Public **unease** about defence policy.

Embarrassment deriving from the feeling that others are critically

- Captain Osborne had the fidgets.






Fidget as a Verb

Definitions of "Fidget" as a verb

According to the Oxford Dictionary of English, "fidget" as a verb can have the following definitions:

- Move restlessly.
- Make small movements, especially of the hands and feet, through nervousness or impatience.
- Be impatient or uneasy.





Synonyms of "Fidget" as a verb (11 Words)

be agitated Represent, as of a character on stage.

be anxious Work in a specific place, with a specific subject, or in a specific function.

be jittery Spend or use time.

jiggle Shake (something) lightly up and down or from side to side.

Don t **jiggle** your finger while the nurse is putting on the bandage.

move restlessly Dispose of by selling.

shuffle Sort or look through (a number of things) hurriedly.

Christine **shuffle**d uneasily in her chair.

Show or feel embarrassment or shame.

He **squirm**ed as he recalled the phrases he had used.

Twist suddenly so as to sprain.

twist

She twisted her handkerchief into a knot.



twitch Use a twitch to subdue a horse.

He **twitch**ed a cigarette out of a packet.

wriggle Avoid (something) by devious means.

Don t try and **wriggle** out of your contract.

writhe Make twisting, squirming movements or contortions of the body.

The prisoner **writhe**d in discomfort.



Usage Examples of "Fidget" as a verb

- He was fidgeting to get back to his shop.
- The child is always fidgeting in his seat.
- The audience began to fidget and whisper.

inactivity Reluctance to take action; apathy.

People are frustrated with government **inactivity**.

indolence Inactivity resulting from a dislike of work.

My failure is probably due to my own **indolence**.

indolent Disinclined to work or exertion.

Leprosy is an **indolent** infectious disease.

inert Chemically inactive.

She was fat and inert.

jitter Of a signal or device suffer from jitter.

An anxious student who **jitter**ed at any provocation.

At or toward an end or late period or stage of development.

I m sorry the call is so **late**.

Moving slowly and gently.

Up a **lazy** river.

lingeringLasting for a long time or slow to end.

A painful and **lingering** death.

neglectful Failing in what duty requires.

You are being **neglectful** of our guests.

negligence Failure to take proper care over something.

His injury was due to the **negligence** of his employers.

Slowness as a consequence of not getting around to it.

Your first tip is to avoid **procrastination**.

Ouiet and inactive restfulness.

quiescence This method has been shown to induce sleep like **quiescence** in adult

animals.

shiftless Lacking or characterized by lack of ambition or initiative; lazy.
