Fetish as a Noun

Definitions of "Fetish" as a noun

According to the [Oxford Dictionary of English](#), “fetish” as a noun can have the following definitions:

- *An inanimate object worshipped for its supposed magical powers or because it is considered to be inhabited by a spirit.*
- *Excessive or irrational devotion to some activity.*
- *A form of sexual desire in which gratification depends to an abnormal degree on some object or item of clothing or part of the body.*
- *A charm superstitiously believed to embody magical powers.*
- *A form of sexual desire in which gratification is linked to an abnormal degree to a particular object, item of clothing, part of the body, etc.*
- *An excessive and irrational devotion or commitment to a particular thing.*



Synonyms of "Fetish" as a noun (12 Words)

amulet	A trinket or piece of jewelry usually hung about the neck and thought to be a magical protection against evil or disease.
<u>charm</u>	A characteristic property of certain subatomic particles specifically charm quarks charm antiquarks and hadrons containing these expressed as a quantum number. <i>The charm begins with ritual instructions.</i>
<u>compulsion</u>	Using force to cause something to occur. <i>He felt a compulsion to babble on about what had happened.</i>
fetich	A charm superstitiously believed to embody magical powers.
<u>fixation</u>	The activity of fastening something firmly in position. <i>Fixation at the oral phase might result in dependence on others.</i>
hoodoo	Voodoo. <i>Ancient armies that were put to sleep by some form of hoodoo.</i>
juju	The power associated with a juju.

mania Mental illness marked by periods of great excitement or euphoria, delusions, and overactivity.

*He had a **mania** for automobiles.*

obsession An irrational motive for performing trivial or repetitive actions, even against your will.

*He was in the grip of an **obsession** he was powerless to resist.*

sexual fixation The preservation and hardening of a tissue sample to retain as nearly as possible the same relations they had in the living body.

talisman A trinket or piece of jewelry usually hung about the neck and thought to be a magical protection against evil or disease.

*He s a quiet man off the field but on it he s our **talisman**.*

voodoo A person skilled in voodoo.
A **voodoo** doll.



Usage Examples of "Fetish" as a noun

- *A man with a fetish for surgical masks.*

- A foot fetish.
- Common male fetishes are breasts, legs, hair, shoes, and underwear.
- The western fetish for all things North African.
- Made a fetish of cleanliness.



Associations of "Fetish" (30 Words)

- addiction** An abnormally strong craving.
*He committed the offence to finance his drug **addiction**.*
- attachment** Legal seizure of property.
*He formed an **attachment** with a young widow.*
- barefoot** Without wearing anything on the feet.
*The man in front of me had his **barefoot** toddler standing on the counter.*
- bizarre** Conspicuously or grossly unconventional or unusual.
*Restaurants of **bizarre** design one like a hat another like a rabbit.*

coercion	The practice of persuading someone to do something by using force or threats. <i>Our problem cannot be solved by any form of coercion but only by agreement.</i>
<u>compulsion</u>	An irresistible urge to behave in a certain way. <i>The payment was made under compulsion.</i>
<u>compulsive</u>	A person with a compulsive disposition someone who feels compelled to do certain things. <i>A compulsive liar.</i>
<u>concentration</u>	Strengthening the concentration as of a solute in a mixture by removing diluting material. <i>The island has the greatest concentration of seabirds in the north west.</i>
dotage	The period of life in which a person is old and weak. <i>You could live here and look after me in my dotage.</i>
<u>eccentric</u>	A disc or wheel mounted eccentrically on a revolving shaft in order to transform rotation into backward and forward motion e.g a cam in an internal combustion engine. <i>Eccentric circles.</i>
<u>enchantment</u>	A magical spell. <i>A world of mystery and enchantment.</i>
<u>fascination</u>	The state of being intensely interested (as by awe or terror). <i>Television has always held a fascination for me.</i>
<u>fixation</u>	The action of concentrating the eyes directly on something. <i>Fixation at the oral phase might result in dependence on others.</i>
forcible	Vigorous and strong; forceful. <i>Forcible entry.</i>
headstrong	Habitually disposed to disobedience and opposition. <i>The headstrong impulsiveness of youth.</i>
infatuation	An object of extravagant short-lived passion. <i>The thrill of infatuation.</i>
interest	The selfish pursuit of one's own welfare self interest. <i>Food interests in Scotland must continue to invest.</i>
loafer	A leather shoe shaped like a moccasin, with a flat heel. <i>His handmade Italian loafers.</i>
<u>morbid</u>	Suggesting the horror of death and decay. <i>The treatment of morbid obesity.</i>

<u>obsession</u>	An idea or thought that continually preoccupies or intrudes on a person's mind. <i>She cared for him with a devotion bordering on obsession.</i>
<u>obsessive</u>	A person who has obsessions. <i>He s an obsessive obsessed with having complete collections of things.</i>
<u>possessive</u>	The possessive case. <i>Small children are so possessive they will not let others play with their toys.</i>
<u>preoccupation</u>	A subject or matter that engrosses someone. <i>His preoccupation with politics.</i>
reassurance	The action of removing someone's doubts or fears. <i>Children need reassurance and praise.</i>
sneaker	A canvas shoe with a pliable rubber sole.
snitch	Steal. <i>They thought he was a plant or a snitch.</i>
steal	Move stealthily. <i>He finished with eight points four steals and seven assists.</i>
<u>unrelenting</u>	Not to be placated or appeased or moved by entreaty. <i>The heat was unrelenting.</i>
unyielding	Stubbornly unyielding. <i>His unyielding faith.</i>
