<b>cantankerous</b>	Stubbornly obstructive and unwilling to cooperate- Spectator. <i>He can be a <b>cantankerous</b> old fossil at times.</i>
<b>chilly</b>	Uncomfortably or unpleasantly cold. <i>A <b>chilly</b> February evening.</i>
<b>coarse</b>	Relating to the sport of angling for coarse fish. <i>Of what <b>coarse</b> metal ye are molded.</i>
<b>cold</b>	Having a low or inadequate temperature or feeling a sensation of coldness or having been made cold by e.g. ice or refrigeration. <i><b>Cold</b> blooded killing.</i>
<b>contemptible</b>	Deserving of contempt or scorn. <i>A display of <b>contemptible</b> cowardice.</i>
<b>corrupt</b>	Lacking in integrity. <i>Humanity they knew to be <b>corrupt</b> from the day of Adam's creation.</i>
<b>cross</b>	Extending or lying across in a crosswise direction at right angles to the long axis. <i>He seemed to be very <b>cross</b> about something.</i>



<b>cruddy</b>	Characterized by obscenity.
<b>curmudgeonly</b>	(especially of an old person) bad-tempered and negative. <i>His <b>curmudgeonly</b> temper.</i>
<b>despicable</b>	Morally reprehensible. <i>Would do something as <b>despicable</b> as murder.</i>
<b>disgusting</b>	Highly offensive; arousing aversion or disgust. <i>A <b>disgusting</b> smell.</i>
<b>earthy</b>	Sensible and practical. <i>Her <b>earthy</b> common sense.</i>
<b>foul</b>	Of a baseball not hit between the foul lines. <i>The land was <b>foul</b> with weeds.</i>
<b>fractious</b>	Stubbornly resistant to authority or control. <i>Rockets were much too <b>fractious</b> to be tested near thickly populated areas.</i>
<b>freezing</b>	(used hyperbolically) very cold. <i>It was <b>freezing</b> cold outside.</i>
<b>grimy</b>	Thickly covered with ingrained dirt or soot. <i><b>Grimy</b> hands.</i>
<b>grouchy</b>	Irritable and bad-tempered; grumpy; complaining. <i>The old man grew sulky and <b>grouchy</b>.</i>
<b>grubby</b>	Involving dishonest or disreputable activity; sordid. <i><b>Grubby</b> little fingers.</i>
<b>grumpy</b>	Annoyed and irritable. <i>He s <b>grumpy</b> because he hasn t heard from you.</i>
<b>hot-tempered</b>	Quickly aroused to anger.
<b>icy</b>	Covered with or containing or consisting of ice. <i><b>Icy</b> northern waters.</i>
<b>ill-tempered</b>	Annoyed and irritable.
<b>improper</b>	Lacking in modesty or decency. <i>Slightly <b>improper</b> to dine alone with a married man.</i>
<b>indecent</b>	Not appropriate or fitting. <i>A bathing suit considered <b>indecent</b> by local standards.</i>
<b>indelicate</b>	Having or showing a lack of sensitive understanding or tact. <i>Forgive me asking an <b>indelicate</b> question but how are you off for money.</i>
<b>irritable</b>	Capable of responding to stimuli. <i>She was tired and <b>irritable</b>.</i>

<b>lewd</b>	Driven by lust; preoccupied with or exhibiting lustful desires. <i><b>Lewd</b> pictures.</i>
<b><u>licentious</u></b>	Disregarding accepted conventions, especially in grammar or literary style. <i>Unlike many of the artists who frequented the Soho scene of the 1960s he did not lead a <b>licentious</b> life.</i>
<b>lousy</b>	Very poor or bad. <i>The town is <b>lousy</b> with tourists.</i>
<b><u>low</u></b>	Of a river or lake below the usual water level. <i>Borrowing fell to a <b>low</b> level.</i>
<b>mean</b>	Characterized by malice. <i>The <b>mean</b> annual rainfall.</i>
<b>mucky</b>	(of soil) soft and watery. <i>Wet <b>mucky</b> lowland.</i>
<b>muddy</b>	Not bright or clear; dirty-looking. <i>They changed their <b>muddy</b> boots.</i>
<b><u>murky</u></b>	Dark or gloomy. <i>The sky was <b>murky</b> and a thin drizzle was falling.</i>

