- *Fashionable or attractive in a bold or striking way.*
- *(of a mechanism) having a jolting and powerful abruptness of action.*
- *Ruthless in competition.*

furious	Full of anger or energy; violent or intense. <i>Furious winds.</i>
immoderate	Beyond reasonable limits. <i>Immoderate drinking.</i>
<u>impassioned</u>	Filled with or showing great emotion. <i>She made an impassioned plea for help.</i>
<u>inordinate</u>	Beyond normal limits. <i>A book of inordinate length.</i>
intemperate	Having or showing a lack of self-control; immoderate. <i>An intemperate climate.</i>
intense	Extremely sharp or intense. <i>An intense young woman passionate about her art.</i>
passionate	Having or expressing strong emotions. <i>A passionate kiss.</i>
powerful	Possessing physical strength and weight rugged and powerful. <i>A powerful bomb.</i>
rough	Causing or characterized by jolts and irregular movements. <i>A rough guess.</i>
savage	(of an animal or force of nature) fierce, violent, and uncontrolled. <i>Packs of savage dogs roamed the streets.</i>
strong	Having a strong physiological or chemical effect. <i>Strong lager.</i>
tearing	Violent; extreme. <i>The tearing wind.</i>
trigger-happy	Irresponsible in the use of firearms.
<u>uncontrolled</u>	Not controlled. <i>The greatest uncontrolled health problem is AIDS.</i>
<u>vehement</u>	Showing strong feeling; forceful, passionate, or intense. <i>Vehement clapping.</i>

Vicious kicks.

violent Marked by extreme intensity of emotions or convictions inclined to react violently fervid.
A **violent** clash of colors.

aggressive	Ready or likely to attack or confront; characterized by or resulting from aggression. <i>Aggressive drivers.</i>
altercation	Noisy quarrel. <i>I had an altercation with the ticket collector.</i>
barbarism	A word or expression which is badly formed according to traditional philological rules, e.g. a word formed from elements of different languages, such as breathalyser (English and Greek) or television (Greek and Latin). <i>The collapse of civilization and the return to barbarism.</i>
billowing	(of fabric) filled with air and swelling outwards. <i>The restless billowing sea.</i>

brawl	(of a stream) flow noisily. <i>He d got into a drunken brawl in a bar.</i>
brutal	(of persons or their actions) able or disposed to inflict pain or suffering. <i>The brutal honesty of his observations.</i>
cruel	Wilfully causing pain or suffering to others, or feeling no concern about it. <i>Ernie nearly cruelled the whole thing by laughing.</i>

<u>ferocity</u>	The property of being wild or turbulent. <i>She hated him with a ferocity that astonished her.</i>
furious	Full of anger or energy; violent or intense. <i>Furious winds.</i>
gusty	Having or showing gusto. <i>Gusty female vocals.</i>
imprecation	A slanderous accusation. <i>I pushed my way through screaming imprecations.</i>
infuriated	Marked by extreme anger. <i>Infuriated onlookers charged the police who were beating the boy.</i>
irate	Feeling or characterized by great anger. <i>Irate protesters.</i>
outrage	An action or event causing outrage. <i>Her voice trembled with outrage.</i>
ruthlessness	The quality of lacking pity or compassion for others. <i>The real world ruthlessness of business.</i>
savage	(especially of a dog or wild animal) attack ferociously and maul. <i>A savage attack on the government.</i>
