## **Fiercely as an Adverb**

### **Definitions of "Fiercely" as an adverb**

According to the [Oxford Dictionary of English](#), “fiercely” as an adverb can have the following definitions:

- *In an emotionally fierce manner.*
- *With a heartfelt and powerful intensity.*
- *In a powerful and destructive manner.*
- *In a physically fierce manner.*
- *In a savagely violent or aggressive manner.*



### Synonyms of "Fiercely" as an adverb (1 Word)

**ferociously** In a savagely fierce, cruel, or violent manner.  
*Her novel was **ferociously** attacked when published.*



### Usage Examples of "Fiercely" as an adverb

- *They fought fiercely.*
- *The wind was blowing fiercely.*
- *They are fiercely independent.*
- *The fire was already burning fiercely.*
- *Campaigners have fiercely opposed the proposals.*
- *The army clashed fiercely with militants.*

<a href="#">adverse</a>	Preventing success or development; harmful; unfavourable. <i><b>Adverse</b> weather conditions.</i>
<b>aggression</b>	Forcefulness. <i>His chin was jutting with <b>aggression</b>.</i>
<b>aggressive</b>	Ready or likely to attack or confront; characterized by or resulting from aggression. <i>An <b>aggressive</b> tumor.</i>
<b>angrily</b>	Stormily or threateningly. <i>Workers reacted <b>angrily</b> to the announcement.</i>
<a href="#">assail</a>	Make a concerted or violent attack on. <i>He <b>assailed</b> a group of editors for their alleged excesses.</i>
<b>attack</b>	Attack someone physically or emotionally. <i>Baxter was recalled to the <b>attack</b>.</i>

<b><u>berate</u></b>	Censure severely or angrily. <i>She <b>berated</b> herself for being fickle.</i>
<b>disaffection</b>	A state or feeling of being dissatisfied, especially with people in authority or a system of control. <i>The widespread <b>disaffection</b> of the troops.</i>
<b><u>enemy</u></b>	A personal enemy. <i><b>Enemy</b> aircraft.</i>
<b><u>enmity</u></b>	A state or feeling of active opposition or hostility. <i>Decades of <b>enmity</b> between the two countries.</i>
<b>enraged</b>	Marked by extreme anger. <i>The <b>enraged</b> bull attached.</i>
<b><u>ferocity</u></b>	The state or quality of being ferocious. <i>The <b>ferocity</b> of the storm caught them by surprise.</i>
<b>furious</b>	Marked by extreme and violent energy. <i>He drove at a <b>furious</b> speed.</i>
<b><u>fury</u></b>	A surge of violent anger or other strong feeling. <i>She was paddling with a new <b>fury</b>.</i>
<b><u>hostility</u></b>	A hostile (very unfriendly) disposition. <i>He could not conceal his <b>hostility</b>.</i>
<b>inconvenient</b>	Causing trouble, difficulties, or discomfort. <i>She telephoned frequently usually at <b>inconvenient</b> times.</i>
<b>infuriated</b>	Marked by extreme anger. <i><b>Infuriated</b> onlookers charged the police who were beating the boy.</i>
<b>irate</b>	Feeling or showing extreme anger. <i><b>Irate</b> protesters.</i>
<b>opposed</b>	In conflict with or hostile to. <i>The agency is being asked to do two diametrically <b>opposed</b> things.</i>
<b>outrage</b>	An action or event causing outrage. <i>The massacre was one of the worst <b>outrages</b> in the whole of our history.</i>
<b>rage</b>	A vehement desire or passion. <i>She fell into a <b>rage</b> and refused to answer.</i>
<b><u>rebuke</u></b>	An act or expression of criticism and censure. <i>She had <b>rebuked</b> him for drinking too much.</i>
<b>recrimination</b>	An accusation in response to one from someone else. <i>There are no tears no <b>recriminations</b>.</i>
<b><u>resent</u></b>	Wish ill or allow unwillingly. <i>She <b>resented</b> the fact that I had children.</i>

**resist**

Resist immunologically the introduction of some foreign tissue or organ.  
*The trees **resisted** her.*

**retort**

Repay (an insult or injury).  
*It was now his time to **retort** the humiliation.*

**scold**

(of a bird) call loudly and persistently.  
*The gulls wheeled and **scolded** above the lake.*

**tantrum**

A display of bad temper.  
*He has temper **tantrums** if he can't get his own way.*

**vengeful**

Seeking to harm someone in return for a perceived injury.  
*A **vengeful** ex con.*

**wrath**

Belligerence aroused by a real or supposed wrong (personified as one of the deadly sins).  
*He hid his pipe for fear of incurring his father's **wrath**.*
