- *(of a negative feeling or a problem) become worse or more intense, especially through long-term neglect or indifference.*

- Ripen and generate pus.
- (of a person) deteriorate physically and mentally in isolated inactivity.
- (of food or rubbish) become rotten and offensive to the senses.
- (of a wound or sore) become septic; suppurate.

become septic	Enhance the appearance of.
break down	Break down literally or metaphorically.
break up	Assign to a lower position; reduce in rank.
<u>brew</u>	Prepare by brewing. <i>There was more trouble brewing as the miners went on strike.</i>
<u>chafe</u>	Become or make sore by or as if by rubbing. <i>It chafed him to be confined like this.</i>
decay	Undergo decay or decomposition. <i>The unoccupied house started to decay.</i>
<u>decompose</u>	(with reference to a chemical compound) break down or cause to break down into component elements or simpler constituents. <i>In how many ways can one decompose a number as a sum of squares.</i>
degrade	Treat or regard (someone) with contempt or disrespect. <i>Vast areas of natural habitats have been degraded.</i>
deteriorate	Grow worse. <i>If the situation continues to deteriorate the consequences could be severe.</i>
discharge	Go off or discharge. <i>There was a dull thud as the gun discharged.</i>
<u>disintegrate</u>	Undergo or cause to undergo disintegration at a subatomic level. <i>The material disintegrated.</i>
eat away at one's mind	Cause to deteriorate due to the action of water, air, or an acid.
ferment	Of a substance undergo fermentation. <i>Her mind ferments.</i>
form pus	Establish or impress firmly in the mind.
gnaw	Bite at or nibble something persistently. <i>Watching a dog gnaw at a big bone.</i>
gnaw at one's mind	Bite or chew on with the teeth.

go bad	Be abolished or discarded.
go off	Blend or harmonize.
	Grow old or older.
matureate	<i>If you got a wound in that country it never healed but festered white and matureated.</i>
moulder	Break down. <i>The books if any are ever printed will moulder in the warehouse.</i>
ooze	Release (a liquid) in drops or small quantities. <i>She oozes a raunchy sex appeal.</i>
perish	(of rubber, food, etc.) lose its normal qualities; rot or decay. <i>The children perished in the fire.</i>
putrefy	Become putrid; decay with an offensive smell. <i>The stench of putrefying corpses.</i>
rankle	(of a comment or fact) cause continuing annoyance or resentment. <i>Lisa was rankled by his assertion.</i>
rot	Become physically weaker. <i>The education system has been allowed to rot.</i>
run	Run with the ball in such sports as football. <i>He is running the Marathon this year.</i>
secrete pus	Generate and separate from cells or bodily fluids.
smoulder	Show or feel barely suppressed anger, hatred, or another powerful emotion. <i>Anna smouldered with indignation.</i>
spoil	Become unfit for consumption or use. <i>Breakfast in bed you re spoiling me.</i>
suppurate	Cause to ripen and discharge pus. <i>The oil suppurates the pustules.</i>
weep	Mourn for; shed tears over. <i>She rubbed the sore making it weep.</i>

- *Her wounds are festering.*
- *Remand prisoners are left to fester in our jails while they wait for trial.*
- *I developed a tropical sore that festered badly.*
- *Below the surface, the old antagonisms festered.*
- *Piles of mouldy grey paper festered by the sink.*

bleed	An instance of bleeding. <i>The bleeding has stopped now.</i>
blighted	Affected by blight; anything that mars or prevents growth or prosperity. <i>A blighted rose.</i>
decay	Fall into decay or ruin. <i>He developed a detector for decays of carbon 14.</i>
<u>decompose</u>	(with reference to a dead body or other organic matter) make or become rotten; decay or cause to decay. <i>The bodies decomposed in the heat.</i>
decomposition	Separation of a substance into two or more substances that may differ from each other and from the original substance. <i>The decomposition of organic waste.</i>
degeneracy	Moral perversion; impairment of virtue and moral principles. <i>A slide into moral degeneracy.</i>
degenerate	Lacking some usual or expected property or quality. <i>Get out of my house you degenerate.</i>
deteriorate	Become progressively worse. <i>His mind deteriorated.</i>
dyspepsia	A disorder of digestive function characterized by discomfort or heartburn or nausea.
entrails	The innermost parts of something. <i>A priest would find omens in the steaming entrails of a sacrificed animal.</i>
gastritis	Inflammation of the lining of the stomach; nausea and loss of appetite and discomfort after eating.
hemophilia	Congenital tendency to uncontrolled bleeding; usually affects males and is transmitted from mother to son.
hemostatic	Tending to check bleeding by contracting the tissues or blood vessels.
henchman	A faithful follower or political supporter, especially one prepared to engage in crime or violence by way of service. <i>The dictator s henchman.</i>
indigestion	A disorder of digestive function characterized by discomfort or heartburn or nausea. <i>You know crisps give me indigestion.</i>
killjoy	Someone who spoils the pleasure of others. <i>A few killjoys try to reform the seasonal activities.</i>

lesion	A region in an organ or tissue which has suffered damage through injury or disease, such as a wound, ulcer, abscess, or tumour.
molder	Break down.
offal	The entrails and internal organs of an animal used as food. <i>Beef offal.</i>
putrefaction	The process of decay or rotting in a body or other organic matter. <i>Rome had fallen into moral putrefaction.</i>
putrefy	(of a body or other organic matter) decay or rot and produce a fetid smell. <i>The stench of putrefying corpses.</i>
putrid	Of or relating to or attended by putrefaction. <i>The putrid atmosphere of the court.</i>
reflux	(of a fluid) flow backwards through a vessel or valve in the body. <i>The liquid is allowed to reflux until the thermometer records the lowest temperature possible.</i>
rot	Liver rot in sheep. <i>The chalets were neglected and their woodwork was rotting away.</i>
sore	A raw or painful place on the body. <i>All of us had sores and infections on our hands.</i>
spoil	The act of spoiling something by causing damage to it. <i>To the victor belong the spoils of the enemy.</i>
spoilsport	A person who behaves in a way that spoils others' pleasure, especially by not joining in an activity. <i>Don't be a spoilsport Sidney.</i>
ulcer	A moral blemish or corrupting influence. <i>He's a conman with an incurable ulcer called gambling.</i>
wilt	Any of a number of fungal or bacterial diseases of plants characterized by wilting of the foliage. <i>These varieties are more resistant to aphids and wilt.</i>
wound	Inflict a wound on. <i>You really wounded his pride when you turned him down.</i>
