Definitions of "Fiercely" as an adverb

According to the [Oxford Dictionary of English](#), “fiercely” as an adverb can have the following definitions:

- *In an emotionally fierce manner.*
- *With a heartfelt and powerful intensity.*
- *In a powerful and destructive manner.*
- *In a physically fierce manner.*
- *In a savagely violent or aggressive manner.*



Synonyms of "Fiercely" as an adverb (1 Word)

ferociously In a savagely fierce, cruel, or violent manner.
*Her novel was **ferociously** attacked when published.*

- *They fought fiercely.*
- *The wind was blowing fiercely.*
- *They are fiercely independent.*
- *The fire was already burning fiercely.*
- *Campaigners have fiercely opposed the proposals.*
- *The army clashed fiercely with militants.*

| berate | Censure severely or angrily. <i>She berated herself for being fickle.</i> |
| disaffection | A state or feeling of being dissatisfied, especially with people in authority or a system of control. <i>The widespread disaffection of the troops.</i> |
| enemy | A personal enemy. <i>Enemy aircraft.</i> |
| enmity | A state or feeling of active opposition or hostility. <i>Decades of enmity between the two countries.</i> |
| enraged | Marked by extreme anger. <i>The enraged bull attacked.</i> |
| ferocity | The state or quality of being ferocious. <i>The ferocity of the storm caught them by surprise.</i> |
| furious | Marked by extreme and violent energy. <i>He drove at a furious speed.</i> |
| fury | A surge of violent anger or other strong feeling. <i>She was paddling with a new fury.</i> |
| hostility | A hostile (very unfriendly) disposition. <i>He could not conceal his hostility.</i> |
| inconvenient | Causing trouble, difficulties, or discomfort. <i>She telephoned frequently usually at inconvenient times.</i> |
| infuriated | Marked by extreme anger. <i>Infuriated onlookers charged the police who were beating the boy.</i> |
| irate | Feeling or showing extreme anger. <i>Irate protesters.</i> |
| opposed | In conflict with or hostile to. <i>The agency is being asked to do two diametrically opposed things.</i> |
| outrage | An action or event causing outrage. <i>The massacre was one of the worst outrages in the whole of our history.</i> |
| rage | A vehement desire or passion. <i>She fell into a rage and refused to answer.</i> |
| rebuke | An act or expression of criticism and censure. <i>She had rebuked him for drinking too much.</i> |
| recrimination | An accusation in response to one from someone else. <i>There are no tears no recriminations.</i> |
| resent | Wish ill or allow unwillingly. <i>She resented the fact that I had children.</i> |

- resist** Resist immunologically the introduction of some foreign tissue or organ.
*The trees **resisted** her.*
- retort** Repay (an insult or injury).
*It was now his time to **retort** the humiliation.*
- scold** (of a bird) call loudly and persistently.
*The gulls wheeled and **scolded** above the lake.*
- tantrum** A display of bad temper.
*He has temper **tantrums** if he can't get his own way.*
- vengeful** Seeking to harm someone in return for a perceived injury.
*A **vengeful** ex con.*
- wrath** Belligerence aroused by a real or supposed wrong (personified as one of the deadly sins).
*He hid his pipe for fear of incurring his father's **wrath**.*
