Definitions of "Festering" as a noun

According to the [Oxford Dictionary of English](#), “festering” as a noun can have the following definitions:

- *A sore that has become inflamed and formed pus.*
- *(medicine) the formation of morbidic matter in an abscess or a vesicle and the discharge of pus.*
- *A fluid product of inflammation.*

- ichor** (Greek mythology) the rarified fluid said to flow in the veins of the Gods.
- maturation** (medicine) the formation of morbid matter in an abscess or a vesicle and the discharge of pus.
*Pod **maturation**.*
- purulence** Symptom of being purulent (containing or forming pus).
- pus** A thick yellowish or greenish opaque liquid produced in infected tissue, consisting of dead white blood cells and bacteria with tissue debris and serum.
- sanies** A fluid product of inflammation.

suppuration The formation of morbid matter in an abscess or a vesicle and the discharge of pus.

bleed	An instance of bleeding. <i>Check the amount of air bleed from the compressor.</i>
blighted	Affected by blight; anything that mars or prevents growth or prosperity. <i>A blighted rose.</i>
decay	Fall into decay or ruin. <i>The trapped radiocarbon begins to decay at a known rate.</i>
<u>decompose</u>	Separate (substances) into constituent elements or parts. <i>The body had begun to decompose.</i>
decomposition	In a decomposed state. <i>The decomposition of organic waste.</i>
degeneracy	The state or quality of being degenerate. <i>Moral degeneracy followed intellectual degeneration.</i>
degenerate	Having reverted to a simpler form as a result of losing a complex or adaptive structure present in the ancestral form. <i>Get out of my house you degenerate.</i>
deteriorate	Become progressively worse. <i>If the situation continues to deteriorate the consequences could be severe.</i>
dyspepsia	A disorder of digestive function characterized by discomfort or heartburn or nausea.
entrails	Internal organs collectively (especially those in the abdominal cavity). <i>Digging copper out of the entrails of the earth.</i>
gastritis	Inflammation of the lining of the stomach.
hemophilia	Congenital tendency to uncontrolled bleeding; usually affects males and is transmitted from mother to son.
hemostatic	Tending to check bleeding by contracting the tissues or blood vessels.
henchman	A faithful follower or political supporter, especially one prepared to engage in crime or violence by way of service. <i>The dictator's henchman.</i>
indigestion	Pain or discomfort in the stomach associated with difficulty in digesting food. <i>You know crisps give me indigestion.</i>
killjoy	A person who deliberately spoils the enjoyment of others. <i>A few killjoys try to reform the seasonal activities.</i>

lesion	An injury to living tissue (especially an injury involving a cut or break in the skin.
molder	Break down.
offal	The entrails and internal organs of an animal used as food. <i>Gulls pecking at piles of offal from the narwhal hunt.</i>
putrefaction	(biology) the process of decay caused by bacterial or fungal action. <i>The breeze shifted and we caught the stench of putrefaction.</i>
putrefy	(of a body or other organic matter) decay or rot and produce a fetid smell. <i>The body was beginning to putrefy.</i>
putrid	(of organic matter) decaying or rotting and emitting a fetid smell. <i>Horrible like raw and putrid flesh.</i>
reflux	The outward flow of the tide. <i>Acidic secretions of the stomach can reflux back upwards.</i>
rot	Rotten or decayed matter. <i>There is enough talent in the team to stop the rot.</i>
sore	Causing misery or pain or distress. <i>She had a sore throat.</i>
spoil	The act of spoiling something by causing damage to it. <i>The enemy entered into Hereford spoiled and fired the city and razed the walls to the ground.</i>
spoilsport	Someone who spoils the pleasure of others. <i>Don't be a spoilsport Sidney.</i>
ulcer	A circumscribed inflammatory and often suppurating lesion on the skin or an internal mucous surface resulting in necrosis of tissue. <i>He's a conman with an incurable ulcer called gambling.</i>
wilt	Any of a number of fungal or bacterial diseases of plants characterized by wilting of the foliage. <i>My opponent was wilting.</i>
wound	Inflict a wound on. <i>He feared that mentioning it might reopen the wound.</i>
