fire A fireplace in which a relatively small fire is burning.
*Their soft smiles light the air like a star's **fire**.*

inflammation A response of body tissues to injury or irritation; characterized by pain and swelling and redness and heat.
*He tried to calm those who were in a state of extreme **inflammation**.*

| fervent | Characterized by intense emotion. <i>The fervent heat merely communicated a genial warmth to their half torpid systems.</i> |
| fervid | Intensely enthusiastic or passionate, especially to an excessive degree. <i>His fervid protestations of love.</i> |
| fever | An abnormally high body temperature, usually accompanied by shivering, headache, and in severe instances, delirium. <i>A heart which sin has fevered.</i> |

| <u>intensity</u> | Chromatic purity; freedom from dilution with white and hence vivid in hue. <i>He adjusted the intensity of the sound.</i> |
| mania | An excessive enthusiasm or desire; an obsession. <i>He had a mania for automobiles.</i> |
| passion | Intense sexual love. <i>The English have a passion for gardens.</i> |
| passionate | Having or expressing strong emotions. <i>A passionate kiss.</i> |

| <u>zealous</u> | Marked by active interest and enthusiasm. <i>The council was extremely zealous in the application of the regulations.</i> |
| zest | A quality of excitement and piquancy. <i>She had a great zest for life.</i> |
