| convivial | (of a person) cheerful and friendly; jovial. A woman of convivial nature. |
| festal | Relating to or characteristic of a celebration or festival. A festive or festal occasion. |
| <u>gleeful</u> | Exuberantly or triumphantly joyful. She gave a gleeful chuckle. |
| good-time | Occupied with or fond of the pleasures of good company. |



| happy | Satisfied with the quality or standard of. I m happy with his performance. |

| high-spirited | Joyously unrestrained. |
| <u>hilarious</u> | Extremely amusing. Her hilarious novel. |
| <u>jolly</u> | Happy and cheerful. <i>Jolly old Saint Nick.</i> |
| <u>jovial</u> | Full of or showing high-spirited merriment- Wordsworth. She was in a jovial mood. |
| <u>joyful</u> | Full of high-spirited delight. Make a joyful noise. |
| <u>joyous</u> | Full of happiness and joy. Felt a joyous abandon. |
| jubilant | Joyful and proud especially because of triumph or success. A large number of jubilant fans ran on to the pitch. |
| light-hearted | Carefree and happy and lighthearted. |
| <u>merry</u> | (of an occasion or season) characterized by festivity and enjoyment. <i>Have a merry Christmas.</i> |
| mirthful | Arousing or provoking laughter. <i>Mirthful</i> laughter. |
| rollicking | Given to merry frolicking. This is all good rollicking fun. |
| uproarious | Uncontrollably noisy. An uproarious party. |

| <u>anniversary</u> | The date on which a couple were married in a previous year. The 75th anniversary of the RAF. |

| banquet | Entertain with a banquet. A banquet for the graduating seniors. |
| <u>beer</u> | A general name for alcoholic beverages made by fermenting a cereal (or mixture of cereals) flavored with hops. <i>He ordered a beer</i> . |
| binge | Indulge in an activity, especially eating, drinking, or taking drugs, to excess. <i>Every so often he might binge a Netflix show.</i> |
| celebration | A joyful occasion for special festivities to mark some happy event. <i>The celebration of marriage.</i> |
| conviviality | A jovial nature. The conviviality of the evening. |



| elated | Full of high-spirited delight. After the concert I felt elated . |

| enjoy | Derive or receive pleasure from get enjoyment from take pleasure in. <i>The industry enjoyed a boom.</i> |
| exultant | Triumphantly happy. <i>He waved to the exultant crowds.</i> |
| <u>feast</u> | Partake in a feast or banquet. The men would congregate and feast after hunting. |
| festal | Relating to or characteristic of a celebration or festival. Plum pudding was originally served on festal days as a main course. |
| <u>festival</u> | A day or period of time set aside for feasting and celebration. A major international festival of song. |
| fete | An elaborate party (often outdoors. <i>A church fete</i> . |
| gala | A social occasion with special entertainments or performances. We met at a swimming gala . |
| <u>glad</u> | Cheerful and bright. Albion s lessening shore could grieve or glad mine eye. |
| happy | Marked by good fortune. A happy outcome. |
| <u>hilarious</u> | Marked by or causing boisterous merriment or convulsive laughter. <i>The meal was noisy and hilarious.</i> |
| jollity | Feeling jolly and jovial and full of good humor. <i>He was full of false jollity.</i> |
| <u>jolly</u> | Happy and cheerful. <i>Jolly</i> decent of him. |
| <u>jovial</u> | Cheerful and friendly. A jovial old gentleman. |
| joviality | Feeling jolly and jovial and full of good humor. |
| <u>joyous</u> | Full of happiness and joy. Scenes of joyous celebration. |
| <u>merry</u> | Full of or showing high-spirited merriment. After the third beer he began to feel quite merry . |
| parade | A parade ground. A pompous parade of erudition. |
| party | Have or participate in a party. She joined the party after dinner. |



| prankster | A person fond of playing pranks. |

| rejoice | Used ironically to draw attention to a strange characteristic, especially a name. I love to rejoice their poor Hearts at this season. |
| rejoicing | Great joy; jubilation. Rejoicing crowds filled the streets on VJ Day. |
| reveler | A celebrant who shares in a noisy party. The clubs attract reveler s as young as thirteen. |
| <u>revelry</u> | Unrestrained merrymaking. Sounds of revelry issued into the night. |



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
