<b>ardor</b>	Intense feeling of love. <i>He spoke with great <b>ardor</b>.</i>
<b>ardour</b>	Intense feeling of love. <i>The rebuff did little to dampen his <b>ardour</b>.</i>
<b>excitation</b>	Something that agitates and arouses. <i>Thermal <b>excitation</b>.</i>
<b>excitement</b>	Something that arouses a feeling of excitement. <i>The <b>excitements</b> of the previous night.</i>
<b>fervency</b>	Feelings of great warmth and intensity.
<b>fervidness</b>	Feelings of great warmth and intensity.
<b>fervour</b>	Intense and passionate feeling. <i>He talked with all the <b>fervour</b> of a new convert.</i>

**fire** A fireplace in which a relatively small fire is burning.  
*Their soft smiles light the air like a star's **fire**.*

**inflammation** A response of body tissues to injury or irritation; characterized by pain and swelling and redness and heat.  
*He tried to calm those who were in a state of extreme **inflammation**.*

<b>ardent</b>	Glowing or shining like fire- Alexander Pope. <i>Frightened by his <b>ardent</b> burning eyes.</i>
<b>ardor</b>	Feelings of great warmth and intensity. <i>He spoke with great <b>ardor</b>.</i>
<b>burning</b>	The act of burning something. <i>He had a <b>burning</b> ambition to climb to the upper reaches of management.</i>
<b>desirous</b>	Having or expressing desire for something. <i><b>Desirous</b> of high office.</i>
<b>eager</b>	(of a person's expression or tone of voice) keenly expectant or interested. <i><b>Eager</b> to travel abroad.</i>
<b>eagerly</b>	In a keenly expectant or interested manner. <i>The news was <b>eagerly</b> awaited.</i>
<b>eagerness</b>	Enthusiasm to do or to have something; keenness. <i>They showed no <b>eagerness</b> to spread the gospel.</i>
<b>earnest</b>	Sincerely earnest. <i>An <b>earnest</b> student.</i>
<b>enthusiasm</b>	Something that arouses enthusiasm. <i>Few expressed <b>enthusiasm</b> about the current leaders.</i>
<b>enthusiastic</b>	Having or showing intense and eager enjoyment, interest, or approval. <i>Was <b>enthusiastic</b> about taking ballet lessons.</i>
<b>excitation</b>	Something that agitates and arouses. <i>A state of sexual <b>excitation</b>.</i>
<b>excitement</b>	Something that arouses a feeling of excitement. <i>His face was flushed with <b>excitement</b> and his hands trembled.</i>
<b>fervent</b>	Characterized by intense emotion. <i>The <b>fervent</b> heat merely communicated a genial warmth to their half torpid systems.</i>
<b>fervid</b>	Intensely enthusiastic or passionate, especially to an excessive degree. <i>His <b>fervid</b> protestations of love.</i>
<b>fever</b>	An abnormally high body temperature, usually accompanied by shivering, headache, and in severe instances, delirium. <i>A heart which sin has <b>fevered</b>.</i>
<b>gusto</b>	A relish or liking. <i>Hawkins tucked into his breakfast with <b>gusto</b>.</i>

<b><u>impassioned</u></b>	Filled with or showing great emotion. <i>She made an <b>impassioned</b> plea for help.</i>
<b><u>intensity</u></b>	Chromatic purity; freedom from dilution with white and hence vivid in hue. <i>He adjusted the <b>intensity</b> of the sound.</i>
<b>mania</b>	An excessive enthusiasm or desire; an obsession. <i>He had a <b>mania</b> for automobiles.</i>
<b>passion</b>	Intense sexual love. <i>The English have a <b>passion</b> for gardens.</i>
<b>passionate</b>	Having or expressing strong emotions. <i>A <b>passionate</b> kiss.</i>
<b><u>sensation</u></b>	The capacity to have physical sensations. <i>They had lost <b>sensation</b> in one or both forearms.</i>
<b><u>thrilled</u></b>	Feeling intense pleasurable excitement.
<b>torrid</b>	Full of passion arising from sexual love. <i>The <b>torrid</b> heat of the noonday sun.</i>
<b>vigorously</b>	In a way that involves physical strength, effort, or energy; strenuously. <i>He defended his ideas <b>vigorously</b>.</i>
<b>zeal</b>	Great energy or enthusiasm in pursuit of a cause or an objective. <i>He had an absolute <b>zeal</b> for litigation.</i>
<b>zealot</b>	A person who is fanatical and uncompromising in pursuit of their religious, political, or other ideals.
<b>zealotry</b>	Excessive intolerance of opposing views. <i>He expressed concern about religious <b>zealotry</b> playing an increasing role in politics.</i>
<b><u>zealous</u></b>	Marked by active interest and enthusiasm. <i>The council was extremely <b>zealous</b> in the application of the regulations.</i>
<b>zest</b>	A quality of excitement and piquancy. <i>She had a great <b>zest</b> for life.</i>