<b>peevish</b>	Easily irritated or annoyed. <i>A thin <b>peevish</b> voice.</i>
<b>quick-tempered</b>	Quickly aroused to anger.
<b>raw</b>	Devoid of elaboration or diminution or concealment; bare and pure. <i><b>Raw</b> silk.</i>
<b>ribald</b>	Referring to sexual matters in an amusingly coarse or irreverent way. <i><b>Ribald</b> language.</i>
<b>risqué</b>	Suggestive of sexual impropriety.
<b>rude</b>	Belonging to an early stage of technical development characterized by simplicity and often crudeness. <i>A <b>rude</b> coffin.</i>

<b>shabby</b>	In poor condition through long use or lack of care. <i>A conscript in a <b>shabby</b> uniform saluted the car.</i>
<b>short-tempered</b>	Quickly aroused to anger.
<b>slimy</b>	Covered by or resembling slime. <i>A <b>slimy</b> little liar.</i>
<b>snowy</b>	Of the white color of snow. <i><b>Snowy</b> mountains.</i>
<b>sordid</b>	Unethical or dishonest. <i>The overcrowded housing conditions were <b>sordid</b> and degrading.</i>
<b>stained</b>	Marked or dyed or discolored with foreign matter. <i>A <b>stained</b> beer mat.</i>
<b>unclean</b>	Dirty. <i><b>Unclean</b> meat.</i>
<b>unkempt</b>	Not neatly combed. <i>Wild <b>unkempt</b> hair.</i>
<b>unpleasant</b>	Causing discomfort, unhappiness, or revulsion; disagreeable. <i><b>Unpleasant</b> odors.</i>
<b>unrefined</b>	Not refined; uncouth. <i>How can a refined girl be drawn to such an <b>unrefined</b> man.</i>

<b>fetid</b>	Smelling extremely unpleasant. <i>The <b>fetid</b> water of the marsh.</i>
<b>foul</b>	Commit a foul break the rules. <i>The news had put Michelle in a <b>foul</b> mood.</i>
<b>grimy</b>	Covered with or characterized by grime. <i>The <b>grimy</b> industrial city.</i>

<b>malodorous</b>	Smelling very unpleasant. <i>Leaking taps and <b>malodorous</b> drains.</i>
<b>messy</b>	Dirty and disorderly. <i>A <b>messy</b> divorce.</i>
<b>muddy</b>	Cause to become muddy. <i>They changed their <b>muddy</b> boots.</i>
<b>nasty</b>	Disgustingly dirty; filled or smeared with offensive matter. <i>A <b>nasty</b> shock.</i>
<b>ragamuffin</b>	A person, typically a child, in ragged, dirty clothes. <i><b>Ragamuffin</b> style.</i>
<b>ragged</b>	(of an animal) having a rough, shaggy coat. <i>A <b>ragged</b> tramp.</i>
<b>scabrous</b>	Dealing with salacious or indecent material. <i><b>Scabrous</b> details included being regularly seen with a mistress.</i>
<b>seamy</b>	Morally degraded- Seattle Weekly. <i>The <b>seamy</b> side of life.</i>
<b>seedy</b>	Shabby and untidy- Mark Twain. <i>A <b>seedy</b> district.</i>
<b>slovenly</b>	(especially of a person or their appearance) untidy and dirty. <i><b>Slovenly</b> appearance.</i>
<b>sordid</b>	Foul and run-down and repulsive. <i>A <b>sordid</b> political campaign.</i>
<b>squalid</b>	Showing or involving a contemptible lack of moral standards. <i>A <b>squalid</b> attempt to save themselves from electoral embarrassment.</i>
<b>stinking</b>	Foul-smelling. <i>It s a <b>stinking</b> world.</i>
<b>unclean</b>	Dirty. <i>Wore an <b>unclean</b> shirt.</i>
<b>unkempt</b>	Not neatly combed. <i>Wild <b>unkempt</b> hair.</i>

**untidy** Not arranged neatly and in order.  
*She was chronically **untidy** and her clothes lay where she had dropped them.*
