<b>afire</b>	Lighted up by or as by fire or flame. <i>Forests set ablaze or <b>afire</b> by lightning.</i>
<b>aflame</b>	Lighted up by or as by fire or flame. <i>He was <b>aflame</b> with desire.</i>
<b>alight</b>	(of a bird) descend from the air and settle. <i>A lovely blue swallow <b>alighted</b> on a branch.</i>
<b>ardent</b>	Glowing or shining like fire. <i>An <b>ardent</b> supporter of the conservative cause.</i>
<b>brazier</b>	Large metal container in which coal or charcoal is burned; warms people who must stay outside for long times.
<b>burning</b>	The act of burning something. <i><b>Burning</b> issues of the day.</i>
<b>choleric</b>	Characterized by anger. <i>Men of the <b>choleric</b> type take to kicking and smashing.</i>
<b>eager</b>	Strongly wanting to do or have something. <i>Young intellectuals <b>eager</b> for knowledge.</i>
<b>earnest</b>	Earnest. <i>Both sides were deeply in <b>earnest</b> even passionate.</i>
<b>enthusiasm</b>	Something that arouses enthusiasm. <i>Her energy and <b>enthusiasm</b> for life.</i>
<b>enthusiastic</b>	Having or showing great excitement and interest. <i>Was <b>enthusiastic</b> about taking ballet lessons.</i>
<b>fervid</b>	Intensely enthusiastic or passionate, especially to an excessive degree. <i>His <b>fervid</b> protestations of love.</i>
<b>fervor</b>	The state of being emotionally aroused and worked up.
<b>fever</b>	An abnormally high body temperature, usually accompanied by shivering, headache, and in severe instances, delirium. <i>In a <b>fever</b> of resentment.</i>
<b>fiery</b>	Having a passionate and quick-tempered nature. <i>A <b>fiery</b> pepper sauce.</i>
<b>heartily</b>	In a hearty manner. <i>They were <b>heartily</b> sick of the whole subject.</i>
<b>heated</b>	Made warm or hot <i>het</i> is a dialectal variant of heated. <i>A <b>heated</b> argument.</i>
<b>hot</b>	Make or become hot. <i>A <b>hot</b> laboratory.</i>

<b>igneous</b>	Relating to or involving volcanic or plutonic processes. <i><b>Igneous</b> fusion is fusion by heat alone.</i>
<b><u>impassioned</u></b>	Characterized by intense emotion. <i>An <b>impassioned</b> appeal.</i>
<b>overwrought</b>	Deeply agitated especially from emotion. <i>She was too <b>overwrought</b> to listen to reason.</i>
<b>passion</b>	A musical setting of any of the biblical accounts of the Passion. <i>Oratory in which he gradually works himself up into a <b>passion</b>.</i>
<b>passionate</b>	Arising from intense feelings of sexual love. <i>A <b>passionate</b> kiss.</i>
<b>stoke</b>	Consume a large quantity of food or drink to give one energy. <i>He <b>stoked</b> up the barbecue.</i>
<b>strenuous</b>	Taxing to the utmost; testing powers of endurance. <i><b>Strenuous</b> exercise.</i>
<b>tempestuous</b>	Very stormy. <i>A <b>tempestuous</b> wind.</i>
<b>torrid</b>	Full of passion arising from sexual love. <i><b>Torrid</b> jazz bands.</i>
<b>votary</b>	One bound by vows to a religion or life of worship or service. <i>The cultured <b>votary</b> of science.</i>
<b>zealotry</b>	Excessive intolerance of opposing views. <i>He expressed concern about religious <b>zealotry</b> playing an increasing role in politics.</i>
<b>zest</b>	The outer coloured part of the peel of citrus fruit, used as flavouring. <i>She had a great <b>zest</b> for life.</i>
