.</i>
<b>aflame</b>	Lighted up by or as by fire or flame. <i>Even the car s tires were <b>aflame</b>.</i>
<b>alight</b>	(of a bird) descend from the air and settle. <i>The conductor <b>alights</b> to push the cable car completely around.</i>
<b><u>ardent</u></b>	Glowing or shining like fire. <i>The <b>ardent</b> flames.</i>
<b>brazier</b>	Large metal container in which coal or charcoal is burned; warms people who must stay outside for long times.
<b><u>burning</u></b>	The act of burning something. <i>A <b>burning</b> building.</i>
<b>choleric</b>	Easily moved to anger. <i>He was a <b>choleric</b> self important little man.</i>
<b>eager</b>	(of a person's expression or tone of voice) keenly expectant or interested. <i><b>Eager</b> for success.</i>
<b>earnest</b>	Sincerely earnest. <i>An <b>earnest</b> student.</i>

<b>enthusiasm</b>	Something that arouses enthusiasm. <i>Few expressed <b>enthusiasm</b> about the current leaders.</i>
<b>enthusiastic</b>	Having or showing great excitement and interest. <i>Was <b>enthusiastic</b> about taking ballet lessons.</i>
<b>fervid</b>	Hot, burning, or glowing. <i>His <b>fervid</b> protestations of love.</i>
<b>fever</b>	The state of being emotionally aroused and worked up. An abnormally high body temperature, usually accompanied by shivering, headache, and in severe instances, delirium. <i>A heart which sin has <b>fevered</b>.</i>
<b>fiery</b>	Showing strong emotion, typically anger. <i><b>Fiery</b> oratory.</i>
<b>heartily</b>	To a great degree; very (especially with reference to personal feelings). <i>Yes the children chorused <b>heartily</b>.</i>
<b>heated</b>	Made warm or hot <i>het</i> is a dialectal variant of heated. <i>Wiped his <b>heated</b> up face with a large bandana.</i>
<b>hot</b>	Make or become hot. <i>A <b>hot</b> day in late August.</i>
<b>igneous</b>	Like or suggestive of fire. <i><b>Igneous</b> rock is rock formed by solidification from a molten state especially from molten magma.</i>
<b>impassioned</b>	Characterized by intense emotion. <i>An <b>impassioned</b> appeal.</i>
<b>overwrought</b>	(of a piece of writing or a work of art) too elaborate or complicated in design or construction. <i>A pseudo Gothic church far too <b>overwrought</b> for such a small town.</i>
<b>passion</b>	A musical setting of any of the biblical accounts of the Passion. <i>She nurses a <b>passion</b> for Thomas.</i>
<b>passionate</b>	Arising from intense feelings of sexual love. <i>He s <b>passionate</b> about football.</i>
<b>stoke</b>	Add coal or other solid fuel to (a fire, furnace, boiler, etc). <i>He <b>stoked</b> up the barbecue.</i>
<b>strenuous</b>	Characterized by or performed with much energy or force. <i><b>Strenuous</b> exercise.</i>
<b>tempestuous</b>	Characterized by violent emotions or behavior. <i>A <b>tempestuous</b> wind.</i>

<b>torrid</b>	Full of passion arising from sexual love. <i>A <b>torrid</b> dance.</i>
<b>votary</b>	A priest or priestess (or consecrated worshipper) in a non-Christian religion or cult. <i>The cultured <b>votary</b> of science.</i>
<b>zealotry</b>	Excessive intolerance of opposing views. <i>He expressed concern about religious <b>zealotry</b> playing an increasing role in politics.</i>
<b>zest</b>	Great enthusiasm and energy. <i>Add 3 tablespoons of lemon <b>zest</b>.</i>
