aggressive	Tending to spread quickly. <i>An aggressive tumor.</i>
bad	Feeling physical discomfort or pain though is occasionally used colloquially for bad. <i>Bad reviews.</i>

base	Serving as or forming a base. <i>That liberal obedience without which your army would be a base rabble.</i>
begrimed	Blackened with ingrained dirt. <i>They stand in front of begrimed windows.</i>
bitter	Painful or unpleasant to accept or contemplate. <i>Bitter enemies.</i>

coarse	Relating to the sport of angling for coarse fish. <i>Of what coarse metal ye are molded.</i>
cold	Having a low or inadequate temperature or feeling a sensation of coldness or having been made cold by e.g. ice or refrigeration. <i>Cold blooded killing.</i>
contemptible	Deserving of contempt or scorn. <i>A display of contemptible cowardice.</i>
corrupt	Lacking in integrity. <i>Humanity they knew to be corrupt from the day of Adam's creation.</i>
cross	Extending or lying across in a crosswise direction at right angles to the long axis. <i>He seemed to be very cross about something.</i>

cruddy	Characterized by obscenity.
curmudgeonly	(especially of an old person) bad-tempered and negative. <i>His curmudgeonly temper.</i>
despicable	Morally reprehensible. <i>Would do something as despicable as murder.</i>
disgusting	Highly offensive; arousing aversion or disgust. <i>A disgusting smell.</i>
earthy	Sensible and practical. <i>Her earthy common sense.</i>
foul	Of a baseball not hit between the foul lines. <i>The land was foul with weeds.</i>
fractious	Stubbornly resistant to authority or control. <i>Rockets were much too fractious to be tested near thickly populated areas.</i>
freezing	(used hyperbolically) very cold. <i>It was freezing cold outside.</i>
grimy	Thickly covered with ingrained dirt or soot. <i>Grimy hands.</i>
grouchy	Irritable and bad-tempered; grumpy; complaining. <i>The old man grew sulky and grouchy.</i>
grubby	Involving dishonest or disreputable activity; sordid. <i>Grubby little fingers.</i>
grumpy	Annoyed and irritable. <i>He s grumpy because he hasn t heard from you.</i>
hot-tempered	Quickly aroused to anger.
icy	Covered with or containing or consisting of ice. <i>Icy northern waters.</i>
ill-tempered	Annoyed and irritable.
improper	Lacking in modesty or decency. <i>Slightly improper to dine alone with a married man.</i>
indecent	Not appropriate or fitting. <i>A bathing suit considered indecent by local standards.</i>
indelicate	Having or showing a lack of sensitive understanding or tact. <i>Forgive me asking an indelicate question but how are you off for money.</i>
irritable	Capable of responding to stimuli. <i>She was tired and irritable.</i>

lewd	Driven by lust; preoccupied with or exhibiting lustful desires. <i>Lewd pictures.</i>
licentious	Disregarding accepted conventions, especially in grammar or literary style. <i>Unlike many of the artists who frequented the Soho scene of the 1960s he did not lead a licentious life.</i>
lousy	Very poor or bad. <i>The town is lousy with tourists.</i>
low	Of a river or lake below the usual water level. <i>Borrowing fell to a low level.</i>
mean	Characterized by malice. <i>The mean annual rainfall.</i>
mucky	(of soil) soft and watery. <i>Wet mucky lowland.</i>
muddy	Not bright or clear; dirty-looking. <i>They changed their muddy boots.</i>
murky	Dark or gloomy. <i>The sky was murky and a thin drizzle was falling.</i>
nasty	Offensive or even (of persons) malicious. <i>Will he say nasty things at my funeral.</i>
obnoxious	Causing disapproval or protest. <i>He found her son somewhat obnoxious.</i>
obscene	Designed to incite to indecency or lust-Margaret Mead. <i>Obscene telephone calls.</i>
off colour	Below a satisfactory level.
peevish	Easily irritated or annoyed. <i>A thin peevish voice.</i>
quick-tempered	Quickly aroused to anger.
raw	Devoid of elaboration or diminution or concealment; bare and pure. <i>Raw silk.</i>
ribald	Referring to sexual matters in an amusingly coarse or irreverent way. <i>Ribald language.</i>
risqué	Suggestive of sexual impropriety.
rude	Belonging to an early stage of technical development characterized by simplicity and often crudeness. <i>A rude coffin.</i>

shabby	In poor condition through long use or lack of care. <i>A conscript in a shabby uniform saluted the car.</i>

slovenly	(especially of a person or their appearance) untidy and dirty. <i>Slovenly appearance.</i>
sordid	Foul and run-down and repulsive. <i>A sordid political campaign.</i>
squalid	Showing or involving a contemptible lack of moral standards. <i>A squalid attempt to save themselves from electoral embarrassment.</i>
stinking	Foul-smelling. <i>It s a stinking world.</i>
unclean	Dirty. <i>Wore an unclean shirt.</i>
unkempt	Not neatly combed. <i>Wild unkempt hair.</i>

unsanitary Not sanitary or healthful.
*Grim and **unsanitary** conditions.*

untidy Not arranged neatly and in order.
*She was chronically **untidy** and her clothes lay where she had dropped them.*
