- *Coming at the end of a series.*



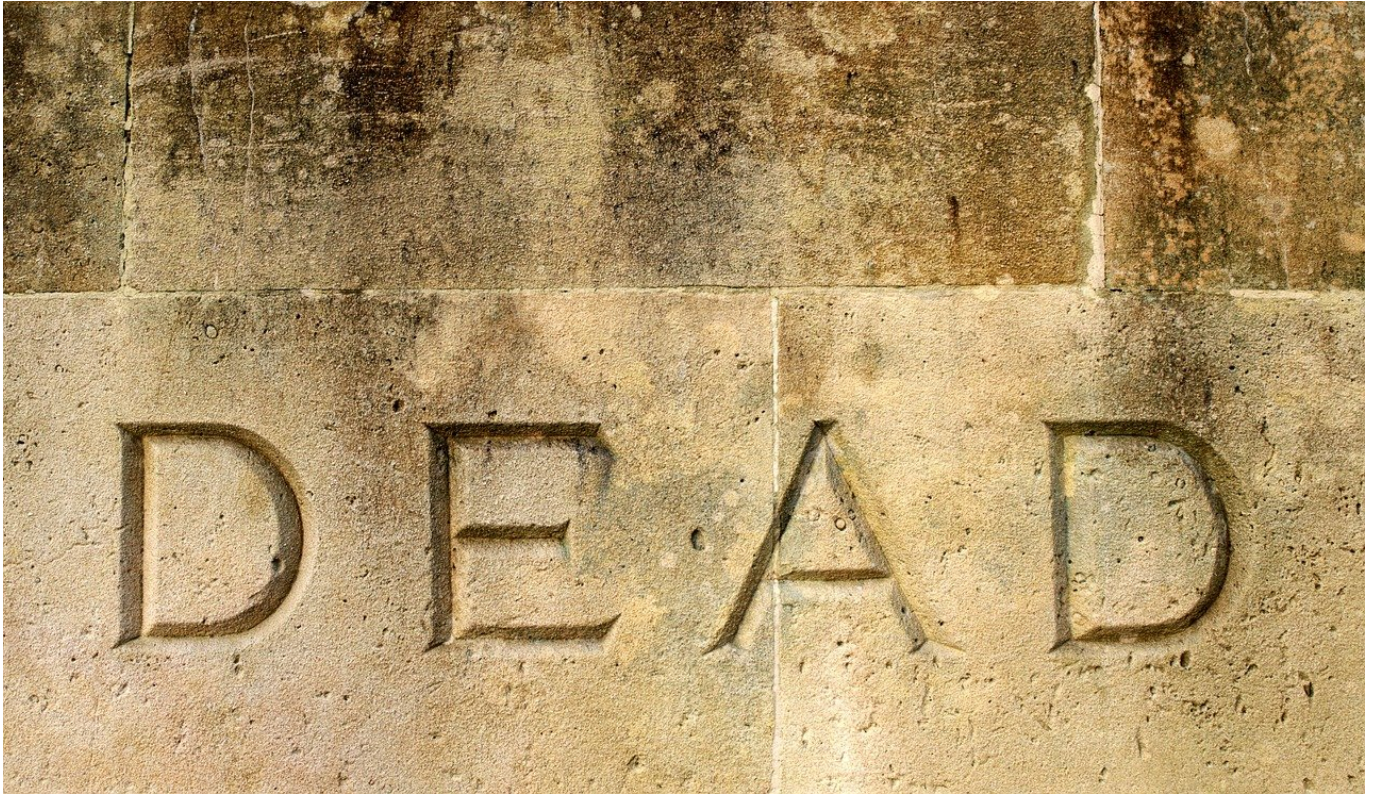

## Associations of "Final" (30 Words)

### closing

The act of closing something.  
*The **closing** stages of the election.*

### **coda**

The concluding section of a dance, especially of a pas de deux or the finale of a ballet in which the dancers parade before the audience.  
*The first movement ends with a fortissimo **coda**.*

### **completion**

The action or process of completing or finishing something.  
*The risk stays with the seller until **completion**.*

### conclude

Come to a close.  
*We found some bread which we **concluded** to eat.*

### **conclusion**

A proposition that is reached from given premises.  
*He drew his **conclusions** quickly.*

### **conclusive**

(of evidence or argument) having or likely to have the effect of proving a case; decisive.  
***Conclusive** evidence.*
